

An Update from the Mayor's Charities

The Mayor's chosen charities for the year 2024-25 are The Landguard Trust and Breast Friends CIC. You can read more about the charities, the important work they undertake in Felixstowe and the surrounding area, and an exciting year of upcoming charity events below.

Landguard Trust



Ihe Landguard and Felixstowe **Conservation Trust** (Landguard Trust,) partners with Landguard Fort, Felixstowe Museum and the Landguard Bird Observatory, to conserve and promote the historic buildings and artefacts and protect the natural environment on this piece of land at the southern-most point of Felixstowe.



We also manage Landguard Nature Reserve which is a designated Local Nature Reserve (LNR) due to its value to the local community and a Site of Special Scientific Interest





(SSSI) because of its high wildlife conservation value, such as its rare, vegetated shingle habitat and botanical species.

With a Grade 1 listed building, an accredited Museum and a 33-hectare nature reserve, found next to the Harwich Haven and the Port of Felixstowe, we are both a visitor



attraction and a volunteering hub. Conservation and learning are at the heart of everything we do, focusing on the key themes of history, maritime and nature.

Collaborating with our stakeholders we aim to take Landguard forward in the next stages of its evolution, and with the support of the Mayor will improve facilities for the local community, and visitors, while safeguarding the nationally Important historical site and protecting the unique natural environment. We are supporting the Fort in their plans to improve visitor facilities and are helping the Museum to manage its collection.



We will soon be unfolding exciting plans to improve understanding of the Nature Reserve and provide to educational facilities as well as reintroducing a new fresh water habitat.

Many of our half a million visitors to Landguard every year come to the see the activities in the Port and on the river, so we are planning to improve and install new ways to interpret what is happening in the Haven.

We are delighted to have been selected as one of the Mayor's Charities, alongside Breast Friends, and are looking forward to working on some exciting Fundraising events during the forthcoming year.



Breast Friends CIC



reast Friends CIC are thrilled to have been selected as one of Felixstowe Mayor's Charities for this year, alongside Landguard Trust. Our mission is to connect people affected by breast cancer and to raise awareness of the disease, providing vital support to our community.

Felixstowe Area Community Transport Service (FACTS) is delighted to have recently benefited from a donation of £5,000 from the Fred Alford Charitable Trust.
Operations Supervisor, Laura Kempson explained, "This generous donation from a valued supporter has

come at a time when we have just launched a fundraising campaign to raise £30,000 for the purchase of a new modular building to replace our existing office, as it is now beyond economic repair".



FACTS offer affordable and accessible transport to anyone of any age whose access to public transport is limited by an impairment. Our Garrison Lane base consists of an office pod, plus a mess/storage area for our volunteers. The office is the base of our operations; it is from here staff take bookings from passengers and co-ordinate our vehicles, volunteers, and operations.

FACTS Chairman, Simon Jennings added, "The hugely welcomed funds from the Fred Alford Trust, a Charitable body that last year helped to finance a new accessible minibus for our fleet, lays the very foundations for this essential project. FACTS have allocated funds towards groundworks and ancillaries, but is seeking support from grant makers, local businesses, and individual donors as the total cost of the project is expected to be around £30,000".

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🙎 Felixstowe Fairtrade Forum

We have some exciting news to share in this edition of the Town Council Magazine. We are planning a visit to Felixstowe in September by our Fairtrade champion from Kenya, Patrick Kaberia, and we are actively fund raising to make this possible.

Patrick first came to Suffolk in 2016 as part of a visit to the UK organised by the Fairtrade Foundation. He spent a week in the county, starting off with a breakfast reception at Felixstowe Town Hall, hosted by the Town Council. (The photo shows him with the former Mayor, Doreen

Savage.) He also met local school children and young people at the Level 2 Youth Project and members of the public at a coffee morning.

From Felixstowe Patrick went on to visit the other Fairtrade towns in Suffolk, where he made a big impression – meeting all age groups and promoting the Fairtrade cause. The tour of Suffolk was co-ordinated by the Felixstowe Fairtrade Forum and, as a result of the successful collaboration with the other Fairtrade towns in the county, we sponsored the setting up of the Suffolk Association of Fairtrade Towns (SAFT), now with membership of all nine Fairtrade towns in Suffolk. Patrick has kept in contact with us since his visit and, in 2018, he agreed to become the Patron of SAFT.

