Meet the new Mayor!





Hello Felixstowe!

I am truly honoured to be elected Mayor for Felixstowe for the upcoming municipal year.

I love summer, and there is no better way to enjoy the Suffolk summer sunshine than at one (or many!) of Felixstowe's fabulous festivals and events.

What a fantastic way to kick-off our summer programme with the joyful Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Felixstowe held a worthy celebration for Her Majesty The Queen, with four-days of entertainment and fun that were fit for royalty. In fact, my first Mayoral engagement was a sneak preview of the Festival of Suffolk Torch Relay at Inspire Suffolk. The 588-mile Torch Relay, which later made its way through the flag-waving crowds of Felixstowe carried by our 'Jubilee Jewel of Felixstowe' Civic Awards winner, John Cresswell, is a symbol of a bright future for Suffolk.

A Platinum Parade and Proclamation at the Town Hall, an official RAF flypast, an atmospheric Beacon Lighting at Landguard Fort, two days of music and entertainment at the Beachside Events Area, and a rain-proof Big Jubilee Lunch hosted at Felixstowe Leisure Centre - the Platinum Jubilee weekend was a celebration to remember! Red, white and blue displays adorned shop windows, newly planted birch trees shimmer and stood tall aligning along town centre, and Felixstowe was blessed with glorious sunshine as crowds united to celebrate this momentous occasion for the country. Honouring Her Majesty's 70 dedicated years on the throne, the Jubilee weekend provided a chance to reconnect with neighbours and friends for this royal milestone. And there's more! From the Festival of the Sea's colourful parade of boats, to a royal literary feast at the Felixstowe Book Festival, to Friday Proms and weekend music spectacular at our Flagship event. Yes! Felixstowe Carnival is back; Heroes and Villains are at the ready and there may even be a fearsome dinosaur or two at the Carnival Parade.

Summer 2022 is also predicted to be the busiest tourist season ever, so I am proud to share even more great news. Firstly, that Felixstowe has once again been awarded The Blue Flag and Seaside Award for the quality of its beaches and bathing water. Both flags are flying high next to the historic Manwick Shelter recognising Felixstowe as a top beach, one of Suffolk's best!

A joint project of MENTA (a business support organisation operating across Suffolk and Norfolk) and Penn Commercial (Ipswich property agency) supported by East Suffolk Council, @inc is a new working and meeting space to help home-working employees, freelancers and micro-businesses. If, like me, you are working from home, you will know it has its benefits and its challenges too. @inc offers space, is open 24/7, providing superfast broadband and Zoom rooms for private telephone calls, meetings and training.

Felixstowe Community Hospital League of Friends

Supporting Felixstowe Hospital and health service in caring for our community.

The Felixstowe Hospital League of Friends is a local based charity that seeks to support the Felixstowe Hospital and local health services.

We raise funds through local publicity and events, to fund items that the NHS are not always able to easily provide themselves. Whilst this includes technical equipment it also includes items that make any patient's stay better and improves the working environment of staff. During the pandemic, whilst fundraising was restricted, we still managed to provide valuable items; ward furniture, wheelchairs, patient bed socks, daily newspapers and a staff kettle.

We also work closely with the Hospital staff and the NHS Trust, petitioning to ensure that the Hospital retains the valuable healthcare services that our community and visitors to Felixstowe need.



The Compass

Finding the right direction

"I knew this would be hard, but I had no idea how hard. These were the words of a fellow trustee as we approached the first anniversary of The Compass in April 2022. Never a truer word.

What do we do?

Through employed and voluntary outreach workers, The Compass works with individuals and families to improve life skills, manage

household budgets, address debt, tackle anxiety and loneliness, improve parenting and

much more. Using both internal and external resources the outreach workers and volunteers don't just signpost but actively support the engagement, such as reminding individuals of appointments. Sometimes the needs are practical, such as support to get homes and gardens back under control, writing a CV, completing benefits forms or improving IT skills, but very often it is providing advocacy when attending medical, Job Centre or school appointments.

Operating out of the first floor of Christ Church, Grange Farm Avenue, the service users have a space where they feel safe and heard. As a Christian charity, The Compass follows the example of Jesus who was always ready to listen and treat with respect those who came to him for help.

