Scouts from all around the world will renew their promises on this day and remind themselves of what it means to be a scout, a member of the largest youth movement in the world.

As Mayor of Felixstowe, you become an honorary President of the Scouts Association. I was delighted to visit their headquarters at Hallow Trees – that amazing space has adventure written all over it! I also discovered the reason the Scouts use a left handshake. This is associated with the Ashanti warriors whom Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of Scouting, knew over 70 years ago in West Africa. He saluted them with his right hand, but the Ashanti chiefs offered their

left and said, 'In our land only the bravest of the brave shake hands with the left hand, because to do so we must drop our shields and our protection'. The Ashanti knew of Baden-Powell's bravery for they had fought against him and with him, and were proud to offer him the left hand of bravery.

May brings three Bank Holidays this year and another opportunity to put up the flags and bunting. The Coronation Big Lunch will be calling on people to share food and fun together on May 6, 7 and 8 in a nationwide act of celebration and friendship. It can be anything from a cup of tea with a neighbour to a huge community party. Whether you're planning a street party, decking your road in red, white and blue, or scheduling a different celebration, there is funding to help from the Town Council – see page 25.

The Big Help Out on May 8 will highlight the positive impact volunteering has on communities. Felixstowe has lost a lot of volunteers during Covid. So we are encouraging people to try volunteering for themselves and to support their local area to create a lasting volunteering legacy from the Coronation Weekend. Over the past few months I have visited so many local groups and communities and I know how strong and united we are. Let's show the rest of Suffolk what Felixstowe can do!



There is a wide range of Fairtrade products available to buy in local shops. Most of the supermarkets sell Fairtrade coffee, tea, bananas, sugar and chocolate. But you can also buy Fairtrade wine, Fairtrade flowers, Fairtrade ice cream and even Fairtrade cotton buds locally too. Do look out for the Fairtrade logo which ensures that the goods you buy provide a fair wage and decent working conditions for producers in the developing world. You can also enjoy Fairtrade drinks in local cafés. The Spa, 129 Café Bar and the Little Ice Cream Co all serve Fairtrade tea, with Greggs also serving Fairtrade coffee, hot chocolate and orange juice. Fairtrade tea and coffee are also available at Trinity Methodist Church's coffee morning every Thursday from 10 – 12 noon. All are welcome.

DIScoverABILITY – a friendship network in the world of disability.



Lisa Tyte and I initially set up DIScoverABILITY to discuss such attitudes. Our aim was to break down those stereotypes and open up the misconceptions about disabilities. In our weekly hour-long programme on Felixstowe Radio, along with our guests, we discuss all sorts

of disability, both visible and those not immediately obvious.

The discussion needs to be two-way. Those living with a disability, and those without, need to know how to communicate with each other. We all know to speak to the person in the wheelchair if they are the customer, and not to the person pushing it. Conversely, if you have a disability, then discuss with us and tell us how you would like to be addressed or spoken to. Terminology is tricky, as nobody wants to offend by using the wrong words, No doubt I have done it here several times!

On the face of it, Felixstowe is a pretty accessible town. Just think of the miles of wide, level promenade. The main shopping area round Hamilton Road is, on the whole, traffic free and a pleasure to shop.... or is it?

Felixstowe Floods of 1953



The 1953 Felixstowe Flood 70th Anniversary events took place at the end of January. From the weekend before to the actual anniversary on 31st January the Town commemorated the 41 who died on that horrific night. The Mayor, Cllr Sharon Harkin, opened the commemoration at a book launch in Felixstowe Town Library. The book was written especially



to coincide with the 70th commemoration.
Local historian and the Felixstowe Society
Joint Archivist, Jean
Macpherson published
"The Felixstowe Floods of 1953 – Never to Be
Forgotten." This title proved the lasting message of the weekend as the 41 who lost their lives were remembered.

Jean had interviewed over 50 people to produce a new comprehensive account of the Felixstowe Floods, with new untold stories, timelines and maps.

On Sunday 29th February St John's was the venue for a poignant reminder of the events with readings, songs from the era and the reading out of the names of the 41. Many survivors and survivors' families were joined by dignitaries including Dr Therese Coffey MP and the Deputy Lord Lieutenant of Suffolk, Ms Gulshan Kayembe.



On the actual day of the anniversary the Mayor laid a wreath in short ceremony at the Flood Memorial garden in Langer Road. The 41 names were read out as the Langer Primary Academy children laid lights in memory. The Memorial had been refurbished for the 70th Anniversary by the Town Council with new signage, a new bench and planting and cleaning of the other features.

