# Meet the New Mayor

# Hello and welcome to this Summer 2023 edition of Felixstowe Town Council's seasonal magazine!



First off, Felixstowe, I want to say what a massive honour it is to be writing this as the actual Mayor of Felixstowe. When I was born in 1964 – in Fleetwood Avenue, within earshot of the cricket and football at Dellwood Ave – I don't think anyone thought this wee chappy in his birthday suit would one day wear the Mayoral chain of his hometown – I certainly didn't!

The role of Mayor of the town (dating back to 1895!) currently has three main elements: to be Chair of the six Full Council meetings during the Civic Year and to support, celebrate and promote the Council, people, businesses and charities of the town. In my first 10 days as Mayor I celebrated Felixstowe resident Cynthia Nixon's 100th birthday and Cuppa café's 4th, spoke at a multicultural food festival in Ipswich and opened Felixstowe's first Emergency Services

Day. Traditionally, the Mayor has also championed a small

number of local charities via fundraising events during the year. At the time of going to press we are just finalising arrangements for the charities. There's so much to look forward to this summer. The marvellous Felixstowe Book Festival returns 16-25 June (felixstowebookfestival.co.uk). The programme has something for everyone, with fascinating talks by top authors from near and far (including Terry Waite, a patron of the Festival), a Library Lego challenge and the one-and-only Hosepipe Band! And it wouldn't be summer without our mighty Carnival, 21-23 July (felixstowecarnival.org). This year's theme, 'Magic of the Musicals' will surely prompt many fine floats and costumes, so gather you and yours for a weekend of fab, free entertainment. But please do also bring cash and give as generously as you can, as the costs of putting on the Carnival run into the tens of thousands, and I know each year it's a real challenge for the dedicated committee volunteers to keep this great show on the road. Later in the summer the first 'Love Felixstowe' Festival, organised by the Felixstowe BID (Business Improvement District) felixstowebid.co.uk will hit the seafront 2-3 September. Offering free entertainment, delicious food and showcasing Felixstowe's brilliant businesses, 'Love Felixstowe' paves the way for another exciting announcement, as Stage Five of the men's Tour of Britain, the UK's biggest pro cycle race, will finish in Felixstowe on 7 Sept. The Beehive Café at Felixstowe Museum is already proving a firm favourite with its delicious toasties and paninis, scones and sensational cakes which are baked locally and delivered daily. It also offers a wider choice of hot and cold drinks as well as ice cream for those hot summer days when you can sit outside and watch the ships go by.

The café is named after HMS Beehive, the Second World War coastal forces base at Felixstowe, which is celebrated elsewhere in the Museum. The walls are adorned with the work of local artists, which is for sale, and is a space for small events, art classes and creative workshops.

So it is incredibly exciting and encouraging that they look to Felixstowe as the inspiration for what they are trying to do.



# Felixstowe Awarded Coveted Blue Flag and Seaside Award for Fourth Consecutive Year

East Suffolk's beautiful beaches have once again received national awards, ranking them amongst the best in the country.



Each year, the

country's best beaches are awarded Blue Flags and Seaside Awards and once again, four of East Suffolk's beaches have been selected.

Both Felixstowe (Felixstowe South and Pier) and Southwold (Southwold Pier) have received combined Seaside Awards and Blue Flags whilst the beaches at Lowestoft South of Claremont Pier (bathing / resort) and Kessingland (non-bathing) have received Seaside Awards.

Paul Wood, Head of Economic Development and Regeneration at East Suffolk Council said: "East Suffolk's beaches are hugely popular with residents and visitors, and we are delighted to once again receive these prestigious awards which reflect the quality of our beaches and the cleanliness of our coastline. This will provide an extra boost to our important tourism sector as it continues to recover from Covid restrictions. Anyone visiting East Suffolk's beaches this summer can be sure they are visiting one of the best in the country."

