

An Update from the Mayor's Chosen Charities

The Mayor of Felixstowe chooses a number of charities to support over the duration of their Mayoral term. Felixstowe Community Hospital League of Friends

We were thrilled to be chosen as one of this year's Mayor's charities and are now working with The Compass and Felixstowe Opportunities group, planning some exciting joint events for the year ahead.

Saturday 16th July was our Annual Summer Bazaar, and we were delighted to see so many turn out to show their support. Special thanks go out to those local businesses who provided raffle prizes, in particular Felixstowe Travel who donated our first prize of tickets for 2 to Duxford Air show with travel included. Felixstowe Mayor, Sharon Harkin attended and spoke to nurses, craft stall holders and members of the public. The event was a great success raising in the region of

£950 which will go towards providing vital equipment to the Hospital and local health care services.

Friday 19th August saw us celebrate the Hospital's 113th birthday with an afternoon tea party providing an opportunity to give thanks to both past and present staff. Originally called the Croydon Cottage Hospital, was built in 1909. Both the site and the building itself were gifted by Mr C H E Croydon, an Ipswich jeweller who had a home in Montague Rd. The Hospital continues to operate providing Minor Injury Unit, a variety of clinics and wards for patient recovery. The birthday event was attended by Felixstowe Mayor Sharon Harkin, the daughter of Joan Rich, staff and patients. A picture board of old hospital photos was set up and became quite the talking point as those featured were named!

Coming up we have Afternoon Tea on 3rd September, a Quiz Night on the 23rd September, a coffee morning on 8th of October and a Fashion Show 8th of November ready for the festive season. We will also be arranging more volunteer gardening sessions to help maintain the Hospital gardens for patients and staff.

The Compass - Life is SO complicated

'Thank you for calling. Your call is important to us. You are number 14 in the queue. Enter your date of birth after the tone...'

Familiar? We live in a world which is increasingly complex. Our banking system is faceless and has a language of its own. Cash transactions are almost a thing of the past. The opportunities to get in to debt are vast, and the option to phone and chat through a problem with a real person, almost non-existent.

It is difficult to give a one-line explanation as to what The Compass does, but a huge part of our work is around supporting individuals and families for whom our self-service, faceless, IT-driven world has become unmanageable. Add to that

scenario broken relationships, health issues, redundancy, debt or social anxiety and life quickly becomes overwhelming. Most of our service-users are referrals from statutory agencies.

We opened our doors in April 2021, and have worked with over 170 cases, of which we have been able to move on over 140. Our stated aim is to help people from dependence to independence. We work with whole households, not just the referred individual. The Felixstowe community has been superb in supporting our work, through practical help and charitable donations. As we are a Christian charity we work with many of the local churches, relying on them for volunteers, prayer support and use of facilities for life-skills courses. We are currently facing a tsunami of need due to the cost of living crisis. As we head towards winter, never will the support of the whole community be more important.

This year, Felixstowe Opportunity Group decided to stay open for the summer holidays. We published a comprehensive program of activities on our website and lots of folks have been coming to visit for the first time. We have been busy with arts and crafts, and in this lovely warm weather, with thanks to Katie Thompson, one of our lovely Mums, we made chalk ice to draw with.

We have been open four days a week for tots and their older siblings, and have welcomed lots of new faces over the last few weeks. One of the favourite activities was making stop motion animation movies with Lego. There were two groups of children who, after only a very short set of instructions, were able to create movies of Lego people and cars, buildings, and even a full-scale battle! The children had lots of fun and are hoping learn more at an after school club.



We have been able to help new visitors who have children with additional needs and require support. As English was not their first language we helped them to source support locally and the family is now more aware of how they can help their son.

It has been so lovely to see the children start to develop friendships as many of our regular visitors have been attending since we opened in February and play really well together. This gives all our Mums some time to chat to each other about all manner of subjects. We have sorted out most of the world's problems and given each other loads of hints and tips about everything from parenting to cooking to gardening and furniture restoration.

The summer has been a wonderful time of growth in our little corner of the world! We are going to be sorry to lose our older children in September as they move up to school, but we are hoping that lots of new families will come to see us with younger children.



East Suffolk Council – Development to Langer Park and 'The Gallopers' Return

Seashore Village & Activity Park

Do you "Dare to Dip" with Sam Phillips?

