

Welcome from the Mayor

Spring greetings fellow-Felix citizens. I'm writing this on 1 March, the start of meteorological spring, which sounds promising but early March always feels pretty wintry – especially in the sea, still just 7C!

Firstly, I'd like to thank everyone who attended the first consultation event for the North Felixstowe Garden Neighbourhood in early Feb, and encourage residents, of all ages, to engage with this process. I want to reassure you that this is a genuine consultation: how this development proceeds is not set in stone and we must make it work for the town, its current and future citizens and our environment.

In January I visited our German twin town Wesel for the second time, running their half-marathon (quite slowly)

and 'helping' plant trees to mark our five decades of partnership. Watch out for the weekend of 20 April, when we'll welcome around 100 Weselers to celebrate 50 years of twinning. It'll be an honour to be the Mayor to reenact the original 1974 signing ceremony.

Also in April, myself and Deputy Mayor, Cllr Deacon, are invited to visit our other twin town, Salzwedel, in eastern Germany, aiming to rekindle this partnership of 30 years. I feel that our overseas twinning relationships can enrich all our lives, foster understanding and forge links, and that the time is right to re-energise these connections, involving more people and groups from across our community.

In terms of Civic / Mayor's Charity events, do come along to the Mayor's Spring concert 15 March 7pm at Felixstowe School – £8 on the door. On Easter Monday morning Coast Patrol will be doing a sponsored boat pull along the prom, culminating with a charity dip in the sea by Felixstowe Swimscapes. April 11 sees the Mayor's Spring Fashion

Show at St John's church, featuring many local businesses and a performance by the wonderful Christina Johnston - this will be a special event, not to miss, tickets £14.50 from Coes & the Factory Shop. And to round off the year in style, the Mayor's Ball, with an easy seaside theme, is at Harvest House 11 May.

There have been excellent events recently, raising significant sums for the Mayor's charities: a packed Curry Night at the Bombay Nite and a record-breaking quiz night organised by Coastwatch, raising a whopping £1600. Our Town Hall Taverners team came an honourable 8th of 27 teams - one question I was hoping would be asked was 'What is the most westerly point of mainland Wales?' – answer: St David's. I know this because from 26-30 April I'll be cycling the 400

miles home from there with a team of Felixstowe friends (and a tailwind:) raising

charity funds and awareness of the benefits of riding a bike! And there's the Annual Town Meeting and Civic Awards on Wednesday 8 May 7pm at Felixstowe School – ALL invited.

So it's going to be a full-on run-in to this amazing year as Mayor. Some of my born-in-the-60's friends talk about retiring, but I've literally never been busier, or more connected with so many aspects of our great town, whose

best years I believe are still ahead. From the first donning of the Chain with my mum in the chamber, to raising the Pride and Ukrainian flags, the Civic Service congregation including 18 mayors, singing out Sunshine on Leith at St John's, to leading the carnival procession down a packed Hamilton Road, to making a seaward speech to hundreds at Suffolk Remembers and laying the Town's wreath at the War Memorial. Not to mention turning on the Lions' magnificent festive lights and dancing and singing with care home staff and residents. At the other end of the age range, visits to Langer and Grange schools were real highlights. Pleased to report I also successfully cut several ribbons, from the new TIC Hut to Poundstretcher. So, thank you for so much support and, can I say, love, over this unforgettable year, especially to Ash, Sue and all the brilliant Town Hall staff, as well as my four great charities. I'll continue to put positivity, pride and fairness to the fore and work just as hard for our fine, thriving town.

A Big Year for Boost



2024 is a big year for Boost, as we celebrate an important milestone and create new opportunities too.

Later this year, we'll be celebrating ten years of chaplaincy at Felixstowe School. When we launched this partnership in 2014, it was incredibly rare to see chaplaincy in education (outside of independent and

church schools). Over the past decade, we've created a service which helps to support students and staff and provides a range of safe places and enriching opportunities throughout the school day. This academic year alone, we've worked with over 100 students, providing specialist support, the most frequently requested of which is our bereavement support. This helps young people to navigate all the emotions and feelings which occur after the death of someone close to them.

The Garden Project continues to 'grow', with record numbers of students attending, and being utilised not just at lunch times, but during Enrichment Days and in small group sessions to engage young people in nature and outdoor learning. This month, the Garden is one of the projects supported by the 'Blue Token' in Tesco stores. By placing a blue token in the Garden Project box at Martlesham, Kesgrave, Ipswich (Tavern Street) and Felixstowe stores, you could help us receive up to £1,500 this spring.