This year Fairtrade Fortnight has moved to September and we learned that our colleagues in Wiltshire were planning to raise funds to bring Patrick to the UK for a tour of their county during the fortnight. We have now negotiated with Wiltshire an extension of the tour to include a short visit to Suffolk – provided we can raise the necessary funds to meet our share of the costs.

If things work out as planned, Patrick will arrive in Felixstowe on Friday 20th September and spend the next day in the Felixstowe/Ipswich area before moving on to Bury St Edmunds and then Beccles. Among our plans for him in Felixstowe are for him to meet young people and their parents and carers at our popular Family Fun Day to be held at the library on Saturday 21st September. As well as the opportunity to meet Patrick, there will be fun and games and a chocolate fountain – more details later.

To make the visit even more memorable, SAFT is organising a video, featuring Patrick and his family, to be produced by young people, for young people. The video will be co-ordinated and produced by the Sir John Leman School in Beccles working with local schools in the Felixstowe area, headed by Trimley St Mary Primary School. It is hoped to make the video available to all schools in Suffolk in the autumn. At a recent session of the Town Council's Youth Forum children from local schools were invited to put forward ideas for what they would like to see in the video. These ideas have been fed to the group working on the video and shared with Patrick.

Patrick's proposed visit to the UK is being financed by voluntary contributions from individuals and organisations in Suffolk and Wiltshire. We already have a number of pledges of support for the Suffolk leg and have set up a 'Just Giving' page for those wishing to support the trip. Felixstowe Master Mariners Club is growing in popularity and now has over 100 Members, with 40 to 50 regulars



New Temporary Exhibitions at Felixstowe Museum



We are excited to announce two new temporary exhibitions this summer.

On June 6 we officially opened our D-Day display, commemorating the 80th anniversary, and significant moment in history. See our marvellous model Landing Ship, Tank (LST), revisit the D-Day timeline and operations and engage with stories from Suffolk. A poignant part of our display will be the reflections of two Felixstowe residents, survivors of D-Day.

In July, Views from Convalescent Hill will launch, suitably positioned outside our St Audry's room - in 1827 St Audry's became the Suffolk County Asylum. This project is led by Pier Projects in partnership with the Museum and will showcase the heritage of wellbeing, rest and care in Felixstowe and connecting to the present. There has been a lot of work behind the scenes and we are intrigued to see the final exhibition in place, which we believe will evoke a lot of memories and conversation.

August 25th commemorates 80 years since the Lancaster Bomber LM258 crashed out at sea saving the lives of people in Felixstowe. All seven crew were killed. A plaque at the Town Hall reads 'for that noble action we shall ever be indebted'. We are currently developing plans to mark this occasion.

The Beehive Café is up and running, so why not take a wander down to Landguard point and pop in for cuppa and cake – remember we are dog friendly too!

The Museum and Café are open Thursday to Sunday from 11am.

Landguard Fort



Landguard Fort is open Thursday to Sunday during term-time and 7 days a week during School Holidays.

From Henry VIII to the Cold War there is over 400 years of history to discover and explore at Landguard Fort. Come and see how the fort may have looked during its use by the army and experience what life may have been like as a soldier at Landguard.

We have Events and Trails which make excellent family days out!

On the 3rd and 4th of August Landguard Fort is under Viking Invasion as the Sae-Wylfingas living-history group show how some of our most famous coastal invaders will have lived and fought at the site of Britain's last coastal invasion. We also have a viking trail in the weeks leading up to the event where you can learn about the Norse Gods.

We also have our Sport Trail this Summer which will let families explore the types of sport that took place at the fort. This is a very sporty summer with both the European Football Championships and the Olympics so we want to celebrate our sporting history.

We are welcoming back Felixstowe School for their Gala concert on Friday 21st of June. They have a number of different musicians and it helps raise money for new instruments for the school.

We have also reintroduced our joint-tickets with Felixstowe Museum, allowing you to buy one ticket that gives you access to both and can be used once any day of the season.





Many of the children had not experienced this kind of activity before, but you could see their confidence grow in just half an hour of being in the climbing arena. The look of pride on their faces when they completed a climb was wonderful to watch.



The event was fully inclusive and gave so many a chance to enjoy the activity and blossom. Some of the children were going through difficult times, but nevertheless they were challenging and pushing themselves outside their comfort zone and the interaction with their peers was a joy to see.