My name is Sam Phillips and I am one of many people who has suffered with anxiety and depression. Ever since I was young, I over-obsessed about my health. I was basically a hypochondriac. It was ruining my life, which led on to severe depression and panic attacks.

After struggling with addiction and finding myself in a dark place, I discovered cold-water therapy, which has been the major tool to get me back on track.

In 2021, I set myself 30-day cold shower challenge and realised afterwards that - both mentally and physically the benefits are incredible. So I upped the ante and in March last year I set myself the challenge of going into the North Sea every day for a year, calling the challenge 'Dare to Dip'.



I completed the year-long challenge on 15 March and what a journey it was!

When I started, I had no idea it would inspire so many others. On day one, I dipped alone. On day two, someone joined me. On day three, more people joined and the group grew and grew.

By the end of the 365 dips, hundreds of people had got involved in the challenge, helping to raise hundreds of pounds for Anxiety UK and awareness for mental health.

I got an Mayors Award for outstanding contribution in my community and I was a Pride of Britain finalist, which still hasn't sunk in. But I know it's made my daughters proud, which is what I set out to do! My girls are my world! They've taken the blue out of the skies and put it back in my eyes and I am forever grateful.

Because I personally know how effective cold water therapy can be and I've seen it help so many others, I've now come up with a challenge: Dare to Dip December.

People all over the UK are already getting involved and even people in the USA and Canada have accepted the challenge so far!

I'm challenging people to do some form of cold-water therapy for the whole 31 days of December, whether in the form of cold showers, lakes, sea or ice baths. Obviously safety is key and I would ask anyone with health issues to seek medical advice before taking on the challenge. I also ask people not to dip alone, so get your pals involved. The aim is to save lives - not to lose any!

Cold-water therapy has improved my life massively and it could do the same for you.

The goal is to improve and change people's lives for the better. So get involved if you struggle with mental health, or even if you don't and just want to help raise awareness!

That just leaves us with one question... do you dare to dip this December?

Memory Lane



At the beginning of 2022 local care company Home Instead took over the running of the Memory Lane Support Group in Felixstowe. The group was formed by the Felixstowe Dementia action Alliance and has been running for a number of years providing

support for those with dementia and their carers in the community of Felixstowe and Peninsula. Since January 2022 there has been a new steering group to oversee the group.

The Memory Lane support group currently meets fortnightly on Fridays between 10.30am and 1pm at the Salvation Army, Cobbold Road Felixstowe. The group is well attended and has been supported by donations from local businesses and families. It has



also received funding thanks to the Port Community Fund/ Suffolk Foundation and the Boost Grant from the East Suffolk Council.

A second Memory Lane Support Group has been set up at Trimley Memorial Hall, High Road Trimley for those with dementia and their carers in the community. The group meet on alternate Fridays between 10am to 12pm.

Wendy Chard Head of Community Engagement and Dementia Trainer for Home Instead said "Home Instead are passionate about our community work and understand how challenging some days can be. We want to help people to live well with dementia. Our aim is to be there to support members of the groups over coffee and cake, have some fun, but also provide access to information, signpost to resources which is available in the area in order to help those attending the groups. Open your Eyes to Better Sleep with Suffolk Mind



Set up your day to get a better night's sleep and feel better for it. It's the one gift within our grasp which could

support the mental wellbeing of generations to come.

Sleep, just like diet and exercise, is hugely important for our wellbeing, but post-pandemic, as many as 9 out of 10 of us think we could get better sleep.

Parents, grandparents, or those with other caring responsibilities (for partners /elderly relatives) are more likely to be at risk of poor quality sleep or affected by insomnia.

During the pandemic, limited activity and reduced social contact unpicked established routines, prevented us from meeting our emotional and physical human needs and impacted the nature of our sleep for the longer term too.

Embracing positive sleep patterns can stop this slow-motion creep and set a game-changing example for long-term mental health. Try introducing little actions and changes to lifestyle choices and encourage others to do so.