As well as celebrating a milestone, we're also creating something new. Earlier this month we announced a new partnership with the Federation of Fairfield and Colneis, as we provide chaplaincy to children and staff at Colneis over three lunchtimes per week. Our new volunteer, Julie, has really enjoyed meeting so many new faces, and getting to know the school community.

Boost is grateful to be one of the Mayor's charities this year, and we're looking forward to the Mayor's Spring Concert on Friday 15 March, 7pm at Felixstowe School. This will be a brilliant evening of musical performances, featuring the Ipswich Hospital Band, and Felixstowe School's Landguard Band. Tickets are available from the St Peter's by the Waterfront website-£8 per adult, with under 18's going free. Recruitment Drive at Felixstowe Coastwatch



Felixstowe Coastwatch is undertaking a recruitment drive to bring onboard more volunteer watchkeepers. New trainees are welcome and the first step is to arrange to come to the lookout building which sits on the top of Martello Tower P on Wireless Green, off

Langer Road. You'll

have a short taster session to see first-hand what being a watchkeeper entails. After that we ask you to do a couple of observation watches before submitting an application if you wish to continue.



The lookout is equipped with

binoculars, marine VHF radios, CCTV, navigational charts and radar scanners. It is manned by uniformed volunteers from all walks of life during daylight hours 365 days a year. They are the eyes and ears for HM Coastguard from Felixstowe Ferry to Landguard Point. Watchkeepers monitor all activity including swimmers, windsurfers, kitesurfers, paddleboarders, yachts and other craft. Everyone undergoes a comprehensive training schedule over a period of at least six-months and the role is rewarding, interesting and enjoyable.

Although Coast Patrol was not patrolling over the winter we have been busy preparing for our new season.

Our crews have been training at our base and on the water.

Winter is also a time for maintenance; we found that our boat trailer needed some TLC. We are also upgrading Last Orders to improve our towing

ability and improving the Marine Radio Antennas.

Our crew have also been looked after, New Dry suits and we have supplied new working boots to all our active crew.

We are installing a new Crew communication system to improve coordination while responding to casualties. Our Shore support teams will also be able to keep in touch if required.

Occasionally get asked to help a family with a request to scatter a loved one's ashes.

We were privileged recently to provide this service to a wonderful local family.

We also get asked to give talks to local groups to explain what we do and spread to word on water safety. Two of us attended the Woodbridge Cruising Club recently where we were warmly welcomed and made some new friends.

The calendar is filling up with requests to visit schools and local groups and we are extremely grateful to have been offered a pitch at this year's Suffolk Show. If you are attending the show we will be in the Emergency Services Area. Come and see us and our boat Last Orders and join in with the Shotley Wailers with some Sea Shanties.

This year marks the 15th anniversary of Felixstowe becoming a Fairtrade Town. It is also the 30th anniversary of the Fairtrade mark.

The fact that Felixstowe is a Fairtrade Town is proudly displayed on the welcome signs at the three main entrances to Felixstowe. It is largely thanks to the late Graham Newman, the Town Council representative on the Felixstowe Fairtrade Forum, that the signs were erected.

Graham was a big supporter of Fairtrade in the town and we will always be grateful for his support in this and other ways.

Sadly time and weather had made the signs rather grubby – particularly on the Candlet Rd approach, where most visitors arrive. So we decided to do something about it. The photo shows Forum member Brian Cutler at work on the sign with sponge and soap, which has brought it up nice and shining again. (Unfortunately Brian couldn't quite reach the rest of the welcome sign.)

The designation of 'Fairtrade Town' is earned through support from local councils, businesses, churches, schools, voluntary organisations and individuals. Felixstowe's Fairtrade status was renewed in 2023. Supporting Fairtrade ensures that farmers and producers in the developing world get a fair price for their labour and Felixstowe is proud to be doing its bit to promote this in Suffolk.

Felixstowe Men's Shed



We continue to support local groups and charities - our recent projects include refurbishment of the Orwell school lectern for the Felixstowe Society, a pair of sensory boards for the Level Two Youth project, a mudpit for Felixstowe SET primary school to complement the mud kitchen we made for them earlier and a wishing well for Merryfields care home.

Members' own projects range from small crank organs, model boats, walking sticks, furniture refurbishment and turned bowls to motorbike repairs. We make and repurpose items for the Shed itself such as benches and purpose-built storage.

Two committee members attended the annual Suffolk Shedfest, a chance to meet members of other Sheds, share knowledge and learn about the growth of Sheds in the county. It was very beneficial with presentations on Shed ways of working and benefits.

