

After Covid-19 restrictions saw the cancellation of the annual hospice Christmas Day Dip in 2020 and adverse weather conditions saw the 2021 dip moved to Easter 2022, the charity has announced the event will be returning to its traditional format on Felixstowe seafront once again this Christmas. Returning for the 18th time, the event will see hundreds of 'dippers' don festive outfits before plunging into the icy cold North Sea at Felixstowe to raise vital funds, through sponsorship, for St Elizabeth Hospice which every year delivers free care to over 3,000 patients and their families throughout East Suffolk, Great Yarmouth and Waveney. Nichola Whymark, Head of Partnership Fundraising at St Elizabeth Hospice, said: "Our Christmas Day Dip is such a popular event, full of festive fun and one that is a Christmas tradition for many people. "It is always so brilliant to see the array of Christmas outfits on display as the local community joins together show their support for the hospice. "With early bird tickets now available, there is no better time to register and start encouraging friends and family to sponsor you. Every pound raised really will make a difference to our staff as they care for patients and their families throughout East Suffolk, Great Yarmouth and Waveney during very difficult times in their lives." The St Elizabeth Hospice Christmas Day Dip 2022 will take place on Christmas Day at 10am, opposite Mannings Amusement on Felixstowe seafront. Standard registration is £13 starting from 1st December through to midday on 22nd December, while on the day registration will cost £20. Each ticket price includes a medal.


Santa's visit rounds off a bumper year for Landguard Fort!



During 2022 we welcomed over 22,000 visitors at Landguard Fort which is one of Suffolk's top visitor attractions, depicting over 400 years of military,

social and geopolitical history.

Staff and volunteers are constantly working hard to provide new exhibits and facilities for visitors and some of the 2022 highlights include the introduction of a multimedia



Landguard Fort has established itself as an events venue as well as a visitor attraction. The fort was chosen as the 2022 venue for: an episode of Ant and Dec's Saturday Night Take Away, The Suffolk Youth Orchestra, the display of an art installation, The Pantaloons open-air theatre, and the lighting of the Felixstowe Beacon and events to commemorate the Queens' Platinum Jubilee and The Little Fort Of Horrors Halloween scare-night events.

And we've had lots of re-enactment groups stay at the fort for a weekend during the year allowing visitors to see how soldiers lived during the centuries including The Suffolk Regiment, The Sheppey Pirates, The 95th Rifles, and The Home Guard.

Our themed trails continue to be a favourite with our younger visitors who need to find a number of themed objects placed around the fort in order to receive a goody-bag on completion. This year we've used Easter, the Queen's corgis, Pirates, Soldiers and Halloween pumpkins as trail themes.

East Suffolk Council Project Development Update



Langer Park

Unfortunately, Langer Park has been subject to needless vandalism once again. The newly planted oak trees **EAST**SUFFOLK commemorating the platinum jubilee have been damaged and the tree guards protecting them vandalised, one

beyond repair. The newly refurbished toilet block has also been targeted on two separate occasions which is incredibly disappointing. The toilets have now been closed for the winter season and will re-open in the spring once fully repaired.

Felixstowe Seafront

You may have noticed that Felixstowe seafront is a hive of activity with several East Suffolk Council projects underway. Gipping are the contractors for the Seashore Village and Activity Park development and currently there are a range of groundworks on site. The hoardings surrounding the site allow you to have a good look at what's going on and to watch the project progressing. More details of the project will be released in the New Year, which will include

the sale of the beach huts and how to hire a beach pod. The development is due to be completed in summer 2023 and alongside the beach huts and pods, it will feature landscaped gardens, a Changing Places facility and public toilets. The activity park will include petangue pistes, climbing boulders, outdoor gym equipment and table tennis tables. Gipping also won the tender to rebuild the fishing hut to the north of the Pier, which will become a tourist information point, replacing the two

Visit Felixstowe branded beach huts in this location. Works to strengthen the concrete platform the hut sits on are complete and, weather dependent, the project should be completed by early in the new year. Brooks and Wood are extending and fixing the structure at Pier South to house more beach huts and secure the retaining wall for the future.