Here's 8 daytime things to do to help get a better night's sleep:

- 1. Exercise. Tire the body, burn the stress hormone cortisol.
- 2. Eat well. Enjoy a balanced diet.
- 3. Cut the caffeine to just mornings. Limit alcohol intake too.
- 4. Take private time-out to reflect on thoughts in the day.
- 5. Introduce a bedtime routine. Avoid stimuli like TV/internet before bed.
- 6. Hone some relaxation techniques. Breathing exercises can support sleep.
- 7. Keep the bedroom focused on sleep. Remove 'to do' distractions/screens. Create separate activity areas, if required. Set ground rules, so others recognize/respect intentions.
- 8. Meet your emotional needs for the best chance of getting a good night's sleep

Felixstowe's Seafront Gardens wins coveted Green Flag Award

Felixstowe's Seafront Gardens has once again been officially recognised as one of the country's best parks after receiving a Green Flag Award.

The serene Victorian cliffside site was today awarded the international quality



mark for parks and green spaces for the seventh successive year.

This uninterrupted string of awards followed East Suffolk Council's four-year restoration project, launched in 2011, to return the Grade II listed greenspace to its former glory as part of a town-wide regeneration programme.

The Green Flag Award scheme, managed by environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy, under licence from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, recognises and rewards well-managed parks and green spaces, setting the benchmark standard for the management of green spaces across the United Kingdom and around the world.

Judges reported being very impressed by the well managed and maintained Seafront Gardens, which they called a "credit to the town" and deserving of the Green Flag Award. They also praised the site's links to numerous community groups and the strength of the Friends of Felixstowe Seafront Gardens.

New Electric Van for the Felixstowe Town **Council Grounds Team**



As part of Felixstowe Town Council's dedication to our Climate Emergency Action Plan, the Grounds Maintenance Team are now conducting their daily duties with the help of a brand-new electric van. The van will be used for many tasks, including the upkeep of Felixstowe Cemetery and the FELIXSTOWE maintenance of two newly-aquired local parks, Allenby Park and Gosford Way Park, amongst other work across the town.

Felixstowe Town Council has declared a Climate Emergency, and is dedicated to reducing the organisation's carbon emissions and the environmental impact of our responsibilities throughout Felixstowe. The arrival of the new electric van follows the transition to electric



power tools, such as a battery-powered, rechargable hedge strimmer, and developments to the much-loved Felixstowe in Flower planting scheme, as our previous, annual planting patterns were swapped for lower-impact perrenial plants.

Choose Petal or Paper Confetti for a Plastic Free Felixstowe



Felixstowe Town Hall and the adjoining Town Hall Gardens are the site of many happy moments around weddings and civil partnerships. This summer I approached the gardens with my heart in my mouth. What would I find? I was so relieved to see nothing more than a few pale pink paper confetti horseshoes fluttering about in the sea breeze.

It has not always been so. I have watched as people have fired confetti cannons full of plastic confetti shapes and string. I went back afterwards and picked up almost 200 pieces of plastic. On other occasions I'd walk through the garden or in front of the Town Hall and would spend hours picking up thousands of plastic confetti discs and handfuls of glittery stars.

Plastic gets into our oceans in so many ways. Estimates vary but the majority of litter in our oceans comes from land-based sources. Not just deliberate littering. Plastic confetti released for a brief moment at the town hall gets picked up by the wind and blown across the road into the sea or washed down the street drains and straight out to sea. Something that takes just a few seconds will persist for hundreds of years in our ocean environment.

Concerned, I contacted Felixstowe Town Hall. They responded by ensuring that their booking forms state that only paper confetti or flower petals may be used and

this is reiterated on their website too. It's hard to enforce once the Town Hall has closed and the fun continues - who's to say what might happen? People also come from other venues for their confetti moment in the seafront gardens.

But hopefully we are seeing a small but significant change. Awareness and behaviour change around single use plastics grew after Blue Planet was aired and although there has been a huge setback thanks to the covid pandemic it's hard to ignore the issue now.

Here is my confetti moment from my civil partnership ceremony at Felixstowe Town Hall this summer. The confetti was dried rose petals from our garden (three years' worth as the original date was 2020!) and paper rainbows.