Some of the teachers mentioned that places had been offered to the children for good behaviour, which was a great incentive, whilst others were selected to help improve their emotions and develop new life experiences. For many of the children (as one of the teachers explained) the chance to experience Clip 'n Climb was compared with the excitement of the countdown to Christmas...

At the start of the session the children didn't say boo to a goose, but by the end they were full of enthusiasm, telling me which climb they liked best, how they managed to climb higher each time and how much they wanted to do it again!

Once excited boy said, 'I have never been to Clip 'n Climb before, but I have wanted to come forever - I really, really, really loved it!'

Whilst most of us as adults probably take for granted that Clip 'n Climb is just a fun activity (which of course it is), it is so much more than this. With so many of these children going through some tough times, learning new life changing skills and improving their confidence is in invaluable. The whole experience goes so much further than you think, which is why this plays such an important part in our youth development programme in Rotary

Our Environment

Edible Felixstowe - A New Community Project





Edible Felixstowe CIC is a newly formed community group which aims to grow vegetables, fruit flowers and herbs all over our town. Anything produced will be accessible to anyone in the community to pick and use. With the backing of Felixstowe Town Council and East Suffolk Council we launched our project at the Love Green Felixstowe event on April 20th where

the Mayor, Seamus Bennett, planted a lavender at the centre of the Christmas Tree circle near the Triangle in Hamilton Road. Our first project was to create a herb wheel in the area used for the Christmas tree which is left unused for the rest of the year; this meanwhile gardening will be removed for the winter so that the Christmas tree will return in December.

We also have also planted edible flowers and vegetables in the four blue planters at either end of the pedestrianised area of Hamilton Road, we hope that Edible Felixstowe will apply to both people and wildlife and consequently we are including edible pollinators in our scheme to encourage wildlife into the centre of town. We are currently in talks with the Library



service and Suffolk County Council and hope to be able to start planning an area outside Felixstowe Library later in the season. We have a couple of local businesses involved as well; 'Cuppa' in High Road West, who will be planting up their outside planters with veg and also 'The Grovesnor' in Ranelagh Road who are keen to have some new planters outside the pub. We would be keen to hear from any other business who would like to be involved with either planting or sponsorship.

As well as the advantages of growing food and being outside, we hope to enable people to benefit in so many ways from keeping food local and fresh, we also hope to be in a position to demonstrate how to cook different produce by way of demonstrations later in the year.



We are actively seeking volunteers either with gardening experience or those keen to gain more experience to help us increase our output, as we hope to grow the project in future seasons. We are currently meeting on Thursdays at 5pm at the Triangle to help maintain what we have planted, so please get involved if this is of interest - many hands etc!

We would also be grateful for anyone with spare seedlings or seeds or equipment or with a glut of anything to get in touch and help us share out the benefits of locally produced food to the community. The Mayor of Felixstowe said:

"It is fantastic news that Felixstowe, for the fifth consecutive year, has again been presented with a Blue Flag and Seaside Award. These awards recognise Felixstowe has clean and safe beaches and the bathing water meets quality standards.

This adds to all the great things Felixstowe has to offer to residents and visitors, from the new attractions along the South seafront, the historic Spa Gardens and Landguard Nature reserve, Fort and Felixstowe Museum, not to mention the many great places to eat.

In total, 150 sites including 148 beaches in England have been presented with awards recognising the quality of the sites, the way they are managed and the facilities they offer to visitors. Just 72 beaches across the country met the high standards required for a Blue Flag award, which is the most recognised award for beaches, marinas and inland bathing waters.

Although our contribution to that programme did not include any climate justice content, listeners who wanted to learn about our work soon discovered the climate justice side to our goals.

Other climate justice activists from all over the UK and Europe also continue to discover our agenda. In doing so, they are encouraging members of their own communities to organize climate justice events. So it is incredibly exciting and encouraging that they look to Felixstowe as the inspiration for what they are trying to do.



It's your chance to combine a weekend packed with author events with seafood suppers, walks along the prom with its colourful beach huts, perhaps also a wander in the awardwinning seafront gardens and even a bracing swim. The event, now in its 12th year, is joyfully promoted around the county by colourful

pictures of container ships loaded with books. This

iconic image for this Festival by the sea has been created by local artist and illustrator Rebecca Pymar.