At the initial appointment there is frequently (and increasingly) a need for emergency food or fuel. Whilst The Compass will try to help (within its restricted funding), the essential question asked is how things got this bad and what can be done to stop it being this desperate in future. At its heart The Compass seeks to move people from dependence to independence. Yes it's hard work, but vital.

Felixstowe Opportunity Group

Felixstowe Opportunity Group was started 30 years ago by parents of children with additional needs for other parents of children with similar needs. The idea was to provide support and respite for these families who so desperately needed it. Over the years, the group saw a few changes in the committee that ran it, but they always held to their core values of offering this support. Things began to change within the education system as schools and nurseries became more

Of course, everything changed once the pandemic hit and everything had to close. Parents tried to find other means of getting that support, some formed groups of their own and went to Zoom, while others just did the best they could with what they had.

inclusive, so the committee at the time were considering the group become a place for holiday support.



Once things started to open up, the committee members had decided that it was time to move on and offered the building and charity to the community to see if anyone else wanted to continue what was started all those years ago.

Stevie Collin got a group of friends together, Denise Blackall, Sandy Battiste, Jennifer Sheppard, Stacey Lewis and Mary Ellis, and formed a new committee. Although they wanted to stick with the core values of the group a new set of additional needs had arisen, and so Little Foggies was born. Little Foggies sessions are for all children under school age and their parents. These parents and children have missed out on 2 years of peer support, social support and learning because there have been no Mum and Tot groups. The sessions are thriving, and children who were at first very nervous are now finding their confidence and playing with others. Parents are able to talk to other parents in a fun friendly environment without judgement and can get ideas for their family, as well as a cuppa and lots of support.

We are still also running SEN sessions but, of course, most of the little ones who attended before the pandemic are now at school so we are working with Health Visitors and Speech Therapists to encourage parents who may need our services to come along and give us a try.

As well as the sessions for under 5s, we are now also offering after school sessions and will be looking at life skills for teens as well as a whole host of other services and fun family stuff. We are excited to be working with the Mayor of Felixstowe for the coming year and working alongside the other charities chosen by the Mayor for her year-long term.





Felixstowe's beaches receive a 2022 Blue Flag and Seaside Award





Felixstowe's beaches have once again been presented with a Blue Flag and Seaside Award for the year 2022 from Keep Britain Tidy. To be awarded a Blue Flag, beaches must comply with several criteria covering environmental education and information, water quality, environmental management, safety, and services. Felixstowe was awarded the accolade in recognition for the quality of the beach, the way it is managed and the facilities it offers to visitors. Felixstowe is one of only two beaches in Suffolk to be presented with the Blue Flag and Seaside Award for the year 2022.

Both the Blue Flag and Seaside Award are flying from the flagpole in Arwela Road. If you're planning a walk along the prom, or a trip to the beach, see if you can spot them!

East Suffolk Council Public Wifi Project





Free-to-use public Wi-Fi is now avalable in Felixstowe

To support local towns and businesses, East Suffolk Council is delivering a range of digital projects which aim to strengthen the local economy and improve

connectivity within the district's market towns.

One of these projects is the East Suffolk Digital Towns programme which will digitally transform market towns through the installation of free public Wi-Fi (also in seafront areas), digital footfall counters and town marketing platforms alongside a business support programme.

Supported by funding from the Getting Building Fund and New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership's Innovative Projects fund, this new technology will be combined with bespoke business support, helping local businesses and the towns in which they are based, to grow.

Visitors to the towns can easily get online and will also have the option of signing up to receive news, offers and information to support local businesses.

Specially designed signage in the town will indicate locations where free Wi-Fi is available. New technology will enable the council to understand the number of visitors to the town, the busiest periods, the average time people spend in the town centre and more. This will enable the council's Economic Development Team to provide tailored support for local businesses.

In addition to digital infrastructure, East Suffolk council is working with Menta to deliver the Digital Springboard for businesses. Businesses can sign up to get access to free training, advice, diagnostics and funding to support their digital understanding and growth. Felixstowe Men's Shed (FMS)



Busy times again at Felixstowe Men's Shed! Our main recent project has been completed and delivered. The previous Mayor, Cllr Mark Jepson, contacted us last year seeking to have six large raised beds for a project at Langer Primary Academy, making and providing them so the students of Langer can grow and learn about vegetables within the curriculum at school.