- Hired a further cleaning operative for the prom.
- Closed the troublesome Leisure Centre toilets and replaced with four new portaloos until the Beach Village is completed on the South Seafront.
- Increased refuse monitoring and collection with a high concentration on heavy pedestrian and traffic days.
- Intervention with Norse to address Hamilton Road flooding issues, resulting in a full drain cleaning programme to prevent further flooding damage.
- Procurement of an additional £12,000 from East Suffolk Council and Felixstowe Town Council
 to assist with the strengthening of the 'Visit Felixstowe' brand with the provision of a cohesive
 marketing strategy to include a new website and social media platforms.
- The creation of a new website for 'Visit Felixstowe, which is being populated with new business profiles as well as optimised content and useful information. www.visitfelixstowe. org.uk is the landing page of the free WiFi, newly launched by East Suffolk Council.
- The BID is responsible for the delivery of the 'Visit Felixstowe' brand and online platforms, including social media. Many businesses have already featured and been showcased to over 10,800 people. To arrange for your business profile to be updated, please get in touch.

We have been at our workshop for one year this August and continue to expand our facilities. We now have an independent electrical power supply and no longer rely on a

generator. This has enabled our new table saw to be fully operational. This saw was purchased with a grant from Felixstowe Town Council and provides the ability to cut large timber and timber sheets in a modern and safe environment with built in dust extraction.

We are actively looking for new members to come and benefit from Shed, to



learn and impart

skills with modern and traditional facilities. We are a friendly bunch and although we take health and safety seriously there is always laughter and banter in abundance.

Why not come along and see just what is on offer, some come by bus, others by the FACTS Community service with special disability facilities. You need to be 18 years old and we welcome women. So why is called Men's Shed? The concept is based on the established fact that men do not cope as well as women in respect of loneliness and building social connections. It all started in Australia and is now worldwide with over 700 Men's Sheds in the UK.

East Suffolk Disability Advice Service



Following a grant from
Felixstowe Town Council
towards the continuance of the
Crisis Intervention Service, the
last twelve months have been

a period of rapid growth for DAS: the numbers accessing the service was up over 50% in the first six months of this year and in order to cope we have taken on more staff and volunteers. As it seems these larger client numbers are set to continue with no let-up in the cost-of-living and energy cost crises we needed to acquire

small additional premises below our main office to accommodate our bigger team. Having a ground floor presence will be a boon to visiting clients as well as our wheelchair bound staff and

Meanwhile, despite the increased demand, we have maintained our 100% success record at appeal tribunals going now well into a third successive year. In January we started our new specialist energy support and Pension Credit service which is having a growing impact.

On the crisis service we helped 344 clients in the first six months and this compares with 29 in the whole of 2019! The preventative impact of our work on disabled people's higher propensity to self-harm and suicide in these circumstances has been endorsed by Dr Dan Poulter, MP.

As you can see from the photograph we were glad to support the Felixstowe Christmas Market in November with a stall in aid of the White Ribbon campaign (Men against violence against women). Our manager was interviewed twice by Radio Felixstowe where she explained the services we provide and how to contact us.

FACTS were grateful to be a recipient of Felixstowe Town

Council's Occasional Grant Funding earlier this year. The grant we received has now enabled us to make vital updates to the security and interior of our office.



have been providing accessible transport for the Felixstowe community for over 30 years, and our

office Garrison Lane is the hub of our operations. Without it we would not be able to function effectively.

We have now had a brand new CCTV system installed, which has vastly increased the security of our office and equipment, and provides reassurance to our staff. We have also been able to update and modernise the interior of our portacabin, to make the working environment for our staff more pleasant. This includes the fitting of a new carpet and upgrading our lighting.

In recent times we have seen a rising cost in the running of vehicles especially with the increase in fuel prices. This has resulted in FACTS becoming more reliant on grants and donations so that we can continue to operate and serve the Felixstowe community. The existence of affordable and wheelchair accessible transport is vital to help people retain their independence, keep them out and about in the community and ultimately prevents them from becoming isolated, and therefore we are incredibly grateful to Felixstowe Town Council for their grant.

St Andrews Preschool



In 2021 St Andrews
Preschool were lucky
enough to receive £800
from Felixstowe Town
Council to purchase some
blinds to dress the windows
of the church hall they have

operated from since 1973.

Unfortunately the curtains the committee purchased with fundraising monies around 30 years ago had disintegrated beyond purpose and so were removed. Leaving the staff and children with a problem of having to move around the hall to escape direct sunlight when the sun moved around the hall during the day. The Preschool also had children who benefitted from sensory play and attempts to blacken the hall for some light play often failed. In addition, the lack of dressing around the windows lead to a problem with acoustics when trying to promote good pronunciation and settle new children.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, staff re-evaluated the environment and wanted to create a more homely, home-from-home environment and so did some decorating to achieve this.