This year's festival, has drawn Sunday Times bestseller Rachel Hore [Hidden Years - her captivating new novel of secrets, loss and betrayal - set on the beautiful Cornish coast during World War Two and the heady days of the 1960s.] Rachel will be in conversation on stage opening Saturday's programme with fellow Author, Alexandra Carey a children's author who has published her first novel [The Light that Bends Around Corners]

Following them is Jane Casey [A Stranger In The Family - the gripping new thriller featuring DS Maeve Kerrigan and DI Josh Derwent: When nine-year-old Rosalie Marshall vanished from her bed one

summer night, her disappearance tore her family apart. Jane will be appearing alongside William Shaw, author of The Wild Swimmers.

Festival favorite Nicola Upson returns to share some thoughts on Daphne Du Maurier's masterful novel Rebecca, as well as drawing attention to an exhibition of crime fiction at Cambridge University, Murder by the Book, of which she has had the pleasure to be curator. Festival Patron Esther Freud will interview BBC Broadcaster and Columnist Natasha Walter [Before the Light Fades: a memoir of grief and resistance.] To talk about her book which is a compelling reconstruction of her mother's life as a child of refugees and a passionate anti-nuclear protestor. The festival attracts a host of different kinds of authors, new for this year is Michael Mansfield

[The Power in The People] A barrister, famous for his work on landmark cases such as Grenfell, Hillsborough, The Marchioness disaster, Stephen Lawrence and the Birmingham Six Michael has written a book about fighting injustice and how people power is unstoppable.

Also new to this year's Felixstowe Book Festival are Nigerian Authors Chioma Okereke [Water Baby] and Stephen Buoro [The Five Sorrowful Mysteries of Andy Africa.] Water Baby is a coming-of-age story, set in the real settlement of Makoko in Nigeria and deals with the societal pressures on nineteenyear-old Baby who is trying to escape the future her father has planned for her. Stephen Buoro's book tells the story of fifteen-year-old Andrew Aziza,

who lives in Kontagora, Nigeria and is an exploration of the ordinary but impossible challenges of coming of age in post-colonial Nigeria.

Author events are followed by book signings and the chance to meet a favorite author. There's a mix poetry and event music by the ever-popular Hose Pipe Band. You can meet very well-known, award-winning fiction authors and also get the chance to discover debut writers. Visitors can rub shoulders with experts who can talk knowledgeably and absorbingly about the environment, politics, history, science, art, economics and so

much more.



The festival is held in Harvest House, on Cobbold Road in Felixstowe. 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



The Arch Cascade - part of Felixstowe's history for over 120 years

The Seafront Gardens are one of Felixstowe's iconic landmarks, stretching along the coast for 900m from Convalescent Hill in the south to a little beyond Harvest House to the north-east. In recognition of their importance



to the heritage of the town they have been designated as a grade 2 listed gardens by Historic England and establishes them on an equal footing to the Abbey Gardens in Bury St Edmunds.

One feature in the gardens (a favourite of many visitors) is the Arch Cascade and Pond. Like other water features in the gardens, it was designed in the early part of the 1900's around a natural spring that flows out near the base of the cliffs. Even in the hottest summer the spring continues to flow. A pump located in the bottom pool circulates the water back to the top of the cascade (some 3m in height) and the excess water leaves the pond through an overflow pipe that passes the 25m run to the other side of the promenade and out to sea. The bottom pond contains a variety of exotic goldfish cared for by a particularly dedicated local volunteer - Paul London who is known to all the local dog walkers as, aside from feeding the fish, he always has a selection of treats for canine visitors. Those who peer into the pond long enough will spy our native minnow and common newt taking advantage of this special water garden where nature finds a haven in a busy world.



This section of the gardens was opened to the public officially by the Lord Mayor of London in 1928. It is likely the cascade would have been created prior to this, possibly by Douglas Tollemache the original owner of Harvest House (previously The Felix Hotel) who was a keen patron of the area. Alternatively, it could have been the Urban

District Council who were responsible for much

of the development of the sea front at that time. The cascade stonework is purely ornamental and is not sufficiently robust to be climbed over and is easily damaged. Children see the cascade and arch as a wonderful place to play but it was not designed for this purpose. Likewise, the cascade pools are not for paddling. Sadly, planting at the top of the cascade has been damaged and any debris thrown into the top pool can block the cascade filters putting the fish and other wildlife at risk. East Suffolk Council (ESC), who now own the gardens and manage them on behalf of the public, plan to update the signage so that visitors understand the special nature of the cascade as a significant heritage feature and not a climbing frame. ESC in consultation with the Felixstowe Town Council, volunteers and the Felixstowe Society agreed that fencing the cascade off, like some of the other ponds in the gardens, would detract from the attractiveness of the feature and is not a desirable option. However, ornamental fencing at the bottom of the bank, either side of the feature, could make it clear there would be no access to the top of the cascade. We hope in the future everyone, including children, will continue to enjoy the cascade and treat it with care so it survives another 100 years and more.