Later that night a large group gathered to walk around the local area. Stopping at each road where the 41 lived, their names and their lives were read out as the lights from the morning service were switched off in a touching act of remembrance. At each road the new Flood Signs from Felixstowe Remembers sponsored by Astral Global Logistics were passed on the lampposts in the streets. Each sign records the name, age and dwelling of the 41 that died from that road. Much like the signs used for the Remembrance of the Heroes in November, these will be put up each year and are a fitting lasting memory of the 70th Anniversary.

At midnight the St John bell tolled 41 times as this was the time many had been in danger and started the loss of life on that early morning of 1st February.

A Town Council working group which included co-opted members Rev Canon Andrew Dotchin from Felixstowe Parish, Jean Macpherson a local historian and author, Sarah Hollingham from the Environment Agency and David Gledhill from Felixstowe Museum all contributed to the town's commemoration. Much publicity and recording of events can be viewed on catch up platforms on BBC Radio Suffolk and ITV as well as on the Felixstowe Remembers website- www.felixstoweremembers.com and the new Facebook page – search "Felixstowe Floods 1953" and join the group. Jean's book is available in Stillwater Books, Nick Barber's Auctions both in Hamilton Road and the Felixstowe Library or from Jean herself.

The events of 1953 were tragic but in remembering the 41 we are remembering a pivotal moment in Felixstowe's history. Flood warnings and flood defences have moved on to prevent such a loss again. We owe it as a town never to forget those 41 as we are reminded of the ever-present power of the sea which must never be underestimated. Real people, real lives, never to be forgotten.

Felixstowe Allotment Association



Allotment Production Project 2022

To demonstrate the benefits of working an allotment we decided to record all that we produced and the time spent on various tasks over a whole year.

Fresh air, exercise, good things to eat and talking to like-minded people are all the physical advantages of having an allotment but what are the other rewards?

We have two single plots – his 'n hers – which amount to 280 sq.m of which we crop 180 sq.m, or 2/3 of the total. We grew 70 varieties of vegetables and soft fruit. We aim to have something from the plot to eat every single day of the year. The harvest total for the year was 350kg – just shy of 1kg/day – and the total value amounted to £1,330, or £25/week. The crops were valued against Tesco's basic on-line prices for ordinary produce.

What we grow would qualify as organic which carries a hefty premium with most retailers. We did a price comparison between Tesco and Eversfield Organic, who deliver boxes of vegetables and fruit and discovered that we would pay 54% more for the organic stuff. Tesco's organic courgettes are 82% more expensive, If we bought all our vegetables and fruit from Eversfield we would have to pay £40/week plus a delivery charge of £6.95. There is no fresh soft fruit available in the winter so I guess that there would be a further premium to pay for that in season. Against this Tesco's price for non-organic would be £25. Our costs amount to £3.85/week or 1/12th of the Eversfield price.

Our labour to produce all this amounts to 334 hours for me and half that for Delia. Less than 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours a day between us.

Half the time was spent on maintenance, which included plot preparation, weeding and tidying up whilst the rest was fairly evenly divided between watering, planting and sowing, harvest and pottering. Why did we carry out this exercise? Partly for our own information but also to show what it is possible to produce from a small area of land and to demonstrate to people new to allotments that the rewards make it all worthwhile. We have a more comprehensive report which we are happy to share.

Felixstowe Community Nature Reserve

Felixstowe's Community Nature Reserve is working with its partners to educate and encourage local people about ways in which we can all contribute toward climate justice.

We are promoting twelve climate justice solutions which have been developed in collaboration with local residents. Those solutions are

(i) For those who can, walk and / or cycle on short local journeys to reduce emissions of CO2;

(ii)Use public transport where ever possible;

(iii)Recycle old or obsolete digital devices;

(iv)Install PV panels on the roofs of local homes, public buildings, business premises and schools;

(v)Eat less meat to reduce demand for land needed to grow cattle feed and therefore reduce deforestation;

(vi)Encourage family, friends and neighbours to do the same;

(vii)Encourage local people to use electric and / or hybrid vehicles;

(viii) Use smart meters to monitor and manage domestic energy consumption;

(ix)Adopt car sharing where ever possible;

(x)Use more home insulation to reduce demand for energy;

(xi)Support Felixstowe's Fairtrade Forum;

(xii)Local school children to encourage their families to adopt these solutions.

Across the Felixstowe area, these solutions have been shared through social media and Spotlight on Felixstowe which takes our message into at least 15,000 local homes. More broadly, the online magazine East Anglian Bylines has published a beautiful feature on these solutions. Across the UK, the National Biodiversity Network has shared a similar article with its membership.

Beach Bonkers: Netted Dog Whelk Shells



These are probably my favourite shell to find as I think they're beautiful. Netted dog whelks and their shells are common on our shingle shores but hard to spot as they are quite small. I love how solid their shell is and that the opening is oval rather than round.