A source of reclaimed timber was established and used, requiring planning and smoothing the tops so splinters are avoided. Each planter was 8x4 feet in size with a height of 18 inches. After preservative treatment they were assembled ready for delivery.

Once on site they were placed in a prepared area one Saturday morning when a team of volunteers assembled by the Mayor had them placed and filled with soil as if by magic in short time. The photo shows three of them in situ with Mark Jepson getting stuck in.

More projects roll along, some involving the Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations, both locally and one for the County. More in our next update.

The Wellness Garden is developing, and a new consultant is leading the way. New members are welcome; no skills necessary but a willingness to learn some or help in the garden as it develops.

A Coastline Celebration



As part of the Festival of Suffolk and The Queen's Platinum Jubilee, the Festival of the Sea this June celebrated the rich coastline and maritime





links of Suffolk and Essex. Located at the border of these two fine English counties, the Landguard Peninsula at Felixstowe sits alongside the Harwich Haven, the finest natural estuary in the East of England, where the rivers Orwell and Stour meet the sea.



A thriving area of commercial ports and pleasure sailing, the Peninsula played host to a series of exciting events and activities as part of the Festival of the Sea on Saturday 18 and Sunday 19 June.

Ahoy me Hearties! Landguard Fort and Felixstowe Museum were taken over by a swash-buckling weekend of pirate fun, including reenactments, musket firing and a quiz trail. On Saturday 18 June, the Haven come alive with a grand Parade of Boats, including vessels from the Royal Navy, Trinity House, Harwich Haven Authority (HHA) and the RNLI. Flying colourful flags and bunting, the parade criss-crossed the waters. The View Point at Landguard was a key location to watch the parade and to meet the Felixstowe Coast Patrol with their boat and relevant displays.

The Landguard Peninsula is expected to be very busy this summer, so consider leaving your car at home and travel by public transport. The FirstGroup 77 bus links Landguard with the Felixstowe Railway Station, the main seafront and the large car park at Martello Park North. Alternatively, park at the Manor Terrace car park and enjoy a short 20-minute walk through the Landguard Nature Reserve.

The Fort is also hosting a new Art Installation - 'Journey with a Container' from visual artist Yva Jung and commissioned by Pier Projects. Exploring the hidden lives of seafarers, it will be open from Saturday 18 June to Friday 2 September.

Improvements to Langer Park in Felixstowe

Welcoming Ukrainians to **Felixstowe**

Following the Russian invasion of Ukraine in February, several Felixstowe residents were immediately keen to register to host under the Government's 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme. In the

early weeks of the war, securing

UK visas for Ukrainians was particularly challenging but thanks to the efforts of local resident, Kim Balshaw, several refugees have now been matched with a Felixstowe home.

Kim speaks warmly about the community response: "there have been so many offers of help but first and foremost of course we need people to open up their homes if they can. We particularly need help from people who can accommodate 3+ people which need larger properties to avoid alreadytraumatised families having to be split up. They have been through so much already that we need to make the experience as easy, as possible, for them."

Recently Lilia and her husband arrived in Felixstowe with their four young children, and her mother. Lilia said, "We obviously dream of returning to our life in Ukraine as soon as possible but for now we are so grateful to have been greeted with such kindness."

There are still so many displaced Ukrainians 'perched' in temporary accommodation across continental Europe in cramped conditions, sharing accommodation with complete strangers in hotels, hostels, churches, schools, sports halls, tents, etc. Many are now being told that they need to relocate again in the next few weeks.



An Update from **Felixstowe Golf Club**







New electric power tools for the Town Council's Grounds Team

Over 100 trees planted in Felixstowe under the Queen's Green Canopy tree planting initiative



Over 100 trees have been planted in Felixstowe as part of the Queen's Queen Canopy initiative for Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee. 70 saplings of various species were planted at the Abbey Grove on March 11 to symbolise 70 years of The Queen's reign. Councillors, staff and members of the public turned out with their spades to "plant a tree for the Treebilee". Seven Oak Trees were also planted at Langer Park on March 11, each symbolising a decade of the Queen's reign. These tree plantings are part of a nationwide effort, formed of individual communities, to create a green canopy to mark a momentous occasion for the country.

14 new wooden tree planters, fitted with silver birch trees, are being installed in Felixstowe town centre. These silver birch trees have been specially chosen by a horticulturist for their suitability to container growing, and the wooden planters specially crafted by a local lumberjack uses sustainable materials. Have you seen these new additions to the town centre?