The success of this pilot project fills us with immense pride and gratitude. We are delighted that Langer Primary Academy has been chosen to extend this initiative into a year-

Finance and Governance Committee

Audit and Accounts Council received a clear and unqualified audit return for the 2022/23 financial year. The 2023/24 Audit will again be undertaken by PKF Littlejohn LLP in June 2024, and the audited accounts for 2023/24 will be available from September 2024. Finance and Governance Committee received two Internal Audit reports in 2023/24 with the Auditor finding Council's procedures to be sound and in good order. Business Plan 2024-28 Committee oversaw the process for the creation of the Council's latest Business Plan, convering the years 2024-28, which was recommended to Annual Council and will be available from June 2024 at www.felixstowe.gov.uk/council-documents. Following Member workshops, the draft Business Plan was put to public consultation from 22 March to 26 April 2024, with all feedback reviewed and, where appropriate, incorporated into the new plan.

Budget and Precept

At the end of the financial year, the income outturn for 2023/24 exceeded budget estimates at 101.1%, and expenditure stood at 96.9% of budget, in spite of increased expenditure in

items such as skip and digger hire and various utilities (e.g. Town Hall Electric, Allotment Water). After several years of a freeze to the Town Council's portion of the council tax (the 'precept'), for the forthcoming 2024/25 financial year, Council agreed that a 5.54% increase would be needed. This means that annual Band D equivalent cost would increase from £70.87 to £74.80 per annum. The Town Council's element of the total council tax bill is just under 3.7%, with the other 96.3% being split between Suffolk County Council, East Suffolk Council and Suffolk Constabulary. Council also holds ring-fenced funds for future projects and contingencies, known as 'Earmarked Reserves', and these are reviewed at least once annually to ensure appropriate provisions are in place.

Budget Estimates

Council's Finance & Governance Committee closely monitored and reviewed the financial position regularly. 2023-24 saw hirings and income return to pre-pandemic incomes. In calculating budget estimates for 2024-25 Council took a cautiously optimistic approach, being aware of increased costs due to the war in Ukraine and the cost of living crisis. Due to careful budgeting in recent years, the Council's reserves are able to offer some protection against unforeseen variables.

General Power of Competence

The "General Power of Competence" was

included in the Localism Act 2011 (Part 1, Chapter 1, 1-8). This power was brought into force by SI 965 The Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012 in April 2012. The power enables eligible councils to have "the power to do anything that individuals generally may do" as long as they are not prevented from doing so by other laws. The Town Council continues to meet the criteria for eligibility and adopted the use of the General Power of Competence at its Annual Council Meeting on 15th May 2019, renewing this again on 17th May 2023.

Reserves

Council has both General Reserves and Earmarked Reserves. General Reserves ensure that there are adequate Financial Reserves to meet the needs of its operations and to ensure financial security (normally between 3 – 9 months of operational requirements). Earmarked Reserves are put aside for specified projects or for unexpected repairs which are not covered in the annual budget. Reserves can be ring-fenced for something specific i.e. CIL funds are put into specifically timed earmarked reserves or can be a standard earmarked reserve referring to the type of spending that may be requested to come from that reserve, i.e. Town Hall or Cemetery earmarked reserves.

Planning and Environment Committee

Planning Applications

During 2023/24 the Planning & Environment Committee considered a total of 195 local planning applications. Committee noted that on 60.5% occasions (118 of 195 reported decisions) East Suffolk Council has concurred with the Town Council's recommendation. Of those cases where there was contrasting view, a referral panel at East Suffolk Council reviewed the Town Council's recommendations before deciding whether to refer the application to the District Council's Planning Committee for determination. There were a total of 195 planning applications for the year 2023/24 out of these, 5 plans were refused by both East Suffolk and Felixstowe Town Council, 10 refused by East Suffolk but recommended for approval by Felixstowe Town Council and 12 East Suffolk approved while Felixstowe Town Council recommended refusal. 6 applications were withdrawn and 49 are still awaiting a decision from East Suffolk at this time. Landguard Lodge Council's Planning and Environment were instrumental in the prevention of a landmark building being demolished. Confirmation was received from East Suffolk Council, after a request from the Planning Committee, that

the Article 4 direction removing the permitted development right of demolition from Landguard Lodge, Manor Terrace, Felixstowe, was made permanent and that the building cannot be demolished unless a planning application is made and permission granted.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