Remembering the 1953 Floods



The 1953 Floods are widely regarded as one of the worst flooding events to occur on the East Coast of England. 41 Felixstowe residents lost their lives in the deadly storm surge. The blue tiled line, stretching across the top of the Flood Memorial, marks the height of the flood water at the peak of the surge.

The Felixstowe Town Council Grounds Team are presently undertaking work to renovate the Flood Memorial in preparation for the 70th anniversary on 31 January 2023. The central bench, previously old and weathered beyond use, is now replaced with a distinct centrepiece, constructed from locally

sourced wood. Each year, residents of Felixstowe and the relatives of those who lost their lives gather together to mark the anniversary of the 1953 Floods in an act of remembrance. Students from local primary schools attend the annual remembrance event to lay 41 candles in remembrance of the lives lost.

BASIC Life Charity



The BASIC Life Charity have been extremely busy during the year and have followed on from their £20,000 donation of equipment to nine local schools last year, with another £10,000 donation this time to local nurseries.

The nurseries were asked to provide details of the items they needed and the charity were pleased to be able to supply the items which ranged from sensory lighting to books and play equipment.

BASIC also took on ownership of the former Layden's property in Langley Avenue. This is now known as 'The BASIC Community Cafe' and is open from 10am to 2pm Monday to Friday providing a 'warm space' and a selection of fine food at very affordable prices.

BASIC are also using the cafe space for a range of activities which started with a tabletop sale on 22 October.



The charity plans to extend the opening hours and to provide a top-rated facility for the Felixstowe community.

In addition the charity are continuing to expand the ever-popular 'pop-up shops' which they started almost ten years ago. Many in Felixstowe and Ipswich were 'gifted' to those running them on a day-to-day basis at the start of this year and have continued to flourish.

The charity were featured recently on ITV regarding the cost of living crisis and they have also entertained French journalist also reporting on this topic.



Graham Denny, Founder said 'It is so good to see the queues of people being assisted at sites such as in Wadgate Road or at Christchurch and to think they have grown from our original idea into being a tremendous asset to the community'.

So far this year BASIC have opened new 'pop-up shops' across Suffolk ranging from Rendlesham to Holbrook and there are plans for further expansion.

Felixstowe Men's Shed (FMS)



This Autumn has seen a flurry of new members arrive. We continue to benefit from the Hidden Needs Grant from East Suffolk District Council. High emphasis has been placed on Health and Safety with each member being issued with their own container to hold PPE equipment issued to them. The kitchen area has come alive with regular start up breakfasts with fresh coffee or tea.

Having just completed an end of grant monitoring report for ESC it asked for case studies.

Besides community projects members can work on their own and at the same time learn new or develop existing skills.



One member joined The Men's Shed

twelve months ago having suffered a major stroke, restricting movement and speech. He uses the Community FACTS transport to reach us. He started by cleaning items and painting projects. On one occasion FMS chairman took him home and he showed him his detailed Pyrography art work from before his stroke. As a result, the secretary made his own Pyrography set available that saw a change in his ability to partake in renewed Pyrography work. A former HGV driver and with a sense of humour he is gradually recovering his walking and speech, still plenty to do but a marked improvement. This project has enabled new Pyrography equipment to be purchased and used by the member in his recovery.

Another new member has joined, a competent and skilled wood turner who has previously taught the craft and is prepared to help members start from scratch in this wonderful medium. We have two wood lathes. Why not come along and see what is on offer? We are located at 158 High Road, Trimley St. Mary, IP11 0TN and are open 10am – lunchtime Tuesdays and Thursdays and Saturday mornings 9am to 12pm. We will also be open on Christmas Day to entertain and provide lunch for those who would otherwise spend the day at home alone. This Christmas we shall again be hosting a Charity Christmas Tree Festival (Tuesday to Friday 6-10 Dec), for which admission is free.

Any money collected will be used to support our work in the local community. The band already has many engagements, including a number of visits to local schools and care homes etc.

Along with other local groups we are part of the 'Warm Space' project. Our centre will be open on Tuesdays from 10.30am to 3.30pm for those whose need is to be able keep warm in a comfortable environment, and where light refreshments will be available free of charge.