We meet from 10-1pm on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays, Saturdays from 9-noon. You must be over 18 years of age and we accept any gender.

This year is a milestone year for the Felixstowe Wesel Association. Abbey Grove, Felixstowe's Millennium Woodland



Abbey Grove was planted as a native broadleaved woodland by the local community in December 1998 as part of The Woodland Trust's Woods on your Doorstep project.

The design of the ten acre woodland incorporates an area of hazel coppice as a site feature and a small meadow to increase visitor enjoyment and habitat diversity.

The tree species which were planted include common ash, pedunculate oak sweet chestnut, field maple, wild cherry, hazel, hawthorn and blackthorn. There is a wide array of wildlife including 12 species of butterfly, many bird species, field vole, harvest mice, shrew and woodmice. Woodland plants such as wood anemone, wild garlic, green alkanet, lords and ladies, bluebell and sorrel thrive. The wildflower meadow redeveloping well.



The site abuts an area of existing secondary woodland known as the Grove which is owned by East Suffolk Council and which is much used by the public.

In 2001 the local community approached the Woodland Trust to create a volunteer group to aid the management of the site. This has developed in to a vibrant active community group which now undertakes all basic management within the wood. Public access is available with rides crossing and circulating the site and formal entrances have been created from the highway and through the Grove.

The volunteer work party meets on Tuesday mornings from September to April, we leave the woodland to the wildlife throughout the spring and summer.

It is a beautiful place to visit at any time of the year. Park in the Eastward Ho carpark and the entrance to Abbey Grove is behind the Grove Medical Centre.

The FCPG, Felixstowe Country Park Group, are working with the council to expand the woodlands in Felixstowe. If you would like to find out more about our ideas email contact@felixstowecountrypark.co.uk.

Give The Birds A Chance – Changes at Landguard Nature Reserve

It's been a tough time for wildlife, and on the Landguard Nature Reserve, at Felixstowe in Suffolk, especially so for the Ringed Plover. So, this year some changes will be made to give them a better chance.



Ringed Plover breed at Landguard and choose their nesting sites on the

ground amongst the rare, vegetated shingle habitat. They are very sensitive to disturbance, including from people, kites, drones and especially dogs. They scrape shallow depressions in the shingle and lay their eggs directly on to the ground. Their eggs are very small and perfectly blend into the shingle environment making them very difficult to see.

Cordons reduce the likelihood of disturbance and trampling around their nest sites however the Ringed Plover is a wading bird that needs to feed on the beach, where they continue to be disturbed, and where the chicks as they get older and need to feed for themselves are at their most vulnerable. This is why between the nesting season from 1st April to 30th September dogs will not be allowed on the beach on the southern section of the nature reserve, on or off lead. Also fishing during this period should not take place in front of cordons as it also causes disturbance and attracts predators. This area will be clearly signposted and regularly patrolled.

Dogs will continue to be allowed to exercise on or off lead on the northern section of the nature reserve, including the beaches, and can be walked on lead to the landward side of the cordons. Fishing can take place on the northern section and along the river. Ringed Plover are an iconic species here at Landguard, and although very much loved by visitors are becoming a less common sight. We hope with the public's help and consideration they continue to successfully breed here for many years to come.

Ringed Plover are protected by the Wildlife & Countryside Act 1981 and are a Red list species, due to their declining population and are therefore a conservation priority. 
I'm taking early retirement in April but I'll still be beachcombing for me, so all the very best and see you on the beach!



Sometimes groups might choose to go out on a trip, explore the local community, or use the meetings for something like training.



Getting Active with ActivLives



ActivLives is a local charity, which has been ActivLives working in Ipswich and across East Suffolk for 17 years. We provide a wide range of stimulating and fun activities for people

aged 50 years plus, including people with disability, adults with anxiety and depression, people living with Dementia and their carers and inclusive sport and horticultural opportunities for younger people with mental health and young adults with intellectual disability, working in partnership with local schools, colleges and other agencies.



The main aim of ActivLives is to support and motivate people to increase movement and improve their physical, mental and emotional health and general well-being; keep people connected with their communities to reduce social isolation and loneliness and provide access to learning, training and volunteering opportunities to enable people to gain skills and employment.

In Felixstowe at the Old Felixstowe Community Centre on a Wednesday we currently deliver a seated exercise / dance

session for older adults with poor mobility followed by a Better Balance Session to build people's strength, balance, co-ordination and confidence, particularly for those who may have had a fall or who are high risk of falling. On Mondays at the Felixstowe Leisure Centre you can have a game of New Age Kurling, which can be adapted for any ability, it's fun, competitive and a very social activity and on Saturday's at Walton Community Hall you can have a game of Kurling and the paralympic sport Boccia.