Council received CIL payments from East Suffolk Council totalling £158,023.77 in 2023/24. These funds are held in a separate Earmarked Reserve and are ringfenced to support appropriate projects within a five-year timescale allowed by legislation. Consultation has taken place to identify suitable projects and a Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP) has been drawn up to prioritise these in advance of delivery. This year £10,000 from previous CIL money received during the period 2019-20 has been granted to support the establishment of a new facility for the Lions Club to enable continuation of the provision of Christmas lights throughout the town, and £23,665 has been used to refurbish footpaths in both Allenby Park and Gosford Way Park.

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Council Communications and Meetings



The Council engages directly with its residents, via digital platforms such as the Council's website www.felixstowe.gov.uk, tweeting from its @FelixstoweTC Twitter account and its Facebook page facebook.com/FelixstoweTownCouncil. A quarterly seasonal magazine is delivered to all households in

Felixstowe, giving a broader platform for community and council news as well as seasonal highlights throughout the year. Details of all Town Council Meetings and forthcoming events are displayed on the noticeboard outside the Town Hall. Members of the public and press are welcome and regularly attend our Council and Committee meetings and a public session is held at the beginning of each meeting. Members of the public who are unable to attend in person, can joining the meeting online via a link providied on each agenda.

Civic Awards 2023/24

The Mayor presented the Civic Awards in May at the Annual Town Meeting. The Annual Town Meeting provides an opportunity for local electors to raise topics, ask questions and browse stalls hosted by local community groups.

Grants 2023/24



Felixstowe Town Council is committed to supporting and strengthening the many networks and community groups that help to make a positive difference to Felixstowe. Through its Annual and Occasional Grants scheme, the Town Council was able to support 37 local organisations and projects during 2023/24 with a total of £55,240 via its Occasional and Annual Grants scheme and through its community partnerships. These are just a few of the organisations we were able to help this year:

Felixstowe in Flower



Council's Felixstowe in Flower initiative has contributed towards civic pride in the town since 1985. This year the launch took place on 1 June at Felixstowe Triangle. If you or your organisation would like to sponsor a basket or planter - or would like to enter one of our competitions - please contact the Town Hall. The Town Council give thanks to the Felixstowe Ferry Golf Club for providing grey water run off, which we use to water the flowers, saving fresh drinking water.

Sustainable Bedding

With an aim to become more sustainable, the wooden planters in the town have been planted with perennial bedding plants. The flower beds at the Triangle and on the seafront have also been planted in this way, with vibrant. plants which will become well-established over the long-term.

Christmas Funding was awarded to the Felixstowe BID (Business Improvement District) for the third year running towards the provision of a Christmas Ice Rink, which was welcomed back to Felixstowe having been unable to take place during the pandemic. The Council continued to support to the Lions Club with annual funding of £6,750 towards the provision of the Town Centre's Christmas lights.

Blue Flag



The Town Council was delighted that once again Felixstowe South and Pier were recognised as two of the country's best beaches and were awarded a Blue Flag and Seaside award by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. In order to receive the Blue Flag award beaches must comply with several criteria covering

environmental education and information, water quality, environmental management, safety, and services. Felixstowe consistently meets the criteria for 'excellent' international bathing water quality standards and, until January 2022, was the only beach in Suffolk to meet this exacting standard.

Remembrance



The Council and the Felixstowe Branch of the Royal British Legion supported several commemorative events in the town in 2023. Leading up to Amistice Day on Friday 11 November the road sign project in partnership with Felixstowe Remembers and local businesses saw poppies installed throughout the town and signs erected in 66 roads to recognise the 212 residents that were lost because of war. The Remembrance Sunday service included a record number of wreath layers, and solemnly observed by hundreds of residents. CCTV Review The Town Council, together with East Suffolk Council and the Suffolk Constabulary, is reviewing the town's CCTV provision with a view to upgrade the quality and monitoring of the cameras.