We will also be continuing with our popular weekly programme, including 'Sallywags' - a parent and toddler group that meets on a Monday, Friends Together on a Wednesday, and a children's club, 'Adventurers', on a Thursday.

Update from LevelTwo



Level Two Youth Project is most definitely something Felixstowe can be proud of. Now in its 22nd Year, this project provides a fully comprehensive range of services for children, young people and families. The Project base, "The Hub", is above Tesco in the heart of the town centre. This provides a safe space for young people to meet and is well resourced with activities to



engage young people in meaningful activities to enhance their social and emotional development; as well as just hang out with their friends and have fun!

staffing team at Level Two are passionate and well-equipped to make sure every intervention with a child, young person or family can make a difference or meet a need.

Young people tell us it is often just having a trusted adult outside of the family to talk to that has made



all the difference to

them in making better life choices. Level Two services include 1-1 Mentoring & Counselling, In-school support, and Hub based and Outreach sessions. An exciting new Project for 2023 is a joint venture between East Suffolk Council and Level Two Youth Project. The Felixstowe Skate Park needs a revamp. This area and facility is well used by young people, possibly one of the most used recreational spaces in the Town. However, it also has a reputation for being one of the most troubled spaces. East Suffolk Council & Level Two Youth Project are working with Young People who use the skate park to try to turn this into a more positive space. We are at the Skatepark, Thursdays, $4 \, \text{pm} - 5.30 \, \text{pm}.$

Well, we are a community radio station based in Felixstowe, with Felixstowe listeners, Felixstowe presenters talking about things that Felixstowe people talk about. However, we are much more than that!

Firstly we broadcast locally on 107.5fm to Felixstowe, Shotley, Harwich and Dovercourt.. as well as all those villages in between. Our presenters drink in your pubs and cafes. We also shop in the same shops as you, and eat in the same restaurants. We work in the same town centre, on the road, and at the docks. We stroll along the prom with you in the summer; and are stuck in the same traffic as you when the Orwell Bridge closes! This is what qualifies us as a community radio station.

Commercial radio stations are now run by organisations who, again, have stripped their local content. Felixstowe Radio is stronger than ever. The challenges of lockdown have made us reassess our methods and schedules. We have taken on more new presenters, thereby increasing our "offer" to our listeners. The pandemic highlighted our role in the community. We now work constantly with local charities, organisations, businesses and voluntary groups. We are often the first port of call, when any publicity is needed.

Our membership of volunteers has increased hugely this year, following three open days in July and September. We now have over 75 active volunteer members, all keeping a watchful eye on our beaches and coastal waters.

Reporting to HM Coastguard, we are often the first line in spotting an emergency or even just something of concern. Covering most of our coastline from Felixstowe Ferry to Landguard Point, we do this through physical watching through binoculars as well as CCTV cameras at the mouth of the



Deben, on our lookout at Martello Tower P, and now also at Landguard Point. With a sophisticated array of equipment at our lookout, we can monitor most of our waters up to a 6-mile distance.

Did you know we are a registered charity and rely entirely on fundraising and donations? Every penny donated goes towards renewing and maintaining our equipment as well as paying for our running costs.

This April, one of our watchkeepers, Nick Barrett White was voted in as our Station Manager for the next three years. Nick will continue to develop the station and its abilities to keep everyone safe on the beach and in our waters.



Felixstowe Community Nature Reserve



Felixstowe's Community Nature Reserve is an independent voluntary organization which was founded in May 2015. We work across the local area to try and stop the decline in local wildlife. On 2 July 2022, we helped to organize a climate justice march, the aim of which was to offer local people six solutions to the climate justice challenge which most people can easily apply in their everyday lives. Those solutions are:

- (i) For those who can, walk and/or cycle on short local journeys to reduce emissions of carbon dioxide;
- (ii) Use more public transport where ever possible;
- (iii) Recycle old or obsolete digital devices eg through envirofone.com;

(iv) Install PV panels on the roofs of local homes, public buildings, business premises, and schools;

(v) Eat less meat to reduce demand for land needed to grow cattle feed and therefore reduce deforestation;

(vi) Encourage family, friends and neighbours to do the same.