Want a lot for your plot, but don't need as much space? Try an 'Alittlement'!



Want to grow your own veg? Are you thinking about giving an allotment a go? If you want a lot for your plot, but don't require as much space, try an 'Alittlement'! These smaller plots are only 8 x 8 metres and are perfect for those who have always wanted to give an allotment a go. A recent addition to the Cowpasture Allotment site, the new 'Alittlement' plots are quick to have been cultivated by their owners. For an insight into what it's like to own an 'Alittlement', check out this feature from one of the new tenants.

Getting started with an 'Alittlement'...

I've often toyed with the idea of getting an allotment. However, with my lifestyle, I'm mostly a weekend gardener. Sure my plants will get a bit of attention during the week and I can even be found out in the garden late at night with a torch rounding up slugs and snails and getting them as far away from my veggies as possible, but that low level of maintenance just didn't seem feasible on an allotment. Which is why a 'micro-plot' sounded perfect.

The idea is for people, unsure about allotment life, to gain an understanding of the work that goes into an allotment before committing to a standard size plot.

My first weekend on the plot was a lot of hard work, as we dug over the beds I'd lined out, but worth it. The second weekend we spent putting up a fence, to discourage curious bunnies. The weedy bit of land was no more, this was now my 'Alittlement'.

It's two months on and, even though I planted my runner beans too soon, laid down weed suppressant during the heaviest snows of the year, fought a daily battle of wills with obnoxious weeds (have you ever heard of 'Mares tail'? I hadn't) and accidentally pulled up some of my veggies when weeding. I'm loving every minute.

I'm under no illusion, it is a lot of work, and I certainly couldn't handle a standard-sized plot, but my 'Alittlement' is just perfect for a weekend gardener like me.

Landguard Nature Reserve's New Learning Area



completion of our new learning area. Situated on the riverside

of the Nature Reserve, the new area will be used by visiting schools and groups such as cubs and beavers to learn more about wildlife and habitats onsite.

The area today looks quite different to that of just a year ago...

With the help of volunteers, the space was cleared, and the fencing extended, then structures built, and the area dressed with shingle.

Where possible materials found onsite were reused or recycled, for example, an old plastic boardwalk was reused to create features such as a raised pond, benches, planters, seashore treasure pit and decking area. Additionally, to highlight the problem of plastic in nature, particularly in our waters, materials were collected from Felixstowe beaches and recycled to create some colourful artwork which now forms the basis of our 'Stop the tide of plastic' learning session.

Funding was used to purchase bird boxes, cameras, bee homes, plants, paints, learning materials and much more and facilitated the commission of willow sculptures by local artist, Tracey Barritt-Brown, who also donated 'Dotty the Octopus' which is displayed in a boat provided by Stephen Read of Felixstowe Ferry.

The creation of this space would not have been possible without the assistance of funding, donations and time from the Harwich Haven Authority, the Rotary Club of Felixstowe, local contributors (Adam Farnworth, Jess Cooper, Richard & Jenny Bugg, Fred & Will) and the dedicated team of Landguard volunteers.

Thanks to all of those involved, we were recently able to welcome and host Year 4 students from Colneis Junior School. The children expressed how much they enjoyed the experience, and we look forward to welcoming many more.

Mrs Simpson in Felixstowe focuses on six weeks during the autumn of 1936 when Wallis sat out her wait for her divorce in our town. It looks at her relationship with both Edward and her soon to be ex-husband Ernest as she wrestles with this momentous of decisions that will have a profound effect on the country and the monarchy - the consequences of which led to the reign of our present Queen.

With live music and songs of the time the play will be premiered at Two Sisters Arts Centre on Saturday 18th June as part of The Felixstowe Book Festival with further performances at Harvest House on Wednesday 27th, Thursday 28th & Saturday 30th July

Daniel Defoe – The Lockdown Diaries is the second play to be produced by this talented company. It looks at Defoe's experiences during the plague year of 1665 and examines the parallels with our last two years of lockdowns and covid.

This will also be performed at Two Sisters Arts Centre, as part of Felixstowe Book Festival and as part of Two Sisters Maritime Festival on Saturday 16th July

Further performances will be at Christchurch Mansion on Thursday 14th July and at St Marys Church, Bucklesham on Thursday 21st & Friday 22nd July.