Flood Memorial



The anniversary of the North Sea Floods was remembered on 31 January 2024 with a service held at the Felixstowe Flood Memorial to remember the 41 lives lost in the the 1953 tragedy.

Flag Flying

A variety of flags have been raised throughout the year on the flagpole outside the Town Hall, this included the inaugural raising of the Progress Pride Flag during June's Pride month, the Suffolk Day Flag on 21 June, the Armed Forces flag for Armed Forces Week and the Commonwealth Day flag on 8 March. A touching service was held for Ukraine with the raising of the flag on 24 August to mark Ukraine's Independence Day. The Blue Flag and Union Jack have also been flown throughout the year.

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Climate Emergency



Council requires Councillors and staff to consider climate, air pollution and nature plans in all their decision-making processes. Since Council declared a Climate Emergency in July 2019, our dedicated Climate Emergency Working Group has regularly met to review processes, services, products and actions and to raise awareness locally. In addition, a wider 'Climate Action Group'. with key stakeholders attended, including the Port of Felixstowe, BID, Chamber of Commerce, Felixstowe Community Nature Reserve and Litter Free Felixstowe to name but a few. The latest meeting included local developers, where progress

on environmental benefits for new build developments was highlighted. From this group the 'Love Green Felixstowe' campaign has been launched.

ACTION WE'VE TAKEN SO FAR...

Council had Energy Performance Certificates and Display Energy Certificates carried out in 2020 and have used these as a baseline for improvement, alongside regularly calculating its carbon footprint. In 2019, the Council's carbon consumption stood at 43.37 tonnes of CO2, decreasing to 23.5 tonnes in 2020, and further down to 17.89 tonnes in 2023 this decrease was attributed to the adoption of electric vans and tools. PLANS FOR THE FUTURE



The Climate Emergency Working Group will be working with the Felixstowe Youth Forum, involving High School students in its Climate Action Group. It is working in partnership with BID and other members of the Climate Action Group to plan a 'Love Green Felixstowe' event in September 2024. Council continues to work closely with community groups to support environmental projects. This year it has given grants to help set up the new Repair Café at Cuppa and is keen to hear from any organisations seeking funding to assist with local environmental projects. Council now has its own large compost and is helping the Allotment Association FAA become a 'Champion' for composting.

Improving Energy Efficiency

Following the Council's Climate Emergency Declaration made in July 2019, EPCs (EnergyPerformance Certificates) were obtained for all Council building and a DEC (Display EnergyCertificate) produced for the Town Hall. Since then. Committee have been working to reduce further the carbon footprint of its buildings. Insulation has been increased and Winter 2023 saw the refurbishment and fitting of highly insulated glass with a u-value of the lowest thermal transmittance of 0.7 w/m2.k. The glass was chosen to offer optimal insulation properties, whilst respecting the heritage and outer appearance of Felixstowe's historic Town Hall, which is located in a conservation area. Council's energy suppliers use 100% renewable energy and a 3 year fixed contract was taken out in Summer 2022. A LED light replacement programme continues replacing all faulty lights



Hall Hire and Weddings

Both the Town Hall and Walton Community Hall remain competitively priced venues for hire. Walton Community Hall is used by many local. community groups and also for one off hires for birthday parties and special occasions. The Town Hall remains a popular venue for local weddings and rooms are also hired out to local organisations.

Town Hall

Water ingress present a few issues this year, causing part of ceiling to collapse above the bay window in the Council Chamber, which was promptly repaired. Damp is also being investigated in the front elevation of the building. Plans have been made to renovate the rear Disabled entrance which will have a new larger ramp to make it more accessible.

Broadway House

Council leases Broadway House, Orwell Road, to the Felixstowe Old People's Welfare Association (FOPWA) which continues to provide a highly popular drop-in service. This year the bathrooms and rear hallway were redecorated.

Walton Community Hall

Floor renovation work has taken place this year, with the wooden floor being sanded and recoated with a polyurethane-based water lacquer. The floor has been revitalized and fortified against future damage. It will ensure the floor's longevity, preserving a key community asset for years to come. A review is currently underway to make Walton Community Hall more energy efficient. Grants will be investigated to help fund this work which will look at an holistic approach. It will ensure that the hall is well insulated and will also be looking at the possibility of using the existing air conditioning units as air source heat pumps and investigating solar panels, battery storage.