We are promoting these six climate justice solutions through a wonderful film created for us by Lisa Tyte. You can find it on YouTube using the QR code

Felixstowe's Citizen Science Group has provided us with excellent local data to support the validity of these solutions. For example, they are working with local owners of PV panels to show the amount of carbon dioxide emissions which is saved through the use of PV panels. They have also shown the financial income which PV panels provide. More solutions will be published soon

Happy Anniversary – Litter-Free Felixstowe



This November marks the 4th anniversary of Litter-Free Felixstowe. With over 1200 members, the group remains very active in the community. Its purpose is not just to remove old litter across the town but also to educate and tackle the causes of littering. Clearly volunteers continue to have an impact within the town with many open spaces

being cleared of historic rubbish whilst efforts have been put into engaging with schools, youth groups and businesses. Over recent years, Litter-Free Felixstowe has created a video for schools starring young volunteers and recorded the 'Litter-Free song' recreating the 1970s iconic Coca Cola advert with the hit song 'I'd like to teach the world to sing' recorded with new lyrics.

A group litter-pick is planned for 20 November which will coincide with the 2022 Felixstowe Environment Awards which will celebrate those who care for the Planet. The event takes place at Sea-You café who have kindly agreed to provide refreshments. Above all, Litter-Free Felixstowe hopes to promote the



environment and encourage as many as possible to become involved. Four years on the cause is as relevant as ever, inspired by David Attenborough's Blue Planet series which highlighted the impact of plastic waste on wildlife and the entire eco-system.

Litter-Free Felixstowe is now determined to collaborate with the Highways authority and national haulage companies to clean up the major roads into Felixstowe and educate all road users on the importance of working together to make a difference.

The Secrets of Seaweed



Seaweed is perhaps the last thing most people want to take home from a beachcomb, being seen as slimy and full of flies. But seaweed is an essential part of the entire beach ecosystem.

The slime comes from a mucus layer that helps to prevent seaweed from drying out when not covered by seawater. The breaking down of seaweed by insects is critical for

other beach life. These scavengers help release the seaweed's nutrients, and on our shingle beaches, the remains form a fine layer of "soil" for seeds to germinate

The 650 odd species of UK seaweed use sunlight to photosynthesise (make energy). They are all green, brown, or red and these different seaweeds use pigments to trap light. Some light wavelengths don't filter through the first few metres of water meaning red and brown seaweed can live at greater depths underwater than green seaweed.

The "bubbles" you can pop on seaweed are air bladders which allow them to float upright in the water, closer to the surface

- and the sun. Egg wrack is one of the longest lived seaweeds growing only one bladder a year. The picture shows someone who found a 13 year old piece of egg wrack on a beachcomb - most seaweeds do not live this long!

On a hot, sunny day, lifting up a pile of damp seaweed will reveal hundreds of sheltering insects: beach and sand hoppers, seaweed flies, and sea woodlice - all food for larger insects like spiders and beetles. Always put piles of seaweed back to ensure these insects' survival.

PLEASE BEACHCOMB SUSTAINABLY. Take away as much rubbish as you can but everything else belongs on the beach. Our shingle beaches are a complex & fragile habitat - the plants & animals that live there need that driftwood, shell or stone far more than we do.

Hundreds of new trees to be planted in Felixstowe



Hundreds of Trees are set to be Planted in Felixstowe as Part of a Biodiversity Boosting Initiative

A total of 30 standard trees and 300 whips will take root beside the public car park in Golf Road in an effort to enhance the landscape and encourage natural

regrowth for generations to come.

The planting programme follows a successful joint application to the Local Authority Treescapes Fund (LATF) by East Suffolk Council and Suffolk County Council, along with other district and boroughs, through the Forestry Commission.

