Felixstowe Fairtrade Forum

Not long after our final event at St John's Church on 7 March came lockdown and, as with others, most of our activities ground to a halt. We managed to distribute most of the Fairtrade footballs to schools but

some remain to be presented later in the year when things (hopefully) return to

Some of you will remember Patrick Kaberia, a Fairtrade farmer from Kenya, who launched his promotional tour of Suffolk for Fairtrade at Felixstowe Town Hall in February 2016. He made a big impression on many throughout Suffolk and was the inspiration for the formation of the Suffolk Association of Fairtrade Towns (SAFT) to which all eight Fairtrade Towns in Suffolk belong. Patrick is our patron and we keep in regular touch with him. Each year we hold a conference at different venues in Suffolk where we meet, exchange ideas and listen to a guest speaker on aspects of Fairtrade. Sadly, this year's conference, which was to have taken place in Beccles, has had to be cancelled.

Covid 19 is, of course, affecting all corners of the globe and Kenya is no exception. Apart from the direct consequences of the virus there are worries about the economic impacts on communities, such as Patrick's, which do not have the resilience to cope with major reductions in income. For them, stopping the spread of the virus is doubly important and Patrick has a key role in educating his fellow workers about the need for good hygiene and social distancing.



When, eventually, we emerge from the current crisis there will be a lot of rebuilding to do. The Fairtrade movement will have a key role in ensuring that the needs of poorer communities in developing countries are not overlooked in this process. Meanwhile, if you are able, continue to support communities like Patrick's by buying goods with the Fairtrade logo. Felixstowe Helping Hands

Recent weeks have been very difficult for everyone but particularly those who were asked to shield, unable to leave their own homes. Ten days before Lockdown, local Town Councillor, Darren Aitchison set up a Facebook group anticipating that a community response would be needed across Felixstowe to help people. With the help of Debbie Bartlett and Leanne Bucknall, Felixstowe Helping Hands was formed. The aim was not to provide a 'charity' response but to offer general assistance, in whatever form, to anybody who required it.

From the start, it was important to consider the needs of the elderly and vulnerable who were unable to go out, many of whom may not have internet access. The first task was to produce a postcard with the Felixstowe Helping Hands contact details so everyone had a number to call if they needed assistance. A few days before the Government announced Lockdown, over 120 volunteers spontaneously turned up at Great Eastern Square to collect and hand-deliver over 14,000 cards throughout Felixstowe, the Trimleys, Walton and Kirton in an amazing logistics exercise.

By the third week of March, the hard work really took off - the Felixstowe Helping Hands central phone number didn't stop ringing as requests for assistance with shopping, dog walking, prescriptions etc flooded in. A small army of nearly 3000 volunteers responded offering help and were matched with people in their immediate area in line with Government guidelines. Everyone has responded with enthusiasm, energy and good humour – sometimes shopping for several people, keeping track of all the individual receipts and delivering to multiple households has been extremely challenging! The prescription service has been vital and one of those particularly grateful is Phil Wix who writes 'Suffering from COPD, I found myself unable to collect my medications but thanks to all of these brave souls, I didn't have to put myself at grave risk – I cannot thank Felixstowe Helping Hands enough for the kindness shown to vulnerable people such as myself'.

Over time, systems have been developed for remote cashless, payment through Belinda Jarvis and the central team has quickly grown to include the dedicated 'Triage' group including Kathy Lukehurst, Becky Crevald, Maryann Byrne, Amanda Harrold, Jax Blunt, Jac Cumisky, Lesley Coom, who regularly take turns to match volunteers to the needs from early morning until late into the night, 7 days a week. They have dealt with several emergencies; many difficult challenges and some very odd and unusual requests for help!

Felixstowe Helping Hands has also been particularly proud of developing the Phone Friends service by ensuring those isolating feel less alone by providing a volunteer to check on them. Great friendships have been forged remotely and many are excited about, one day, being able to meet those who have taken time to think of their neighbours by providing a friendly, reassuring voice.



