

The Peace Prayer

Lord, make us instrument of your peace,
Where there is hatred, let me sow love;
Where there is injury, pardon;
Where there is discord, union;
Where there is doubt, faith;
Where there is despair, hope;

Where there is sadness, joy.

Grant that we may not so much seek to be consoled as to console;

This prayer (often attributed to St Francis) was written in 1915 by a chaplain in the French Army after his soldiers asked him for a prayer to take with them into the trenches.