Unfortunately the budget did not and would not stretch to blinds! Blinds had been on the wish list for quite a few years, but had kept being pushed back down the list due to urgent items of resources for the children. We applied for the grant and were lucky enough to be successful. This has now solved all the previously mentioned problems, and we are very grateful to have received the grant.




Ukraine2Felixstowe: Settling into life in Felixstowe



Felixstowe has become a place of safety for a number of Ukrainians fleeing the war in their homeland. About 40 Felixstowe residents have kindly provided accommodation

under the UK Government's 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme and their 'guests' are

embraced their new lives in the temporary homes. Despite some language issues, the majority of Ukranians have found work in various sectors from logistics through to hospitality and many are also volunteering within the community.





which includes the host households and many others have offered services and assistance including English language training. The result is that the refugees, many of whom are single women and children, have been able to settle in quickly. The continuous support from local organisations, individuals and businesses has been invaluable. The Felixstowe 'hosts' should be particularly proud of their contribution.

Although the sponsorship period under the scheme runs for between six and 12 months (maximum), Ukrainians have already started to consider their options. Clearly many are keen to return to their country as soon as it is safe but in the light of the ongoing atrocities and devastation, it is likely that further accommodation will be required on a temporary or permanent basis. There is ongoing work with the Council and private rental sector to ensure that these people, who have been through so much uncertainty, are able to source suitable housing whilst they rebuild their lives. Everyone would like to continue to express gratitude for the warm welcome and help they have received from the people of Felixstowe.

Martlesham Heath Aviation Society: The Development of Airborne Radar



We all know that Bawdsey Manor was the home



of, what was known as "chain home" radar. The ring of masts around the south and east coast of Britain, which was so successful in providing early warning of approaching

enemy aircraft in WW2.

Public interest in the rapid development of aviation between the wars was intense. The secret installation at Bawsdey Manor, across the river from Felixstowe was the cause of much intrigue. Perhaps the Bawdsey scientists were working on "death rays", or perhaps the powerful rays were capable of stopping aero engines?

Many family cars made the short journey from Felixstowe to Bawdsey Ferry to test out the theory that the beam from the impressive array of towers would affect their car engines. Indeed, my father took our Ford Eight down there himself. I am pleased to say he arrived back safely!

One of the scientists at Bawdsey manor was a young Keith Wood. Keith was to assist Dr EG (Taffy) Bowen. Together they would work on the early development of airborne radar.

Dr Taffy Bowen was aware of a forthcoming exercise in the North Sea, when a contingent of the British fleet would sail from south to north to test the effectiveness of the reconnaissance seaplanes at Felixstowe and other bases.


Dr Bowen was accompanied by Keith Wood in an Avro Anson from Martlesham in the summer of 1937. The success of this flight caused sensations at the Air Ministry when it was reported to them. The exercise had, in fact been called off due to the bad weather, but Dr Bowen was unaware of this because his was a completely unofficial enterprise.

The fleet were concerned. What was this invisible aeroplane in the clouds up to?

A good quality audio recording by Keith Wood is available on the web site of Martlesham Heath Aviation Society, www.mhas.org.uk under the "History" tab. Keith describes in detail, the outcome of the exercise. The first successful use of airborne radar.

Keith Wood lived at Felixstowe and a plaque in his memory is pictured.



We are lucky in having not just the river Deben, but also the waters around Felixstowe in which to row and occasionally have excursions to Woodbridge/Melton or Shingle Street."

Our gigs are fiberglass replicas of Cornish Pilot gigs, which have a Coxswain plus 6 rowers. The Changing World of Radio



Founded back in 2009, Felixstowe Radio is a community radio station. Broadcasting on 107.5fm and online, our broadcast area includes Felixstowe,

Shotley, Harwich, Dovercourt and the many villages reaching to Woodbridge and parts of Ipswich.

Our big team is made up totally of local people of all walks of life. Many have full-time jobs elsewhere, some combine radio with other part-time work. We also have students and retirees. All of us work for no reward, other than the joy of community radio. Over the years, our



have been in several locations. Currently our studio building is on the grounds of Felixstowe School.

Like everyone, Covid-19 and lockdown hit us hard. Restrictions on the numbers of people in the studio, alongside the natural nervousness of presenters. We carried on broadcasting throughout; as a broadcaster we were an essential service.