Felixstowe Men's Shed Coping in Lockdown



Like many organisations Felixstowe Men's Shed (FMS) has suffered as a result of lockdown. With the workshop shut as it is within the Felixstowe Museum and would be impossible to operate with the two-metre rule. How have we coped? We communicate with members by email on a regular basis and have our own Facebook page. As we move forward, we have taken up the web hosting scheme with One Suffolk and will be going live in the next few weeks with our own website as our webmaster fills the various pages including a gallery of past projects.

Our membership member Peter hosts the weekly Zoom meeting. Peter visits other shed open Zoom meetings and is able to inform us of the various news from away.

One initiative that has continued to flourish is the Sanctuary Housing Greenhouse project. Last year FMS purchased a second-hand aluminium greenhouse and donated it to Sanctuary Housing that helps young people in need of accommodation between the ages of 16 and 21. We have followed up with the supply of some plants and some residents have taken an active participation in raising tomatoes and other plants. During lockdown we have been dropping off plants to be brought on in the greenhouse. The funds to purchase the greenhouse were raised with a garage sale on Trimley High Road last year.

We were given the go ahead to start playing golf again in mid- May and our members were chomping at the bit to get going again. We had to put a lot of safety measures in place but luckily golf is a sport where socially distancing can be fairly easily achieved (especially if you have a bad slice or hook shot going on!) and we introduced two ball only play at 10 minute intervals. We had to put in place an on line booking system which the club had not used before and the members settled into this routine very well. After some weeks we were allowed to introduce four ball play and could have visitors. Both of our courses have been very busy ever since.

The weather has of course played a huge part and the fact that a lot of people were furloughed from their jobs meant they had time on their hands. Our Kingsfleet pay and play course has certainly benefitted from the online booking system and our members are also able to book the driving range which regularly gets cleaned after each use. Juniors have also found something outside in the fresh air to keep them occupied. It has been lovely to see families out playing. Golf is definitely a game for all ages to share and with the handicap system, it becomes fair!

Both courses benefitted from not being used at all while were closed and our two sole greenkeepers at the time did a fantastic job keeping on top of basic maintenance and members and visitors have regularly commented on how amazing the courses look now. Of course the green keepers would now like to see some rain but we are not sure when that will arrive!

During lockdown we started a meal delivery service, originally for members but soon turned into a local community service. This was run totally by volunteers (except for our wonderful Chef Gavin!) and we are going to continue this service. Friday fish and chips and Sunday roast dinners are especially popular and very reasonably priced. We have met some lovely people, at a distance of course, and were pleased to be able to help when many other takeaways had closed their doors. We cook fish and chips everyday (they are the best in town!) and would welcome beach hut owners or any visitor to collect from us if they have phoned through their order the day before.

Businesses in all areas have had to change and diversify over the past few months and we are no different. Health should always be everyone's main priority because without that we would not be able to enjoy a game of golf or sit in the sunshine. Play Safe and Stay Safe has been our motto and will continue to be so.

Community Grants

In these uncertain times, we know that the Council can make a difference through our grants process so we have launched a streamlined grant application process to enable community organisations and charities to get a quick decision on funding in particular for Coronavirus related emergency funding. There was a total of £25,000 available this year and Felixstowe Town Council have awarded £9,481 since the fund was launched on 1 April, with £15,518 still available to apply for.


What more could you want to add to a light lunch;- lettuces and radishes full of Vitamin C, picked and on the table within an hour or two.


DID you know

Have you heard of Civil Parking Enforcement?

Suffolk County Council has delegated 'functions' to East Suffolk Council enabling it to administer Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE) on SCC's behalf in East Suffolk. The CPE service includes:

- the patrolling of on-street regulations serving Penalty Charge Notices (PCNs) where necessary in order to encourage driver compliance of regulations; and
- the processing of PCNs in accordance with the statutory process which includes the consideration of 'appeals' and the collection of penalty charges and road traffic debt.