Their criss-crossing ridges give rise to part of their Latin name: reticulata, meaning marked like a net. I love the description I've read of their chequered markings as looking like "brown hair in a hair net". However, for me, they're very definitely not brown, but can show shades of peach, apricot, and pink.

They are a carnivorous sea snail that can be found sheltering under stones and in sand, and are usually found below the low water mark. They come out in large colonies to scavenge and feed on dead and decaying animals on the beach, such as dead fish and crabs - the original beach cleaners!

Like many "sea snails" they are carnivores and will use the lip or edge of their shell to prise and hold open bivalves and then rasp away at the meat inside with their proboscis.

One of the books I read researching this article said "it is instructive to see how quickly it frightens off other molluscs when placed with them in an aquarium; scallop shells flit about in alarm as soon as one is placed near them."

Cleaners, carnivores and possibly a little bit creepy?!

PLEASE BEACHCOMB SUSTAINABLY. Take

away as much rubbish as you can but everything else belongs on the beach. Our shingle beaches are a complex & fragile habitat - the plants & animals that live there need that driftwood, shell or stone far more than we do.

Help East Suffolk bloom by joining new planting campaign!



Colourful crops of daffodils are set to bloom across East Suffolk following the launch of a new perennial planting initiative.

Voluntary and community groups are

being encouraged to join the campaign by applying for bundles of bulbs to plant locally in time for next spring.

In previous years, East Suffolk Council has gifted bulbs to a number of groups in the north of the district, via commercial partner East Suffolk Norse.

For 2023, the scheme will be opened up for any voluntary and community group across the entire district to plant bulbs on public land.

East Suffolk Blooms officially gets underway in February - with groups required to complete a simple application form by 31 May, ahead of a decision panel meeting to determine applications in June.



Successful groups will then be invited to collect their bulbs from depots in either Ufford or Lowestoft in early November.

A different variety of bulbs will be on offer, in limited number, each year. For 2023, the bulbs will be a variety of narcissus, available in bundles of 500, although groups may apply for more than one bundle.

Cllr James Mallinder, campaign champion and East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for the Environment, said: "This is another example of our commitment to ensuring we champion and enhance our natural environments.

"Aside from creating a patchwork of colour, this campaign will generate a new network of pollinators across East Suffolk.

"I would encourage voluntary and community groups to join the campaign and help East Suffolk bloom. Together, we can ensure the environmental sustainability of our communities and create a lasting legacy."

Last year, 200 oak trees were distributed to communities across East Suffolk to plant in commemoration of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee.

The 'Treebilee' scheme was launched by the then Prince of Wales, now King Charles III, to encourage the planting of trees during a year of celebrations to mark The Queen's 70-year reign.

A total of 30 standard trees and 300 whips are also set to be planted beside the public car park in Golf Road, Felixstowe, as part of a Suffolk-wide programme following a successful joint bid to the Government's Local Authority Treescapes Fund (LATF).

Furthermore, East Suffolk Council's 'Pardon the weeds, we're feeding the bees' campaign has, for the last three years, allowed grass and wildflowers to grow in more than 100 spaces in order to help wildlife thrive.

Our ambition to become a carbon neutral council, in terms of our assets and operations, and to reach carbon neutrality by 2030, includes trialling alternatives to glyphosate sprays.

No sprays or pesticides are used in council-owned cemeteries and closed churchyards, unless as a final resort to remove invasive species, and glyphosate spraying on East Suffolk Council land has reduced by 45%.

The MeetUpMondays™ network is 5 years old this February and has been helping to lift people out of loneliness since 2018. If you haven't heard of it before, MeetUpMondays is a network of pubs and cafés giving people the opportunity for some friendly company and conversation

over a free cuppa once a week. An initiative developed by Suffolk's Rural Coffee Caravan charity, it enables anyone who finds they're spending more time alone than they would like, somewhere to go to for a guaranteed warm welcome, connecting them to others and to their community. For pub landlords and visitors alike – it's been a feelgood life change. What makes people want to give it a go?

One MeetUpMondays volunteer, Debbie Robson, describes it perfectly:

"The reasons for people coming along are varied. Often the hardest thing for them is that first step through the door but once they see a few smiling faces and how welcome they are it makes them feel comfortable to join

We often have new residents to the town join us. They all say MeetUpMondays has helped them connect with their new community and has made them feel included much quicker than they thought.

Many come along as they live alone and especially after the weekend it is somewhere to come to where they feel welcome and know they will be able to chat. Many new friendships have been formed, it's not unusual for folk to find they are chatting to a near neighbour who they have never spoken to previously or just waved at in passing.