The LATF opened in 2021, as part of the government's Nature for Climate Fund, to support the planting and maintenance of 260,000 trees outside existing woodlands. Beginning in the second week of January, grounds and countryside maintenance partners from East Suffolk Norse will focus planting in spaces between the mature maple trees to the front of the carpark - expanding the woodland to the northeast, with a temporary chestnut panel fence installed to protect the new whips. Cllr James Mallinder, East Suffolk Council cabinet member for the Environment, said: "For good reason, trees are sometimes referred to as the lungs of the earth. By converting carbon dioxide into clean air, they are literally helping the planet breathe.

"So, it is vitally important that we not only protect and maintain our existing woodland areas but try to reinforce and enhance it where possible. "We're blessed in this part of the country with a rich and diverse landscape – and I'm delighted that the LATF has allowed us to add to that for the future."

The new trees will be a variety of species, mainly bearing fruits and berries edible to wildlife, and will be regularly watered and surveyed to monitor improvements in biodiversity. The project will also serve as a pilot project for the development of a wider Tree Strategy for East Suffolk Council.

Brilliant Bat Boxes from the Felixstowe Men's Shed



As Halloween has recently elapsed, Felixstowe's busy bats will need a resting place from their spooky duties. These brilliant bat boxes were crafted by the member of the Felixstowe Men's Shed, Paul Braithwaite. Made from scrap wood, without the use of any nails or toxic chemicals, the bat boxes will provide a safe resting place for Felixstowe's winged residents. The bat boxes were fixed to the buildings at Felixstowe Cemetery, an underestimated haven for local wildlife, by the Felixstowe Town Council Grounds Team. Chairman of the Felixstowe Men's Shed, Tony Allen, delivered the bat boxes to Felixstowe Town Hall.

Bat boxes are artificial roosts designed to provide bats with alternative resting places or to encourage bats into areas where there are few existing suitable roost sites. There are 18 species of bat in the UK, all of which are protected under European law.

Bat populations in the UK have declined dramatically over the past century due to persecution and habitat loss. But bat boxes play a part in helping to bring populations closer to previous numbers.

Landguard Nature Reserve

Over the last century, bat populations have declined considerably, due to the loss of foraging habitats, a decline in insect populations and the loss of roosting features across the landscape.

At Landguard Nature Reserve, the Ranger and volunteers have been conducting bat surveys using detectors, to learn more about the type of bats visiting the peninsula. Knowing more about bats at Landguard is important, as the information learned will influence future site management decisions.

There are 18 species of bat in the UK, and so far, at least 9 species have been recorded visiting the Nature Reserve and many species have been recorded flying around the old Mine Station building. In light of this, a new project was initiated to create hibernacula within the building, to provide roosting opportunities. This was done

by creating and installing features such as modified bricks, imitation wood cladding and hessian sacking, all of which provide voids and crevices for bats to roost.

A hibernacula is a place where bats seek refuge over winter, but the installed features also provide opportunities for summer roosting too.

This project was funded by the Coast & Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Sustainable Development Fund and the Harwich Haven Authority (HHA).



HHA funded handheld detectors and fenced the building to reduce disturbance and the Coast & Heaths Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Sustainable Development Fund, provided funding for the roosting features and recording equipment.

Thanks to the support of funders and hardworking volunteers, the features are now in place. Going forward, the building will be monitored using bat detectors and recording equipment and it is hoped that some of the bats visiting Landguard will also roost here.


A Window into the Future for **Felixstowe Town Council**



Felixstowe Town Council takes a look through a window into a more sustainable future with refurbishments to the windows of the Town Hall. Using a new, recently developed glass, Fineo Glass, which has the lowest thermal transmittance of 0.7 w/m2.k, this refurbishment will see the insulating properties of previous, single-glazed Town Hall windows greatly improved.

Using a product that rated high for energy efficiency was very important to the Council, whilst respecting the heritage of the building which is located in a conservation area. The wooden window frames will be refurbished depending on their existing condition. The existing springs, some of which are failing, will be replaced with new traditional sash cords and weights.

It is hoped that the work, which should take approximately 8 weeks, will commence in January 2023. Scaffolding is likely to be in place for 8-12 weeks whilst this work



is taking place. At times, this may impact the accessibility of the Town Hall. However, the disabled entrance through the back entrance of the Town Hall will be available for use throughout this period.