Many drivers follow the rules and highway laws set out in the Department for Transport's publications of The Highway Code; Know your traffic signs and where applicable the Blue Badge scheme: rights and responsibilities in England booklet, but those who do not, risk receiving a PCN.

Parking places

The Council provides many off-street parking places in Felixstowe so those choosing to drive may park appropriately once at their destination. The most convenient ways to find these parking places are via Find my nearest and the Council's RingGo parking service. The RingGo app allows drivers to locate a parking place before leaving, receive navigation to it, pay for their parking session and even extend it should they need to. Registering for the service is easy, but you can watch a video for 'how it works' before you register.

Many of the parking places have public conveniences in or adjacent them, and some have small glass and textile recycling points.

COVID-19 Business Grants

East Suffolk Council recognises the unprecedented disruption caused by the COVID-19 outbreak and are currently processing a range of grants provided by the government for local businesses. These are:

- Small Business Grant Fund a grant of £10,000 for all businesses in receipt of Small Business Rates Relief and Rural Rate Relief who have a rateable value of under £15,000 (subject to eligibility criteria)
- Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Grant a grant of £25,000 covering businesses in receipt of the Expanded Retail Discount who have with a rateable value between £15,001 and £51,000 (subject to eligibility criteria)
- Discretionary Grant a grant of up to £10,000 for certain small businesses previously outside the scope of the above business grant funds scheme (subject to eligibility criteria)

Felixstowe Seafront Gardens

Look out for new signage for the Felixstowe Seafront Gardens ponds. These provide great habitats for wildlife including established colonies of newts. Elsewhere in the Gardens take some time to sit quietly and watch the warm sunny rocks – you may catch a glimpse of the Wall Lizard. Native to the Channel Islands, the Wall Lizard gets its name from its preferred habitat of walls, rocks, and boulders. It can be found in a number of sites in Southern England where it is technically a non-native species, having been introduced or escaped into the wild.

The 'Alleyway'

A well-used, but unadopted, alleyway in Felixstowe has been cleared to ensure it remains safe for people to use as a cut-through to the town's high street. The alleyway, which runs from Hamilton Road to the Library, has long been used as a cut-through to the town's high street but was becoming unsafe due to fly-tipped waste and weeds. As a result, East Suffolk Council and Felixstowe Town Council worked together to ensure the site was cleared of rubbish and obstructions by East Suffolk Norse, so that it remains safe to use as more shops are starting to reopen in line with the Government's guidelines.

The exact ownership of the site is unknown, so all three councils are working together to gain more information about the site before considering what options might be available to enhance the area in the future. In the meantime, the Council is keen to hear from anyone who has any information about the alleyway, such as how long it is has been there and any old photographs. Re-Opening Safely in Felixstowe

Felixstowe Town Council is pleased to announce plans for the re-opening of the town in the weeks and months ahead as lockdown restrictions are expected to continue to ease.

These changes will help people stay safe by following guidance on social distancing and other public safety measures.

We will be pleased to see familiar doors opening for business once again and encourage our residents to show their support by buying locally. We will be introducing several changes in the Felixstowe Town Centre. The Hamilton Road Shared Space will be made pedestrian friendly with traffic restrictions in place everyday 10am - 4pm from 4th July, to assist people to observe social distancing rules and our businesses to trade effectively. Deliveries will have access outside these times and emergency vehicles will always have access. Blue badge parking will remain available nearby on Cobbold Road and other locations.

Other plans include signage to help direct safe shopping and movement in key locations. Public conveniences will remain open with appropriate facilities, information, and government guidelines on hand washing.

Businesses will be implementing their own arrangements for protecting staff and customers. Visitors to Felixstowe are encouraged to cycle, walk, or if arriving by car visitors are encouraged to park in the nearest available car park as there will be restricted on street parking availability.