In total, 206 beaches in England have been presented with an award recognising the quality of the beach, the way it is managed and the facilities it offers to visitors. The Blue Flag is an international award and this year 78 locations have met the high standard required. Felixstowe is one of only two beaches in East Suffolk to be presented with both the 2023 Blue Flag and Seaside Award

Keep Britain Tidy's Chief Executive, Allison Ogden-Newton OBE said: "Visitors to a beach flying a Blue Flag or Seaside Award can be assured the beach will be clean, safe and meet the highest environmental standards, as well as international bathing water quality standards.

The Blue Flag is the world's most recognised award for beaches and marinas and, to qualify, each applicant must meet and maintain a series of stringent environmental, educational, safety and accessibility criteria.

We'd therefore like to recognise and applaud all those who have worked so hard to protect and improve some of our best-loved and most popular beaches. The collective efforts of beach managers, volunteers, residents and businesses all contribute to the success of these sites in achieving the incredibly high standards demanded."

Blue Flag is an international award managed by Keep Britain Tidy on behalf of the Foundation for Environmental Education and is presented to well-managed beaches with excellent water quality and environmental education programmes. This is the fourth consecutive year in which Felixstowe has received the Blue Flag and the second consecutive year for Southwold.

The Seaside Award, run by Keep Britain Tidy, recognises and rewards beaches in England that achieve the highest standards of beach management and, in the case of bathing beaches, meet the required standards for water quality and other specified criteria.

# Celebrating 50 years as a Local Nature Reserve

Landguard Nature Reserve was designated as a Local Nature Reserve (LNR) in 1973 and this year celebrates its 50th year!

Covering approximately 35 hectares, the Nature Reserve's mosaic of habitats, comprising acid grassland, vegetated shingle, freshwater ponds and scrub offer opportunities for a great many invertebrates including bees, butterflies, dragonflies and damselflies. The varied landscape is ideal for reptiles and amphibians such as Common lizard, Slow worm, Grass snake, Smooth newt and Common frog and supports mammals including European



rabbit, that play a vital role in maintaining the grassland, Field vole, Wood mouse, European hedgehog and Red fox and an increasing number of bat species. The intertidal habitat surrounding Landguard, where the land and sea meet, plays host to star fish, crabs, barnacles, limpets, and seaweeds and offers visitors occasional sightings of marine mammals such as Common and Grey seal.

To date more than 600 species of flora have been recorded across the Landguard Peninsula. Characteristic plants include Sea kale, Yellow-horned poppy, Sea sandwort, Sea pea, Sea spurge and the extremely rare Stinking Goosefoot. First recorded in 1963, this rare Schedule 8 plant is still present and is afforded special attention to help ensure its future at Landguard.

The Nature Reserve is an important site for birds - migratory, nesting, and vagrant species, and detailed daily records of birds have been kept by the Landguard Bird Observatory (LBO) since 1983 (www.lbo.org.uk). Iconic birds of the Landguard landscape include the ground nesting Ringed plover and Common Shelduck. Other locally loved species include Wheatear, House sparrow and Starling.

Celebrating 50 years as a coastal nature reserve is a significant milestone for any protected area. Coastal nature reserves are vital for protecting and preserving the unique and diverse ecosystems that exist along our shorelines.

These areas provide habitats for a wide variety of plants and animals, many of which are threatened or endangered. They also play an important role in protecting against coastal erosion and storm surges, and in providing recreational opportunities for the public.

As we celebrate it's 50-year anniversary, it is important to reflect on the successes and challenges that have been encountered. The site was designated as a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) in 1972, in recognition of its vegetated shingle, which is a rare and fragile habitat and prior to this, in 1962 received Scheduled Monument (SM) status, forming part of the Landguard Fort and associated field works, due to the exceptional historical visible remains such as the Mine Station building, gun emplacements, searchlight buildings and tank traps.

Managing such a landscape has its challenges. The Nature Reserve welcomes approximately 150,000 visitors each year and managing the impact of visitor pressure throughout the year continues to be a priority, to ensure that the Nature Reserve thrives for another 50 fabulous years.