Luckily, for me, Felixstowe Radio initiated a way whereby I could broadcast from home, saving time as well as avoiding the virus. My lunchtime show went (temporarily) from 3 days a week to 5 days. I discovered a whole new way of working remotely. With not much more than two lap tops and a mixing desk, I was able to produce programmes from a spare bedroom.

Other presenters also grabbed the technology, and set up home studios. Working from home brought a whole new way of working. Creativity increased, new skills were learned and new presenters came on board.

Today, my temporary move form 3 days a week to 5, is now permanent. I have moved out of my spare bedroom and now, still at home, broadcast from a specially built outdoors studio in the garden. Radio technology has progressed in leaps and bounds. Hard-wired WiFi along with good microphones and audio equipment, home broadcasting is here to stay.

Meanwhile, Felixstowe Radio is still looking for more people to join us. If sitting behind a microphone doesn't do it for you, we have opportunities in many other roles. We are always looking for help with admin, production, advertising, technology, social media and much

Community Emergency Plan



The Community Emergency Plan (CEP) helps Felixstowe prepare for an emergency and reduce its impact. The CEP was put together with guidance from the FELIXSTOWE District Council's Emergency [⊩] Planning Officer by Council's

CEP Working Group, who meet regularly to keep the document up to date.

The CEP was created in order to provide a practical approach to effectively support the community in the event of an emergency in Felixstowe. The plan takes a strategic approach, supporting the coordination of information and local resources that may be useful in an emergency situation; whilst acknowledging that an emergency of any

significant scale would elicit a wider response from the emergency services and other agencies.

It has been prepared with the help from many local community groups and organisations. Felixstowe Town Council will take the lead in overseeing the Plan's use in an emergency so anyone in the community can get involved.

The CEP is the focus of the community's actions to become better prepared and details the steps the community will take before, during and after an emergency incident. The Plan helps Council to identify:

- What resources we have in the community, such as 4×4 vehicles, people with useful skills and local knowledge;
- Where to go to if there is an immediate need to evacuate and take shelter;
- How to mobilise those resources and who to

If your organisation is located in Felixstowe and has a resource that would be useful in an event of an emergency, please do not hesitate to contact enquiries@felixstowe.gov.uk for further information.

The published CEP can be found on our website felixstowe.gov.uk/council-services/emergencyplan/. This version is especially for public view, as some of the information – such as contact details for volunteers and local resources - has been redacted and will remain confidential.

The overall aim of the CEP is, where possible, to help reduce the risk of harm to persons and damage to property within the community. The CEP has been produced with some specific emergency incidents in mind, such as; flooding, snow or fire but is also designed for any general emergency in Felixstowe.



the pitches back in to full use following an uncertain period during the pandemic.



In July we welcomed the Suffolk Refugee Support (SRS) Service in Suffolk at one of our speaker evenings. Rebecca Crerar, Charity Manager, gave an overview of the extensive work of the SRS. It was hard to hear her story and to see her photos – typical of any 24-yearold, except the one of her wrapped up, with a bag in hand, and a closed door behind her, as she left her flat, to make the difficult 92-hour journey to safety. She has arrived via the Homes for Ukrainians scheme and is living in Ipswich. Elizabeth is pleased to be working at SRS as an English Teacher. We will be supporting the SRS with a donation.

11th September 1918 to 29th July 2022

Joan S. I. Rich, nee Ashford, died on 29th July 2022, in her own home, with her daughter Diane by her side.

According to Joan's wishes, her funeral was a low key, close family event. It took place on 11th August, exactly one month before her 104th birthday, attended by her two daughters and three grandchildren.

Some Felixstowe residents may have known Joan's two sons, David Rich, killed in 1978 aged 21, hitching to Scotland, and her eldest son, Douglas Rich who ended his own life eight years later. Heartbroken, Joan would say, 'If you reach rock bottom, look around you. There will be someone, not far away, who needs your help. If all you can manage is a smile, then give it. It could change their day- maybe their life. Keep polishing that smile and aim to improve the lives of those who need help: help that can come from you.'

To many in Felixstowe Joan will be remembered for her work at Felixstowe General Hospital in the 1960s and 70s, her twenty-five years of voluntary work for Mencap, and in 2020, for her 102 laps of Allenby Park, ending on her 102nd birthday and raising £35,000 for NHS charities.