East Suffolk Council is overseeing local actions, which are being supported by Suffolk County Council Highways and East Suffolk Norse.

"We are supporting a range of measures across the district and working with partners to ensure our towns can reopen and trade safely. The most important thing is we work together to keep ourselves and each other safe while out and about enjoying our lovely towns as they re-open for business".

Other measures include a focus on litter and street cleansing with everyone being encouraged to play their part in keeping the town and beach litter-free and clean.

As cafes and restaurants open, we are looking at how we can make better use of outdoor spaces to maximise opportunities for them to trade profitably and maintain safe social distancing measures for customers.

Felixstowe Town Council will continue to work with businesses and stakeholders to review and adapt measures as appropriate.



New Café for South Seafront



Work on a new café/restaurant in the heart of Felixstowe's South Seafront is set to start later this summer – bringing a new exciting resort experience to the area.

East Suffolk Council have commissioned Barnes Construction, a local building company, to start work on the new landmark building, which will house the café/restaurant, offering indoor and outdoor dining with unspoilt views of the sea. The work is estimated to start in August and complete in summer 2021. Meanwhile, the Dedham Boathouse Group has been selected as the operator following a competitive process and will take on the running of the new eatery once it is ready to open.



Pardon the weeds, we're feeding the bees!

Non-essential grounds maintenance, including grass cutting, was temporarily suspended in April to ensure the safety of staff and the public. During this time, only grassed areas which presented a safety, visibility or access issue were cut. Some of the areas where grass was left to grow longer over the past two months have started to 're-wild', with anecdotal examples of increases in insect and pollinator levels, and an increase in the numbers of wildflowers.

Forty of these areas across East Suffolk are now being managed as 'wild spaces', where grass will be left to grow longer and wildflowers will be planted to help wildlife to thrive. Level Two Youth Project



Level Two Youth Project continues to support children, young people & families in Felixstowe & surrounding villages. Regular deliveries of free lunches & schoolwork packs, as well as activities & online group chats. They are also providing useful information & resources to support the mental health of whole families.

More than 40 young people receive weekly one-to-one mentoring or counselling via Skype, WhatsApp video, or phone calls.

In addition, Youth Workers are keeping in touch with families by phone, offering a listening ear & sign-posting to other community support schemes.

Continued support from our funders, means that we can still provide a service, even though we have had to close our Youth Hub during the Lockdown. While the new ways of working are not without their challenge, our team of Youth Workers have adapted & risen to the challenges the current situation has inflicted on them & on the children, young people and families we are supporting.

New online (WhatsApp) group chats set up & overseen by staff are proving particularly popular with the youngsters. Different members of staff, set daily quizzes or activities to boost the morale, confidence & selfesteem of the youngsters who join in.

Level Two's efforts to continue supporting young people during the Lockdown have been recognised & won praise from school governors & town councillors, with one school governor saying "we really welcome the way Level Two is supporting and helping our pupils during the

Felixstowe Relief Charity



The aim of Felixstowe Relief Charity is to support people in need in Felixstowe as well as to support people who are supporting others. There are six Trustees including Councillors Darren Aitchison, Mark Jepson and Margaret Morris.

At this time our support is particularly focussed on those who are impacted by Covid-19. To this end Felixstowe Town Council agreed to donate £10,000 to the Charity. Our first grant was for purchasing 3D printers to make face masks to distribute to doctors and surgeries in Felixstowe, carers in our care homes and to Ipswich Hospital. Each visor frame takes around 1 hour 30 minutes to print. With all the problems with delivery of PPE this was particularly important. They have subsequently received a further grant.

Another grant was to provide materials for making sets of scrubs (clothing) for local practitioners.

In addition, the focus on Covid-19 supports people who are unable to get out to do shopping and also unable to get to a bank or don't have online banking. We have carried this out by supporting two Felixstowe organisations. Their volunteers do the shopping for people who are unable to get out or have no-one to do shopping for them. Felixstowe Relief Charity then



reimburses the volunteer - which gives time for people who needed the shopping to make the reimbursement. Repayment of shopping received at a later date is being returned to Felixstowe Relief Charity.