Harvest House Then and Now



Harvest House is a prominent building in Felixstowe with an impressive history. Did vou know...?

1891: Family of German Kaiser Willhelm stays at South Beach Mansion, promoting Felixstowe as a healthy spa resort.

1903: To meet the popular demand for visitor accommodation, the neo-

Jacobean 'Balmoral Hotel' (soon to become the 'Felix Hotel'), designed by Thomas Cotman for Douglas Tollemache was completed.

1920: Tollemache sells the hotel to the Great Eastern Railway Company (later the London North Eastern Railway Company).

1936: Wallis Simpson (the future Duchess of Windsor) takes a room at the hotel whilst awaiting her divorce from her second husband, Ernest Simpson. Staff at the hotel were sworn to keep her identity secret.

1952: Following financial difficulties, the hotel is sold to Fison Fertilisers and used it as the company's head office for the next 30 years.

1985: The former hotel is converted into residential apartments.

Today: In addition to its residents, Harvest House now hosts weddings and events, such as the Felixstowe Book Festival, Christmas events and an upcoming performance from Christina Johnston, international Soprano superstar. Find out more about the history of Harvest House and upcoming events here:

Cost-of-Living Surviving Winter Appeal 2022

The 12th Surviving Winter Appeal this year has been widened and will now help Suffolk people, with a three-pronged focus on 'fuel, food and support'. With many people



already facing problems due to rapid increases in the cost of living, this year the annual appeal has been extended and renamed 'Suffolk Cost of Living Surviving Winter Appeal'. Grants to help pay for fuel will be available as before, (to people of all ages), some food projects will be supported, and local charities, which are themselves facing huge challenges, could also be helped. The Appeal is a joint initiative by Suffolk Community Foundation, Citizens Advice Ipswich, and Suffolk Councils' 'Warm Homes Healthy People'.

"Across the county there are many wonderful food projects, large and small, and this year the Appeal will give grants to help some of those providing food to meet the increased demand we know they are seeing. We also want to help other smaller Suffolk charities who offer essential help and enable people to be self-sufficient, but are themselves facing challenges with stretched budgets," Melanie Craig, the Chief Executive of Suffolk Community Foundation explained. "We are very grateful for the support of the Suffolk Building Society who are a donation point for us."

In 2021/22, the Appeal raised nearly a quarter of a million pounds and provided warmth and other vital financial advice and support to over 1800 households across Suffolk

"Our challenge now is to ensure that this year's appeal is our most successful yet. As always, we encourage people to hold on to their Winter Fuel Payment and other cost of living support if they need it to stay warm and well this winter. However, in the long held 'Don't Need it, Donate it' spirit of this appeal, we ask that those who can make a donation, perhaps from their Government's Winter Fuel Allowance, donate it to the Appeal". The latest local data shows the sharpest rise in fuel poverty in Suffolk that we have witnessed for some time. Despite local and national government support, it is estimated that a further 20,000 households (75,000 in total) are now struggling to meet their living costs and heat their homes as winter approaches.

Boost continues to provide a full time chaplaincy service at Felixstowe School for staff and students, supporting individuals and providing a range of club, activities and reflective spaces for all.

Hive Outdoor Learning Update

Last term we developed 'Hive Outdoor Learning', a small group programme for engaging young people in understanding more about themselves and the world around them through gardening and outdoor learning. This developed from the already successful Garden Club running in the school garden multiple times per week. Students have enjoyed these sessions, with one commenting "coming out here [in the Garden] brightens my day", which is so lovely to hear, even when the weather isn't great! We look forward to seeing students continue to engage positively with this programme, and seeing the benefits of this in other aspects of the school and personal life too.

Bereavement Support Update

One of our areas of specialist pastoral support is in times of bereavement. Compared to this time last year, the number of students being supported by the chaplaincy for bereavement has more than doubled. It appears there is an increased need across all schools for young people to have some additional help exploring emotions that surround death, dying and loss. Whilst these are very difficult situations, we are really pleased that this support is available in school for those who need it.