# Beach Bonkers – Velvet Swimming Crab



Perhaps something we associate more with rock pools than the sand and shingle of our Suffolk shores, nonetheless crab shells are a

common strandline find. This is because although crabs themselves will grow, their carapace, or shell, does not. So the crab produces a chemical to separate



itself from its shell, leaving it behind for a beachcomber to find. This moulted shell looks exactly like a dead crab with the legs, and even the eye coverings remaining. The crab hides until its skin hardens into a new shell. Moulting also allows the crab to regenerate its legs, which may be lost to a predator or a suddenly moving rock. A reflex action allows the crab to sacrifice the leg at a predetermined "break" point - actually a deep groove. There are more than sixty species of crab in the UK. The most common is the Shore Crab, greenish or brown in colour, with five sharp points on either side of the shell. One of my most beautiful beachcombing finds was this leg from a Velvet Swimming Crab, usually found on our south and west coasts. The back pair of legs are flattened for swimming. You might also find the more familiar orange, pink brown "pie crust" shell of the Edible or Brown Crab. This tends to live offshore in deeper waters. The claws have black tips. If you find a particularly large one of these on the beach it may be that you've actually found the remains of someone's beach picnic!

PLEASE BEACHCOMB SUSTAINABLY. Take away as much rubbish as you can but everything else belongs on the beach. Our shingle beaches are a complex & fragile habitat - the plants & animals that live there need that driftwood, shell or stone far more than we do. # Felixstowe Town Council's Youth Forum Lights the Way

On Wednesday 22nd March, Felixstowe Town Council's Youth Forum met at Felixstowe Town Hall to discuss uses for the Youth Forum Budget. Annually, members of the Youth Forum are granted a total amount of £1,000, with which they must choose a project for the betterment of the local community. Expertly chaired by Felixstowe School, attendees from all schools proposed a selection of fantastic suggestions and, following a discussion, the winning idea was chosen.

This year, Youth Forum are lighting the way with a road safety campaign. Students elected to spend the money on reflective keyrings, embossed with the Youth Forum logo. The keyrings will be distributed to all students in Felixstowe primary schools and certain years in Felixstowe School. The keyrings can easily be attached to coat zippers or backpacks for increased visibility whilst travelling to and from school.

In previous years, the Youth Forum Budget was used to create a 'No Idling' campaign, and to discourage cars from idling around local schools, subsequently worsening air quality. A series of banners, printed with a 'No Idling' message were funded by the Youth Forum budget and displayed at schools gates. Since, some of the banners have been misplaced or have become damaged irreparably. This year, Felixstowe Town Council's Youth Forum elected to provide replacements in support of continuation of the campaign, using the 2022 Youth Forum budget.





# Tribute to Ben Jacobs A great runner and a greater man



Felixstowe Road Runners have lost a long standing and immensely popular club member who died following an accident when out cycling with three other club members on Wednesday 17 May 2023.

Ben Jacobs was an exceptionally talented runner and competed for the club in events across Suffolk and elsewhere in the country, regularly winning in his age category and



being placed very high up in overall standings, whatever the distance. He competed in all road running distances up to and including the marathon and he was a leading light on the local cross country scene where he excelled in the Suffolk Winter League and the County Cross Country Championships. He had extended his talents by competing in triathlons, right up to Ironman distance, being an accomplished cyclist and increasingly keen swimmer.

Above and beyond his prowess as an athlete, Ben was a brilliant club member and clubmate. He turned out for just about every event in which the club took part and was always at Tuesday evening training sessions. Although he was a superb athlete he had absolutely no ego or arrogance and would advise and encourage club members of all abilities and ages in a quiet, humble and supportive way. Most Felixstowe Road Runners will have experienced Ben drawing up next to them whilst they trained, before he gave a wave of acknowledgement, a word of encouragement or a supportive smile, then

gliding past in his lovely running style, always up on his toes, smoothly covering the ground. His commitment to others was illustrated so well by his long standing role in the organisation of Ipswich parkrun where he would very



regularly be out early checking the course before often serving as Run Director for this popular weekly event.