Artist film reveals the Hidden Human Lives within the Shipping Container Industry in thought provoking tribute to Seafarers



A staggering 90% of all that we own has made its way to us via a shipping container. For those who live in

Felixstowe, the Port offers a glimpse into the scale of the industry. Yet, we know little of the lives within and rarely see those whose job it is to navigate the mass transportation of goods.

It is this seemingly invisible movement and the hidden lives of the seafaring communities that are the focus of this latest exhibition by artist Yva Jung.



Commissioned by the Pier Projects Art Agency and hosted by Landguard Fort, the exhibition "Journeys with a Container" has the perfect backdrop - that of the Port itself and invites viewers to carefully consider their own relationship and proximity to the mass movement of food, objects and indeed, people.

Drawn from interviews which took place during the height of the pandemic when seafarers were isolated on their vessels and could not return home, the artist encounters a mother-seafarer and a port chaplain. Through these dialogues - whether voiced or voiceless - Jung reveals the sacrifices made on these journeys, the reasons why they do this work and the impact on their families.

The exhibition launched during The Festival of the Sea, part of the Festival of Suffolk, and the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty The Queen.






An Update from Fairfield School

Hello! My name is Odon and I am a Year 6 council representative for my class at Colneis Junior School. In March, I attended Youth Forum with my teacher, and some other Year 6 council reps. Youth forum is a meeting



that takes place about 6 times a year on a Wednesday at Felixstowe Town Hall—in a cosy, luxurious room called the Council Chamber. Here, the council reps and teachers of schools in Felixstowe gather to discuss what is happening in their school and also what is happening around the world.

I think it is good that the Council give children a chance to speak about their points of views.

Space to Grieve - Bereavement Support

Did you know that, in the average school, one child in every classroom will have experienced a bereavement? I wonder at what age you were when you experienced the death of someone for the first time?

Through Boost's School Chaplaincy partnership at Felixstowe School, we've supported 25 students so far this academic year who have experienced death, dying, bereavement or loss. While it is heart-breaking to hear some of these stories, it is also a great privilege to see these young people continue to come to school, try their best, and grow, despite the huge challenges of trying to process very sad news.

Providing this unconditional, individual and conversational support at the time and place where young people need it (in school) makes a huge difference. One young person, after weekly bereavement support, wrote:

"Thank you for your support during some of the hardest times of my life. There are no words to express how truly grateful I am".

My own experience is that I was 18 when I attended my first funeral, and I couldn't imagine having to go through such an experience at a younger age, alongside all the questions and emotions that the teenage years inevitably bring

We continue to offer 'space to grieve' for any young person experiencing death, dying, bereavement or loss, and thank Felixstowe Town Council for additional funding to provide this vital support throughout this academic year. We encourage students not to simply 'move on', but to have the space to grieve and 'move forward' to achieve their full potential!

Eastern Angles bring High Streets to life




This July Eastern Angles are bringing free theatre to Felixstowe town centre.

Mayors Summary

Summing up his last two years in office at the Annual Council meeting on 18th May, the Mayor of Felixstowe for both the 2020/21 and 2021/22 Municipal Year, Cllr Mark Jepson said "We have been through unprecedented times, and I have been proud to be the Chairman of a Town Council that adapted rapidly in response to the challenge to ensure that our services to the community were uninterrupted. Challenging it has certainly been, but the past two years have also been filled with wonderful experiences and many fantastic memories.." The full version of the Mayor's report and the Council's Annual Report for 2021/22 can be found on our website www.felixstowe.gov.uk.

Budget and Precept

At the end of the financial year, the income outturn for 2021/22 exceeded budget estimates at 114.6%, primarily due to CIL payments (Community Infrastructure Levy) and expenditure stood at 101.4% of budget, due to staff training and PPE. The pandemic continued to impact on income and expenditure throughout the 2021-22 financial year. However, with effective management of budget and reserves, the Town Council was able to freeze its portion of the council tax (the 'precept') for the forthcoming 2022/23 financial year, with Council unanimously voting for a 0% increase. This means that annual Band D equivalent cost will remain at £70.87, representing just under 4% of the total council tax bill. The other 96% of which is split between Suffolk County Council, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk Constabulary.