More generally, the Felixstowe Relief Charity is able 'to award grants to provide relief to beneficiaries in need' (people who have been resident in Felixstowe for at least 3 years). Spotlight on Shaun

Town Council Apprentice



After spending my childhood in the United States, it was wonderful to return to my mother's hometown of sunny Felixstowe. I had visited Felixstowe on a few occasions. but I'd never dreamed I'd one day work in The Town Hall! Throughout my two-year apprenticeship, I've learned a lot about many different aspects of local governance: financial transactions, allotment & cemetery functions, as well as assisted the general public with a wide array of enquiries. I've also helped with many important civic events. Whether it was creating and

operating a presentation celebrating Cllr Graham Newman's mayoral year, or designing certificates for excited schoolchildren to receive at the annual Felixstowe in Flower awards ceremony, this apprenticeship has provided me with many opportunities to use my technical skills in an enjoyable way.

When it comes to moments I'm proud of, I think of my participation in 2018's Remembrance Day commemoration. On that solemn evening, I and many other volunteers stood in formation with lit torches that represented the lives cut short in WWI. Extinguishing that torch definitely wasn't what I envisioned myself doing as part of an 8-4 office job, but is an example of my newfound links to the community.

This apprenticeship has been a valuable learning experience overall, attending a variety of helpful training courses, and working alongside a very supportive team of co-workers and councillors. My two-year apprenticeship will be over in just a few weeks, but I have every intention of continuing to work for the council, and serve the people of Felixstowe to the best of my ability.

Walton Parish Nursing



During this lockdown period the Walton Parish Nursing team have to work in a different way. Although this is not ideal, our main focus is to keep our clients, our volunteers and ourselves safe. In order to do this we took the decision to only have face to face contact if absolutely necessary and then to take the best precautionary measures we could to avoid spreading Covid-19.

For Lorna and John, as Parish Nurses, each day has brought its challenges and tasks including many phone calls, emails and texts. As the weeks have gone on the needs have increased, as predicted.

We give the clients time to talk to hopefully reduce their anxiety and loneliness. The importance of hearing the voice of another human being cannot be underestimated and many have told us how much they appreciate this. They have shared the struggles they are having but also the positive ways in which they are approaching this challenge.

There have been trips to the outpatient department at Ipswich hospital with clients, and several trips to the shops and GP surgeries to assist with medication and essentials. Occasionally there has been a need to talk to clients from their front gardens or assist inside using PPE.

Supporting very anxious clients with phone calls that would usually be a face to face consultation has been a privilege. For clients to give their consent and put their trust in our judgement and guidance is a humbling experience, becoming their advocate and voice to ensure their needs are met.

Suffolk Work Well adapts during the COVID-19 pandemic

Suffolk Work Well Manager, Tony Wooderson explains how the service has adapted in the current pandemic



Suffolk Mind's project, Suffolk Work Well (SWW) supports people with their mental health in the workplace.

It provides practical and emotional support to people wishing to gain, regain or retain their employment where their emotional

wellbeing was impacting adversely on them, by whatever factors. We aim to use our Emotional Needs and Resources model to uncover what emotional needs aren't being met, and work on strategies to meet them.

Before the COVID-19 pandemic, we offered face-to-face, 1-2-1 support initially in Ipswich and Felixstowe. We soon expanded to the Saxmundham area, working with not only clients but medical professionals, organisations, businesses and the social prescribing teams. The current situation has however meant changes. SWW cannot presently provide that physical 1-2-1 support but our team of experienced, friendly and knowledgeable staff, adapted extremely quickly and are now delivering the service via phone, email, texts and of course - and what we are all getting used to - video chats. This support not only continues but is growing and we are now offering the service

Support is available to those newly unemployed or furloughed through the pandemic, and those obliged to work from home and therefore are work-isolated. The support provided is free, and not time-bound. We will work with you to try to determine and address both your physical and emotional needs for your improved mental wellbeing.