Felixstowe Road Runners paid emotional tributes to Ben at the Woodbridge 10k race on the Sunday after he passed away. All wore a black ribbon on their running vests. Some members ran in his memory with his name written on their shoes, others attempted to honour him with outstanding performance on this challenging course. A huge number of the Reds ran together at the back of the field beside one club member who was injured in the same cycling accident. The support from members of other clubs and from the residents of Woodbridge was extraordinary and very moving.

As individual clubmates we will miss Ben and as a running club there will always feel like a key member is missing. The running community of Suffolk will be poorer without him. We have been very fortunate to have him as a clubmate and our hearts go out to all the members of his family who have lost a husband, father, son and brother. Ben was a great runner and a greater man.

# **Community Grants**





Felixstowe Town Council is

committed to supporting and strengthening the many networks and community groups that help to make a positive difference to Felixstowe. Through its Annual and Occasional Grants scheme, the Town Council was able to support 29 local organisations and projects during 2022/23 with a total of £ 45,774. via its Occasional and Annual Grants scheme and through its community partnerships.

# CLIMATE EMERGENCY

Councillors consider biodiversity and environmental impact at the heart of all decision-making. Since Council declared a Climate Emergency in July 2019, our dedicated Climate Emergency Working Group has regularly met to review



processes, services, products and actions and to raise awareness locally

# Improving Energy Efficiency

Following the Council's Climate Emergency Declaration made in July 2019, EPCs (Energy Performance Certificates) were obtained for all Council building and a DEC (Display Energy Certificate) produced for the Town Hall. Guided by these documents, Committee began work to reduce the carbon footprint of our buildings, which has included increasing loft insulation and a the refurbishment and fitting of a highly insulated glass with a u-value of the lowest thermal transmittance of 0.7 w/m2.k. The glass was chosen to offer optimal insulation properties, whilst respecting the heritage and outer appearance of Felixstowe's historic Town Hall, which is located in a conservation area.

Council's energy suppliers use 100% renewable energy and a 3 year fixed contract was taken out in Summer 2022. A LED light replacement programme continues replacing all faulty lights with LEDs.

# **Budget and Precept**

At the end of the financial year, the income outturn for 2022/23 exceeded budget estimates at 115.2% (primarily due to increased hall hire revenue and Community Infrastructure Levy receipts) and expenditure stood at 92.9% of budget. Effective management of budget and reserves, the Town Council was able to freeze its portion of the council tax (the 'precept') once again for the forthcoming 2023/24 financial year, with Council unanimously voting for a 0% increase. This means that annual Band D equivalent cost will remain at £70.87, representing just under 3.5% of the total council tax bill. The other 96.5% of which is split between Suffolk County Council, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk Constabulary.

Council also holds ring-fenced funds for future projects and contingencies, known as 'Earmarked Reserves', and these are reviewed at least once annually to ensure appropriate provisions are in place.

# **Planning Applications**

During 2022/23 the Planning & Environment Committee considered a total of 189 local planning applications. 95.7% of the time (133 of 139 reported decisions) East Suffolk Council has concurred with the Town Council's recommendation. Of those cases where there was contrasting view, a referral panel at East Suffolk Council reviewed the Town Council's recommendations before deciding whether to refer the application to the District Council's Planning Committee for determination.

# Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

Council received CIL payments from East Suffolk Council totalling

£116,511.36 in 2022/23. These funds are held in a separate Earmarked Reserve and are ringfenced to support appropriate projects within a five-year timescale allowed by legislation. This year £10,000 was committed to support the establishment of a new facility for the Lions Club to enable continuation of the provision of Christmas lights throughout the town.

# Hall Hire and Weddings



Felixstowe Town Hall and Walton Community Hall remain competitively priced venues for hire and benefitted from recent redecoration. Many new classes regularly take place at Walton Community Hall. The Town Hall continues to be a popular and excellent value choice for weddings.

# 70th Anniversary of the North Sea Floods

The Flood Memorial was renovated for the 70th Anniversary of the North Sea Floods.