Coronavirus and Budget Estimates

The coronavirus pandemic affected Council's income and expenditure throughout 2020-21, and continued into the first half of 2021-22. Council's Finance & Governance Committee closely monitored and reviewed the financial position regularly throughout. The loss of income which would have otherwise been received from the room hire, weddings, rent and hall bookings was somewhat offset by reduced utility and service costs and the cancellation of most Council events. In setting its budget for 2022-23, Council took a cautiously optimistic approach, basing estimates on a more 'normal' year. Due to careful budgeting in recent years, the Council's reserves are able to offer some protection against unforeseen variables.

Audit and Accounts

The 2021/22 Audit is being undertaken by PKF Littlejohn LLP in July 2022 and the audited accounts should be available on our website from September 2022. Internal audits were conducted twice in 2021/22 with all procedures found to be in order.

Upgrade of IT Systems, Telephones and Digital Conferencing

The Finance & Governance Committee oversaw a wide-ranging upgrade of IT during the pandemic to enable staff to adhere to the requirement to 'work from home'. The move to cloud-based file servers, mobile computing hardware and a software-based telephone system has transformed the way in which Council staff are able to work – now fully connected whether from home, at the Town Hall or at other sites. During 2021/22 Committee oversaw improvements to digital conferencing services at the Town Hall, this equipment enables remote participation at meetings by members of the public and other attendees making public meetings far more accessible. The equipment is used for many working groups and other types of meeting which reduces the reliance on cars to attend meetings and, in turn, contributes towards our environmental aims.

Upgrade of Accounting Software

On 1st April 2021, Council changed its finance package to new software which could be accessed online. Staff have found the system easy to use, to the extent that, in October, the Finance & Governance Committee agreed to also move the Cemetery software package to the same system. The new digital system helps to manage the Cemetery records. It is not only user friendly but now provides a seamless link between our Cemetery applications and our accounts/invoicing. Council was very proud to receive the 'Top Contributor' award at the Scribefest conference, which had been attended by over 300 Town and Parish Councils for its contribution in helping to develop the software for larger Town Councils.

Youth Forum



Felixstowe Town Council's Youth Forum is a multi-representative group of young people nominated by school councils and youth projects in Felixstowe. The Forum meets regularly with local Councillors and other local stakeholders at the Town Hall and meetings are chaired by the young people themselves on rotation basis. Debate is encouraged to enable a young person's perspective to be placed on issues which they themselves bring up and which are fed back to the local schools. During the pandemic it was not possible to meet in this way, however, April saw a return to the Youth Forum meetings with a new vigor.

The environment continues to be appropriately prevalent and this theme has been given to the Youth Forum to hear about environmental projects in schools as well as sharing ideas. At the most recent meeting, members were keen to hear from Colneis Junior School about the work they had been doing recently alongside Fairfield Infants to promote protection of the trees.



Women's Cycle Tour

The Finance & Governance Committee worked with East Suffolk Council to help fund the Women's Cycle Tour which completed its tour in Felixstowe on 9 October and also saw the first Felixstowe Triathlon.



Christmas

Funding was awarded to the Felixstowe BID (Business Improvement District) towards the provision of a Christmas Ice Rink, which was welcomed back to Felixstowe having been unable to take place the previous two years.

The Council continued to support the Lions Club with annual funding of £6,750 towards the provision of the Town Centre's Christmas lights.

Cemetery

As part of Council's commitment to reduce its carbon footprint, a lot of environmental work has been carried out in the Cemetery this year. A new bike shelter has been fitted which allows both staff and members of the public to leave their cars behind and protect their bikes from the rain, battery powered tools have been ordered and a new electric van has been ordered which, subject to recent supplychain issues improving, is anticipated to be in operation in June.

Lots of wildlife projects are taking place, the latest project last summer, was the re-wilding of the verges either side of Langley Avenue, with a strip either side of the gates still mowed. With the help of some wildflowers sown into the verges, it has definitely attracted more wildlife.

Many of our cemetery forms have been updated to make them easier to understand and to take into account the changing requirements of the public.

Allotments

The Town Council manages five main allotment sites and a micro-plot site within one of our main sites for our new 'Alittlements' scheme. This new project has been designed to give people a taste of allotment life before taking on the responsibility of a full plot.