Climate Emergency

In July 2019, the Town Council declared a Climate Emergency and instigated a Working Group to consider how we can reduce, to a minimum, our carbon footprint by 2030. An Action Plan was drawn up and published on our website. Several actions are now underway including the introduction of a new 'Cycle to work' scheme, improved car-sharing, and our energy is provided from 100% renewable energy supplier.

Improving Energy Efficiency

Following the Council's Climate Emergency Declaration made in July 2019, EPCs (Energy Performance Certificates) were obtained for all Council building and a DEC (Display Energy Certificate) produced for the Town Hall. Guided by these documents, Council has began work on reducing the carbon footprint of our buildings. Since this time, Council's energy suppliers were reviewed based on the provision of 100% renewable electricity and insulation improvements are being sought for Walton Community Hall and the cemetery buildings.

Swift Boxes

Six swift boxes, which were made locally by Felixstowe Men's Shed were erected at Walton Community Hall and Broadway House.

Bees and Wildflowers

To support local wildlife and the environment, Committee has given permission to Happy Globe CIC to use some local Council-owned land for a wildflower meadow, orchard and the keeping of bees.



Community Public Access Defibrillators

There are now 12 public access defibrillators across the town, 5 of which are maintained by Felixstowe Town Council.

War Memorial

Felixstowe War Memorial has received Grade II listing and added to the List of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest in January. The List entry for the War Memorial, is published on the National Heritage List for England.

Felixstowe in Flower

Council's Felixstowe in Flower initiative has contribed towards civic pride in the town since 1985 and has been cost neutral for the past two years thanks to the support of many local businesses and sponsors.

The East of England Co-op were our main sponsor once again in 2019, providing sunflower seeds for children to participate in our Tallest Sunflower competition and growbags for the schools' competitions. During the year, the Mayor paid a visit to each of the local schools to talk about the event and give away seeds for children to grow. Unfortunately, the public competitions and awards planned for 2020 had to be cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic. However. the floral baskets will brighten up the town. Notwithstanding this, it was agreed that all sponsorship will be rolled over until next year. We will also be trialling the use of non-drinking water stored and provided by the Felixstowe Ferry Golf Club to feed the flowers.



Remembrance

The Council and the Felixstowe Branch of the Royal British Legion supported several commemorative events in the town leading up to Amistice Day on Monday 11 November 2019. A new project was launched in partnership with Felixstowe Remembers and local businesses which saw poppies installed throughout the town and signs erected in 66 roads to recognise the 212 residents that were killed because of war.



Felixstowe was proud to play host to BBC Radio Suffolk for the official launch of Suffolk Day in June 2019. With the Suffolk flag flying high from the Town Hall, Councillors celebrated by serving tea and home-made cake to passers by in the afternoon.







22 Annual Report 2019-20

Planning & Environment

During 2019/20 the Planning & Environment Committee considered a total of 212 local planning applications. Committee noted that 90.3% of the time (149 of 165 reported decisions) East Suffolk Council has concurred with the Town Council's recommendation. In many of the cases where there was contrasting view, Committee requested that those applications be referred to the District Council Planning Committee for further consideration.

Council received CIL payments from East Suffolk Council totalling £30,245.03 in 2019/20. The funds are held in a separate Earmarked Reserve and will be used to support suitable projects within the five-year timescale allowed by legislation.

Business Plan

As Council's current Business Plan entered its final year, a Business Plan Steering Group was formed to support the development of a new Council Business Plan for the period 2020-2024. Following an initial public consultation and a series of workshops, a draft plan was formed and published for public consultation in February. The final Business Plan for 2020-2024 was approved by Council on 11th March and is available to view online at www.felixstowe.gov.uk/council-documents

Allotments

The Town Council manages five allotment sites and, in conjunction with the Felixstowe Society of Allotment Leisure Gardeners (FSALG), has taken steps to improve access, security and the internal roadways of the sites. The sites are maintained to a high standard and the availability of allotments has been regularly promoted in the Council's magazine. As a result, the interest and demand for plots has increased over the past 12 months and it is expected that full occupancy may be achieved in 2020/21.