You can also find Better Balance Sessions at community venues in Martlesham, Woodbridge, Leiston and Saxmundham.

New groups are currently being developed called BreatheFit, to support people with respiratory health conditions such as COPD, Lung Disease, Asthma and Long Covid. The sessions help to increase energy, help improve breathing and build strength and confidence and there is always time for a chat and coffee at the end of the session. There is a BreatheFit group at the Waterloo Centre in Leiston on a Wednesday afternoon and a new session will be opening soon at the Grove Surgery in Felixstowe.

If you like singing with others then why not join our ActivSinging group which meets twice a month at the Quay Church in Woodbridge or if you like dancing $then \, the \, Keep \, on \, Grooving \, session \, is \, just \, for \, you, \, adapted \, for \, different \,$ abilities so you can dance seated or standing or both. This session is held monthly at the Woodbridge Community Centre on a Friday afternoon.

If you are 50 plus and an unpaid carer or former carer and you need support with caring for your partner, family member or neighbour or you are moving on from caring then the new Carers Project - ICare Connect, may be able to help you.

In a thrilling showcase of skill and determination, three students from Felixstowe have punched their tickets to the upcoming British Judo Regional



Felixstowe Road Runners Goes Greener



Members of Felixstowe Road Runners have been thinking about their sport and how we can all be a bit greener, having been involved in an England Athletics consultation looking at the issues surrounding our sport.

90% of the environmental impact of participation in races, events and training comes from the fuel used in getting to and from venues. Club members are now making a determined effort to share lifts if they can't walk, cycle, or take public transport to races around the county, to parkrun and to weekly training sessions.



In terms of equipment, we have recognised the significant impact on the environment of the manufacture of running shoes and their potential disposal in landfill. FRR members are looking

to extend the lives of their current running shoes well beyond the 400 miles suggested by manufacturers, recognising that this is a marketing ploy rather than based on reality. Shoes which are no longer wanted but are still perfectly usable can now be sent on for distribution to disadvantaged runners and those shoes beyond further use can be dismantled and reusable materials removed and used again. Our club is looking to work with such a company to collect in bulk to reduce the impact of transporting shoes for recycling.

Medals and t-shirts, which are awarded to participants in many races, have also been considered as their manufacture and shipping have an impact on the environment but there are many runners who find these prizes inspiring and useful. There are FRR members who now regularly opt to turn down the offer of a material reward for their race participation.

Landguard Fort opens for the 2024 season on Thursday 28th March, from Thursday to Sunday during term-time and every day during school holidays.

When visiting Landguard you'll discover the dramatic story of the fortifications that played a pivotal role in the defence of the east coast for over 400 years. Where the

last opposed seaborne invasion of England, by the Dutch, in 1667 and the first land battle of the Royal Marines happened. The current building at Landguard is Grade 1 listed and dates back to the 1740's and has been modified over time to reflect changes in coastal defence strategy and developments in engineering and weaponry. Substantial additions were made in the late 19th and early 20th centuries during 2 world wars and even as late as the 1950 in response to the tensions of the cold war.

During the weekend of 13th & 14th April, the 1st 95th Rifles will once again be at Landguard Fort, stepping back in time and re-enacting the drills, training and battle tactics honed on the Napoleonic battlefields during the period from 1803 to 1815. Event launches Engagement Programme for North Felixstowe Neighbourhood

A public meeting to officially launch the start of a programme of engagement for the master planning process for a new garden neighbourhood to the north of Felixstowe took place earlier this month.



More than 350 people gathered at the Orwell Hotel to hear from East Suffolk Council and others about how master-planning the development of approximately 143 hectares will ensure the new neighbourhood will be leisure-led, sustainable and sympathetic to the environment.

James Goldberg, Development Enabling Lead at East Suffolk introduced the session, explaining how the need for the development was identified in the Local Plan and brought everyone up to date with progress so far. He was joined by colleague Tim Snook, who spoke about the proposed new sports and leisure centre. Speakers from the NHS and Suffolk County Council's education team were also present to address the meeting and answer questions.

The event officially launched a period of consultation which will include the formation of a Citizens' Panel, engagement with young people and continuing work with a stakeholder forum. Further public workshops are planned and these will address areas such as nature recovery, affordable housing, arts and culture, food resilience, as well as sport and recreation.

James Goldberg said: "It was good to see so many people on the day and to meet and talk with residents about their hopes, and fears, surrounding the project. It is crucial we listen and take on board these comments and ensure that we deliver the right results for this exciting project."