The bricks and stones were cleaned, the old brass plaques were replaced with laser-engraved stainless-steel plaques, a new wooden wave sculpture was installed, and a



handmade oak bench installed to replace the old bench that had rotted. The Council's grounds team completed the works in-house in time for commemorative events that took place throughout the town to mark the Anniversary on 31st January 2023. A church service and a service at the Flood memorial were well attended and the highlight was a candlelight procession covering a route of many of the houses affected by the floods that night.

# **Allotments**

The Town Council manages five main allotment sites and a micro-plot site within one of our main sites for our new 'Alittlements' scheme. This new scheme has been very successful since its launch. As of March 2023, 17 of the 20 Alittlements are occupied by and plans are already underway to add more on an adjacent vacant plot.

In addition to the implementation of new inspection software, the Allotment Tenancy Agreement has been reviewed with the aim of bringing greater clarity to the Allotment Regulations. This review was conducted with the goal of ensuring that all tenants can get the most out of their allotment. The revised agreement clearly outlines the regulations, expectations, and responsibilities of tenants, as well as the consequences of not adhering to these regulations. This has been done to create a fair and transparent system that benefits all tenants.

The Council supported the Felixstowe Allotment Association's participation in the National Open Garden Scheme, with proceeds from the visits going to various charities. The Mayor and Deputy Mayor were on hand to officially open the newly refurbished community shed which serves as a hub for the passionate community of allotment gardeners.

# Cemetery

The Felixstowe Town Council's grounds team has been actively working towards enhancing the local environment and promoting biodiversity. The team has successfully completed several projects and has many more planned for the upcoming year. These initiatives demonstrate the council's commitment to reducing its carbon footprint and improving the quality of life for the local community.

The Council's electric van was delivered in August and has been used for over 2000 miles since then. This move towards electric vehicles is a positive step towards reducing the council's carbon footprint.

# Queen's Platinum Jubilee



The Town Council worked in partnership with the Felixstowe Carnival Association and East Suffolk Council to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee over the four-day bank holiday weekend 2–5 June 2022.

# Queen's Green Canopy

As part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations, in partnership with the Felixstowe BID, the Council installed silver birches through Hamilton Road in large wooden planters as part of the Queen's Green Canopy. This initiative aims to increase tree planting across the UK, making a meaningful contribution towards the fight against climate change. Tubs throughout the town centre have been planted with perennials that are beneficial for pollinating insects. This initiative supports the council's commitment to enhancing the local environment and promoting biodiversity.

To supplement the tree planting carried out by the Grounds Team, felled trees have been replace with saplings and along Langley Avenue a hedge made up of twisted hazel and dogwood has started to be planted, as part of a multiyear project.

# Death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

The Town Council came together with the community of Felixstowe and the whole nation, to mark this profoundly significant moment in our history. Formal protocols were facilitated locally by the Town Council and an outpouring of poignant tributes were paid to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

# Blue flag

The Town Council was delighted for Felixstowe to be recognised, once again, as one of the country's best beaches, successfully achieving the Blue Flag and Seaside awards from the

environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. To receive the Blue Flag award beaches must comply with several criteria covering environmental education and information, water



quality, environmental management, safety, and services. Felixstowe consistently meets the criteria for 'excellent' international bathing water quality standards and it was a great team effort to achieve these awards. Thanks must also go to Visit Felixstowe and East Suffolk Council as well as the army of volunteer litterpickers who play a huge part in keeping the beach clean.

# Remembrance



The Council and the Felixstowe Branch of the Royal British Legion supported several commemorative events in the town in 2022. Leading up to Armistice Day on Friday 11 November the road sign project in partnership with Felixstowe Remembers and local businesses saw poppies installed throughout the town and signs erected in 66 roads to recognise the 212 residents that were lost because of war.

The crowds returned for the Remembrance Sunday service.



# Youth Forum

The Town Council Youth Forum is a meeting of young people representing local school councils and youth projects in Felixstowe.

Chaired by the young people themselves on rotation basis, the environment continues to be a key theme and recent meetings focused on the protection of the trees and flood risk.