Audit and Accounts

The 2019/20 Audit will be undertaken by PKF Littlejohn LLP in July 2020, and the audited accounts for 2019/20 should be available from September 2020 to view online. Internal audits were conducted twice in 2019/20 with all procedures found to be in order and helpful recommendations made.

Budget and Precept

Budgeted income outturn for 2019/20 was 110.9% and expenditure was within the set budget at 97%. Council also holds ring-fenced funds for future projects and contingencies, known as 'Earmarked Reserves', and these are reviewed at least once annually to ensure adequate provisions are in place.

Effective management of budget and reserves enabled the Town Council to limit increases to its portion of local council tax. For the forthcoming financial year 2020/21 the increase was 2.04%, which represents less than 3p per week per band D property. The total paid by a Band D equivalent ratepayer in 2020/21 will be £70.87, or just under 4% of the total council tax bill. The other 96% is split between Suffolk County Council, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk Constabulary.

Cemetery

Committee approved a project to refurbish the toilet facilities and improve disability access. To support our environmental aims, a refillable soap dispenser is replenished from sustainable products from a local supplier, cutting down on our plastic waste. Skips are now being used to segregate green waste from non-recyclables more effectively. Two new noticeboards have been erected at both entrances with an improved map. The old cemetery allotments site has been turned over to wildflower meadow, with nesting boxes, bird bath and bird tables installed across the cemetery.

Council Communications

In addition to this quarterly magazine, delivered to all households in Felixstowe, regular updates about the Town Council, its partners and links to meetings and agendas are made via our website www.felixstowe.gov.uk Twitter @FelixstoweTC and Facebook page FelixstoweTownCouncil Council meetings and events are displayed on the noticeboard outside the Town Hall. We welcome public participation at all Council and Committee meetings and the press regularly attend.

The 'Home But Not Alone' service was launched at the beginning of the Covid-19 lockdown period, to help connect people who want to volunteer in their communities with neighbours who are most in need. County wide.

The telephone number for those in genuine need of help, is freephone 0800 876 6926 and is staffed from 9am to 5pm, seven days a week. The request for help is filtered down to the local communities' officer, to match the request for help with an appropriate offer of support. The support offered includes delivering groceries, medication or essential household goods, in line with Government social distancing guidelines.

Chloe Lee (Communities Officer for this area) has been working closely with different charities and organisations throughout this time. This has been critical to ensure the community has access to the appropriate support.

Basic Life Charity has been one of those Chloe has been in close contact with. They adapted their Food Bank to adhere to social distancing guidelines and worked alongside FACTS (Community Transport) to deliver essential food supplies to residents who are

self-isolating or shielding who have been referred to the Communities team for help. In addition, FACTS have been delivering prescription medication from The Grove Pharmacy to residents aged over 70. This has been a huge help and has alleviated people's worries about being able to access the medicines they need during this time.

The entire district has seen a fantastic community response to the pandemic with groups and action being established quickly to help those most in need. In Felixstowe, Helping Hand's volunteers, led by Town Councillor Darren Aitchison, are a key example of local people going above and beyond to help a neighbour.

The Salvation Army has also provided essential support during this crisis by providing food parcels and hot meals to the most vulnerable. They have also created entertainment packs, delivered toys and outdoor games to families, and run a weekly zoom group for children full of songs, activities and competitions.

Chloe Lee is looking forward to linking back with community groups and organisations, as they prepare for post covid and the 'new normal'. She would like to hear from local groups and clubs on how they are adapting to enable people to pursue their interests and help support each other.