Reflection Room Update

Our chaplain is based in the Reflection Room, which is described as a 'safe and special space for contemplation, prayer and reflection'. Throughout the year, this space responds to the needs of the school community, and has featured art installations around refugee week, space to reflect around remembrance day, and was also a place to commemorate the life and reign of Queen Elizabeth II. This term we have been delighted to welcome visitors from other schools who are excited by the potential of how a space like this could work in other schools too.

Felixstowe Volunteer Centre to Close its Doors



Felixstowe Volunteer Centre to Close its Doors

Following a recent Trustees meeting it has sadly been decided to close and cease all the services

previously offered by the FVC. FVC a charitable organisation has been operating since 1980, providing services to the residents of Felixstowe and the surrounding area. The Trustees having voted to cease operations, has quoted the following reasons for its decision.

- Following the austerity measures introduced some three years ago FVC lost its grant from the local authority, this caused great financial hardship to the organisation which without support from private individuals, local companies and other organisations would have closed the organisation even sooner. Fundraising has helped but the FVC over the last three years has had to tap into its reserves which have fast depleted.
- Due to the Coronavirus pandemic FVC was unable to operate fully for over a year. The pandemic also resulted in the loss of some volunteers and as a direct result, client numbers have also fallen. Post pandemic it has been extremely hard to recruit additional volunteers, this combined with the reduction in clients requiring help has contributed to the decision to close the charity.

The Trustees would like to thank all the volunteers past and present that have given up their time over the many years that the charity has operated, without their dedication none of the good work done would have been possible. The committee would also like to thank the many private individuals, organisations and companies in the area that have offered financial support over the years.

Sandra Hunter the charities co-ordinator added that like the Trustees she is saddened that the FVC has got to close its doors. Sandra has met many hardworking volunteers during her time at the centre and has engaged with many clients.

Sandra has also confirmed that the FVC will stop its services at the end of December 2022, any clients that will still need help may wish to contact one of the other charitable services that are available in our wonderful town.

Sandra has also said that the FVC email will continue to operate for 30 days after the centre closes just in case anyone needs guidance or help to engage with another organisation.

The 1953 Floods

The BBC stated in a documentary in 2003, the 1953 flood was "one of the greatest forgotten events in British History". The 70th Anniversary occurs at the end of January 2023. 307 people in Great Britain including 41 in Felixstowe lost lives, 40,000 homes were evacuated nationally



including over 600 in Felixstowe, 990 miles of East Coastline was affected including the West End of Felixstowe and Felixstowe Ferry. The East Coast floods of 1953, caused by an unusual North Sea surge and unique weather conditions, can be recounted in stark facts but there was a human cost to families including in Felixstowe which is perpetuated even today.

Before the 70th anniversary, a new book detailing peoples' experiences of that horrific weekend and the aftermath will be published. "Never To Be Forgotten- the Felixstowe Floods of 1953" is the work of Jean Macpherson who has interviewed over 50 people, researched, verified fact from fiction and tried to bring that volume of evidence together in a comprehensive account in words and pictures. A special chapter researching those who lost their lives is included and the book is dedicated to those 41.

Accompanying the launch of the book, there will be a special memorial quilt to remember the 41 and the survivors made by myself and friends. As one person expressed it succinctly "more people will learn about the stories of those in Felixstowe and beyond and how it impacted whole families and communities for generations. We will be their voice and they will be heard and remembered."

Look out for the book and quilt and other events for the 70th Anniversary in January 2023

Ukraine2Felixstowe

Moving On



It is now nearly nine months since the Russian invasion of Ukraine, shortly after which British hosts began opening up their homes to provide refuge for fleeing Ukrainians. The need for safe

accommodation for these people has not gone away. Indeed, as there seems little sign of the war ending and the Russians having destroyed much of Ukraine's energy infrastructure, the Ukrainian Government has asked those of their citizens currently out of the country not to



return until at least the Spring.

Under the UK Government's Homes4Ukraine scheme, hosts were asked to offer accommodation for a minimum period of 6 months and up to one year. It has been a rewarding, but often challenging, period for those involved as both hosts and guests navigated the demands of living with complete strangers from a different culture.