Others are carers and know that MeetUpMondays is a chance for a

break from their responsibilities for a couple of hours. Again, they know they will always find someone to chat to and have some light conversation and laughs. We even have couples who say that coming along and seeing other people gives them a break from just talking to each other all the time!

Hundreds of people who suffer directly and indirectly from gambling harms will have the opportunity to access free support, thanks to a new partnership between

Suffolk Mind and GamFam.

Suffolk Mind, the local mental health charity, has partnered with Suffolkbased national charity GamFam to provide free courses, counselling and peer support services to 340 people in the county.

Jon Neal, Suffolk Mind CEO, said: "This great new partnership is going to make a real difference to those in our county experiencing, or living with someone who has been harmed by gambling.

"Unfortunately, people may be turning to gambling as a way to get through the cost of living crisis - but the fact remains the same, gambling is not a solution.

"We want to make Suffolk the best place in the world to talk about and take care of mental health - and it is so important people living with addiction know support is out there."

The 12-month pilot scheme follows a £100,000 grant from BeGambleAware.

Sessions available through the partnership include a half-day mental health essentials course, a workshop on how to get a good night's sleep, and a one-hour session on how breathing techniques can help relieve stress, anxiety and

Felixstowe Salvation Army: Serving the Local Community



Like many churches, following lockdown we saw a decrease in the number of those attending worship, along with our other activities and events

Music is a very important part of our worship. Our band and songsters (mixed voice choir) for various reasons saw a decline in membership. With both groups still numbering twenty plus, we are still blessed with good musicians and singers, so both groups still maintain a very high standards of presentation.



Each Sunday at 10.30am both the band and songsters participate and enhance our Morning Worship. Today, the band still features prominently in participating in our outdoor ministry by taking the Gospel message out into the community. So we can still be described as the church on the street corner. Most Sundays throughout the year a group from the band provides the music for our short outdoor service at mid-day at The Triangle — a service for those who for whatever reason don't wish to attend a church.

During the year Felixstowe Band and Songsters often assist other Salvation Army corps in the area, plus supporting other local organisations and churches, as well as participating at civic events. They also present the occasional concert—the next being a free concert on Saturday 1st April at The Salvation Army, to raise funds with a retiring collection for the annual Big Collection to support various community projects.

New Sixth Form Build

Felixstowe School's Sixth Form has been flourishing over the recent years, with student numbers continuing to grow. Since 2019, when the Head of Sixth Form Mr X. Norte arrived, university applications have increased from 42% of the year to 70%, which shows that expectations and ambitions within Felixstowe are continuously growing and developing, especially within an area which has a low university uptake.

Not only has post-18 aspirations been growing, but the student wellbeing too. With a completely new Sixth Form centre, the school has provided students with the opportunity to study both independently and collaboratively with the new study rooms, as well as building a common room and kitchen in the hope that students will take advantage of this and action the independence given to them into their studies. Access to support from teachers and peers has never been so easy, which has been integral for promoting mental health within the department.

With a new year comes a new cohort of students, subjects and teachers. This year, multiple new subjects have been introduced to broaden the knowledge and horizons for aspirations, with high-quality staff matching to these subjects. This cohort of students is the largest since 2016, with the Sixth Form having grown by 50% between 2019 and 2023. Not only did this improve massively, but results too, where GCSE and A-Level results within the school broke records last year, with everyone who applied for university being accepted onto their course

Felixstowe School's Sixth Form is definitely one to look out for. With the growing numbers in popularity and success, we can only guess where the Sixth Form will be this time next year.

Have you registered to vote?

To vote in the local elections on 4 May, you must be registered to vote by 11.59pm on Monday 17 April. It only takes a few minutes: www.gov.uk/ register-to-vote.

You Must Have Photo ID to Vote

If you're voting at a polling station in the local elections on 4 May, you will need to bring photo ID, such as a passport or a driving licence.

If you don't have a passport, don't worry! Other forms of photo ID can be used, including a Blue Badge, bus pass, proof of age card and more. You can check what ID can be used at www. electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id/accepted-forms-photo-id.

And if you don't have any photo ID, then you can apply for free voter ID instead before 25 April: www.electoralcommission.org.uk/i-am-a/voter/voter-id.

Postal Votes

If you're registered to vote, you can apply for a postal vote now – whether it's because you'll



be unable to attend the polling station due to holiday or work commitments, or simply because it is more convenient to you: www. electoralcommission.org.uk/apply-vote-post.

Proxy Votes

If you are registered to vote but are unable to get to your polling station on 4 May, you can apply for a proxy vote where you can get someone you trust to cast your vote for you.