Demand for allotments remains high and, due to the hard work of Council staff, the turnaround time from an allotment becoming vacant to another tenant taking it on is kept to a minimum. As a result we currently have very few vacant plots.

An apple orchard has been planted on a formerly unused area of the Cowpasture site. Funding from the Felixstowe Allotment Association, Felixstowe Town Council and a generous local benefactor was used to purchase a variety of old heritage apple trees from "Orchards for All" a charity based in West Norfolk, and a smaller number of the more modern strains were obtained from a local nursery as they offer a quicker return and greater crop. There are now plans to implement a similar area on the Taunton Road site.

Grants 2021/22

Felixstowe Town Council is committed to supporting and strengthening the many networks and community groups that help to make a positive difference to Felixstowe. Through its Annual and Occasional Grants scheme, the Town Council was able to support 27 local organisations and projects during 2021/22 with a total of £48,400 via its Occasional and Annual Grants scheme and through its community partnerships.

Digital Community Directory Project

This key project, which achieved funding during the 2020-21 financial year, will result in an online and customised directory of all our community groups, organisations, clubs and societies on the Town Council's website. Working with the Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership, which part-funded the project, the Town Council will provide a hub for residents to find local upcoming events and groups of interest. Launching this summer, community groups will be able to create event listings for their own activities and manage their online profiles – if you are involved in a local community group, we want to hear from you!

Sustainable bedding



With an aim to become more sustainable, the wooden planters in the town have been planted with perennial bedding plants. The flower beds at the Triangle and on the seafront have also been planted in this way, with vibrant plants which will become well-established over the long-term.

In partnership with the Felixstowe BID (Business Improvement District) plans are also being made to plant Birch trees in planters which will be placed throughout the Shared Space and either side. This will replace the blue planters which are currently in poor condition.

Treebilee planting

As part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations, on Friday 11 March (the 70th day of 2022) the Town Council planted over 70 trees in the Cowpasture Meadow with the Friends of Abbey Grove as well as in other locations. Also on this day the Town Council joined East Suffolk Council in the planting of seven Oak trees – one for each decade of Her Majesty's reign - at Langer Park.

Remembrance

The Town Council were pleased to see the crowds return for the Remembrance Sunday service in November 2021. In advance of this the setting of the War Memorial was refurbished with paving to provide a wider space for people to stand and lay wreaths and some sustainable hedging on the borders.

Planning Applications

During 2021/22 the Planning & Environment Committee considered a total of 233 local planning applications. Committee noted that on 88.4% occasions (145 of 164 reported decisions) East Suffolk Council has concurred with the Town Council's recommendation. Of those cases where there was contrasting view, a referral panel at East Suffolk Council reviewed the Town Council's recommendations before deciding whether to refer the application to the District Council's Planning Committee for determination.

Cycling and Walking Consultation



The Council has been working with both Trimley Parish councils and East Suffolk Council on the Draft East Suffolk Cycling and Walking Strategy. Together, the councils have submitted many recommendations designed to improve access to safe and convenient routes for walking and cycling.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

Council received CIL payments from East Suffolk Council totalling £77,289.65 in 2021/22. These funds are held in a separate Earmarked Reserve and are ringfenced to support appropriate projects within a five-year timescale allowed by legislation. Consultation has taken place to identify suitable projects and a Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP) is being drawn up to priorities these in advance of delivery. £10,000 from previous CIL money received during the period 2018-20 was granted to the Felixstowe Allotment Association to provide a community hut.



Climate Emergency

Councillors consider biodiversity and environmental impact at the heart of all decision-making. Since Council declared a Climate Emergency in July 2019, our dedicated Climate Emergency Working Group has regularly met to review processes, services, products and actions and to raise awareness locally.

Plans for the future...

A project is underway to replace the Town Hall's single glazing with innovative slimline double glazing, using the latest technology to provide high levels of insulation whilst respecting the building's heritage.

The Climate Emergency Working Group will be working closely with the Felixstowe Youth Forum which has been relaunched since the pandemic with a focus on the environment.

Council continues to work closely with community groups to support environmental projects, and, as we emerge from the pandemic, more carbon-reducing schemes will be supported, such as a Repair Café and a 'Library of Things', and to help the Allotment Association FAA become a 'Champion' for composting.

The Council is particularly keen to hear from any organisations seeking funding to assist with local environmental projects.






