Most of our Ukrainian guests have now settled into our lovely town, obtained school places for their children and secured employment. Over recent weeks, Ukraine2Felixstowe has been supporting Suffolk County Council in its recruitment drive for more hosts and enabling Ukrainians to move into local private rental properties. This has proved challenging in a highly competitive environment, but it is pleasing to see many Ukrainians now living independently. No one knows how long the war will continue and finding safety and security in our town has been so important.

Felixstowe's response to the Ukrainian crisis has been magnificent and particular thanks are owed to the sponsors / hosts who have selflessly offered their homes over many months. Their support has been invaluable, and it has created strong bonds with the Ukrainian families who will be forever grateful for the kindness shown to them. More rental properties and/or new hosts will be required in the New Year, particularly for single mothers and their children whose husbands will still be based in Ukraine for the foreseeable future. Marking Remembrance 2022 with the Felixstowe Royal British Legion

Felixstowe Town Council was proud to mark Armistice Day on 11 November and Remembrance Sunday on 13 November 2022. Thousands of residents from Felixstowe and beyond gather at Felixstowe War Memorial to remember those lives lost in times of conflict.

Felixstowe really does a great job in remembering the fallen from all sides during times of conflict. As the custodians of Remembrance, the Royal British Legion, are at the centre of this.

During the Remembrance period we hold the RBL Poppy Appeal, where all the money raised goes to helping the RBL with their welfare and support work for serving military, veterans and their families. In Felixstowe we have stalls in Morrisons and the large CoOp in town, and I would like to thank the managers and staff of those stores for all the help they give. We also hold a launch event at the Triangle which this year saw performances from Christina Johnston, Veterans Do Dixie and The TCR band from Felixstowe School. Members of 23 Parachute Engineer Regiment there with one of their vehicles, along with a number of vintage military vehicles were also present. The cadet units took part in a parade through the shared space finishing at the Triangle for an address from the Mayor. I would personally like to thank everyone that helped with Poppy Appeal this year; the people that spent hours manning the stalls, the volunteers that delivered and collected all of the tins and boxes to local businesses, and of course everyone that donated.


One of the main events during Remembrance is The Festival of Remembrance, which takes place at the Spa Pavilion. It was an amazing evening with great entertainment and a very moving Act of Remembrance. Consisting of a performances from The TCR Band, Christina Johnston, Felixstowe Harmonies and the Corps of Drums from The Royal Hospital School. The local cadet units also took part on stage each providing a 10 minute demonstration. The Act of Remembrance was led by the RBL Branch Chaplain, Reverend Andrew Dotchin and the music was provided by the excellent RBL Leiston Band. We were honoured that the Lord Lieutenant of Suffolk, Lady Euston, attended the evening alongside one of her Deputies and the Mayor of Felixstowe.

In 2019, Leanne Bucknall and I researched all the names on the Felixstowe War Memorial as we wanted to know more about each name, as a result of this research we created a website, www.felixstoweremembers.com, and the Felixstowe Remembers Street Signs. Each year since the signs have been put in every road in Felixstowe where someone that died during a world war lived. There are 64 such roads.

At the Triangle in town you will see the Field of Remembrance, made up of a cross for every person from Felixstowe killed during the First or Second World War. There are 164 crosses for WW1 and 112 for WW2. Every year members of the community also lay their own crosses to remember their

relatives or friends.

On Friday 11 November Felixstowe Royal British Legion and Felixstowe Town Council held an Armistice Day Service at the War Memorial where we were joined by a couple of hundred people and also school children for each of the local schools. During the service the Mayor and I laid wreaths






On Remembrance Sunday we held a church service at St John's in Orwell Road, this was followed by a parade, involving soldiers from 23 Parachute Engineer Regiment, Sea, Army and Air Cadets and members from local Scout and Guides units. The parade marched down to the War Memorial where we held a service accompanied by the band from the Salvation Army. It was amazing to see so many people down there, I don't know exactly how many but I would estimate over 1000 in the gardens and along the prom. All in all we do so much as a town for Remembrance and I would like to thank every single person involved with organising or taking part in any of these events. As a veteran, I can assure you that having the support of the local community, businesses and groups means so much to all veterans, serving military and their families.