Grounds Team

The efforts of the Grounds Maintenance team over the past year demonstrate their steadfast dedication to enhancing public spaces, promoting sustainability, and preserving the assets of the Town Council. Through strategic interventions and collaborative partnerships,

they remain committed to delivering highquality services and maintaining pleasant environments, both indoors and outdoors, for the residents of our town.

Allotments

An area in the northwest corner of the Cowpasture site, once designated as an allotment plot, has transitioned into a biodiverse space. Due to its unsuitability for traditional allotment use, it had remained vacant and overgrown since the last tenant vacated it in early 2022, and has now been repurposed to encourage biodiversity. The maintenance team ensures access to fruit trees within this area by keeping it trimmed, while also fostering a habitat for insects and birds. Measures such as removing windows from a large shed in the area aim to facilitate bird nesting, demonstrating a holistic approach to wildlife conservation within the allotment sites.

Cemetery

The Grounds Team continue to maintain Felixstowe Cemetery to a high standard, supporting funerals and interments throughout the year. Work has been carried out on the cesspit at the cemetery, as it had been filling rapidly. Observing rainwater infiltration from downpipes on the Toilet block, compounded by increased usage prompted action. A two-fold solution was implemented. Firstly, a Soakaway was installed at the Toilet block, diverting rainwater away from the cesspit, then, a land drain with a final effluent pump was integrated into the cesspit system. These interventions have substantially decreased the frequency of cesspit emptying to 1-2 times annually, enhancing operational efficiency and reducing maintenance costs.



Pathway Renovations in Allenby Park and Gosford Way Park

In response to a concern raised by a member of the public and as part of our ongoing commitment to enhancing public spaces, the Grounds Maintenance team undertook improvements at Allenby Park to enhance accessibility from the pathway to the grassed area and play area. Furthermore, new pathways have been installed at both parks by a local contractor.

Tree Planting Initiatives

Continuing our annual tradition, the grounds team has undertaken extensive tree planting endeavours across various sites. Trees, supplied by the Woodland Trust, have been planted along Langley Avenue to bolster native hedges and in other locations including the Cowpasture Meadow and some local parks. Notably, a nursery has been established at one of our allotment sites to nurture some saplings, ensuring a sustainable supply of mature trees for future landscaping projects.

Additionally, partnerships with local schools have facilitated the distribution of saplings, fostering environmental awareness and engagement within the community. Two oak trees and an ash tree, on the Ferry road Allotment site, needed to be felled due to their proximity to a house on the Laureate Fields development. Whilst unfortunate, this action was necessary for safety reasons. To mitigate the environmental impact, two oak trees were planted at Gosford Way Park, and one oak tree was planted at Allenby Park, contributing to the ongoing efforts to maintain and enhance green spaces within the community

Compost Production

In pursuit of sustainability and costeffectiveness, the grounds team have embarked
on an initiative to produce high-quality
compost in-house. Utilising horse manure
sourced from a local farm, along with fallen
leaves and grass clippings collected from the
cemetery, composting efforts are underway at
the old Allotment site adjacent to the Cemetery.
The first batch is expected to be ready by Spring
2025, with the aim of reducing expenditure
on commercial compost and minimizing the
Council's ecological footprint.

New Apprentice

Post Following the retirement of the Cemetery Supervisor, a new position, the Grounds & Maintenance Manager, was created to encompass both the previous responsibilities of the Cemetery Supervisor and the additional duties of the role. This also created a vacancy within the team and, following on from the first successful Grounds Maintenance apprenticeship post, the Council recruited another apprentice to fill the vacancy.

Lifetime Mortgage - Would I be eroding my capital?

Many customers are now coming to the end of an interest only mortgage without a plan to repay the capital. Some may have simply repaid a standard mortgage but are not sure what options may now be available to them.

- These loans require borrowers to make mandatory repayments until their 66th birthday. For couples this will be until the older of the two reaches that age.
- After the age of 66 the product transitions to a standard roll-up interest lifetime mortgage, although customers can continue making repayments if they wish to. Most companies would allow customers to repay up to 10% of the amount borrowed per year without incurring a penalty.



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Another innovation is the 'interest served lifetime mortgage', also known as an 'optional payment lifetime mortgage'.

 With this option, the customer agrees to make set interest payments with the aim of reducing the total amount over the term of the loan. A number of lenders offer this product, with the added benefit that some customers may benefit from lower interest rates if they commit to regular repayments.
