



Citizen's Advice - Felixstowe & District



This year the winter fuel payment will be means-tested and most people will need to receive State Pension plus Pension Credit in order to qualify. Pensioners whose weekly income is below £218.15 for a single person or £332.95 for a couple should check to see if they could be eligible for Pension Credit.

Pension Credit can also open doors to further financial help, such as health costs (free NHS dental treatment, and you can get help with the cost of glasses and transport to hospital), housing costs (you probably won't have to pay Council Tax - unless other people live with you - or if you rent your home, you might get your rent paid in full by Housing Benefit and other costs (if you're 75 or over, you can get a free TV licence) If you think you might be eligible for Pension Credit contact us for a benefit check.

Pensioners are being encouraged to apply for Pension Credit by 21st December 2024 which is the last date for making a back-dated claim for Pension Credit in order to receive the winter fuel payment.

If you think you might be eligible for Pension Credit contact Citizens Advice for a benefit check and help with making a claim. This applies to other benefits too, It is estimated that £15 billion of government benefits go unclaimed every year as many people don't realise that they qualify for them. Benefits and other government support are not just for those who are out of work. Millions of households on low incomes are also losing out.

Government support that goes unclaimed includes:

• Child benefit • Pension credit • Council tax support • Universal credit

If you think you might be missing out on some of these benefits, you can check by using a free online benefit calculator. An easy-to-use option is: www. entitledto.co.uk

 $You \, can \, also \, contact \, Citizens \, Advice \, East \, Suffolk \, for \, a \, FREE \, benefit \, check.$

If you are not eligible for the winter fuel payment or for further benefits and are concerned about how you will manage your household budget, please contact us. We will look into other ways to help, particularly with fuel costs, as other sources of help may be available.

On a different topic, the DWP is carrying out a programme of transferring people living in Suffolk who have been receiving some benefits e.g. Incomebased JSA or income-related ESA to Universal Credit. If you have received a letter regarding the migration/transfer of your benefits, please contact the address and/or telephone number on the letter as they have the expertise to assist with this process.

Level Two Urban Music Workshops

Following on from the success of the Urban Music Workshops we ran earlier this year, we are rerunning these again during the October half-term, week beginning Monday 4th November.

These will run from our Youth Hub where we are excited to announce the opening of our temporary Music Studio for young people to begin to benefit from until our residence at Beach Street is ready.

Music is an incredibly powerful tool in supporting young people's mental health, so being able to make creative opportunities accessible to young people is really exciting for us.





We will again be bringing in a hugely talented dynamic London based Music Technician to lead the workshops, supported by our own Youth Workers.

We have a wealth of talent in Felixstowe, so we want to engage both those totally new to Music Technology & those who are already accomplished musicians, singers & creators.

These workshops are open to Young People age 13yrs – 25yrs. We will be running some workshops for Younger age groups at a later date.

Historic Event at Felixstowe Coast Watch

Friday 9th August saw a spectacular event at Felixstowe
Coastwatch when a special anniversary flag was delivered by
sea to the station. The flag celebrates the 30th anniversary of
the National Coastwatch Institution (NCI) and is on a 2,000plus miles station-to-station relay, travelling around the
coast to each of the charity's 60 coastal watch stations during
the summer. The 5ft x 3ft flag is electronically tagged and
relayed using many different types of transport including boats

and ferries, tractor and trailer, horse and cart, classic cars and by walking and running.

It was delivered to Felixstowe from Southend when it travelled at high speed on Essex Police Marine Unit's RIB (rigid-hulled inflatable boat) "Sentinel". This was met and escorted to the shore by Harwich RNLI's inshore lifeboat and a Harwich Haven Authority pilot boat.





The RIB beached in front of the Martello Tower upon which the Felixstowe NCI lookout sits. Two marine policemen were met by Station Manager Nick Barrett-White and Station Secretary Neil Davidson, together with the High Sheriff of Suffolk and the Deputy Mayor of Felixstowe.

The flag was then brought to the tower accompanied by a bagpipe playing watchkeeper, through a guard of honour formed by uniformed watchkeepers.

The following day, the flag set off from Felixstowe on the 30 mile journey to Gorleston, the next NCI station around the coast. It travelled in a 1947 Rover convertible vintage car owned by one of the Felixstowe watchkeepers.



Felixstowe Museum



As we move into the Autumn at Felixstowe Museum, it's the last chance to see our hugely popular 1980s display. Curated just after the pandemic, the display has challenged people's preconceptions as to what exactly



history can be. Using objects loaned from individuals and organisations across the town, the exhibition transports visitors back to explore everyday life at the time. It also takes a look at stories local to Felixstowe, such as the legendary Radio Caroline.

The real success of the exhibition has been its accessibility, especially with visitors who were there in the 80s and lived to tell the tale... On the other hand, younger generations have been able to marvel at how the times have changed. All generations have enjoyed playing Pac-Man, or watching Live Aid in a recreated living room! This recognizability and family friendly ethos is something we hope to capture with our new exhibition, due to open in spring 2025.

Autumn will also see the departure of the Views From Convalescent Hill exhibition - curated by Pier Projects - which explores the history of wellbeing, rest. and care in Felixstowe.

Get down to Felixstowe Museum whilst there's still time! We are open until the end of October, Thursday to Sunday, 11:00-17:00.



Felixstowe Seafront Gardens Receive Green Flag Award for Ninth Consecutive Year



Felixstowe's famous Seafront Gardens will continue to fly the prestigious Green Flag after being recognised as one of the country's best parks for the ninth consecutive year.

The Grade II listed gardens have been awarded the mark of quality for public parks every year since completion of a restoration project funded by East Suffolk Council and the Heritage Lottery Fund.

And it's a double celebration for the district's green spaces as Green Flag status has also been awarded to Woods Meadow Country Park for the second successive year.

The Green Flag Award scheme, managed by Keep Britain Tidy on behalf of the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities, recognises the UK's most welcoming and well-managed parks and green spaces.

Judges praised the environmental management and many biodiversity initiatives in place at Felixstowe Seafront Gardens - maintained with great assistance from a strong and active community group.

Since restoration took place between 2011 and 2015, the grounds team has boosted ecological diversity by protecting the grass banks and providing a habitat for invertebrates and reptiles.

Mayor of Felixstowe, Cllr David Rowe, said: "It's wonderful to see that Felixstowe Seafront Gardens have been awarded a Green Flag for the ninth consecutive year.

"The Friends of Felixstowe Seafront Gardens do a dedicated job of caring for the Gardens, so that residents and visitors can enjoy the peaceful and special place Felixstowe Seafront Gardens are."

Between them, volunteers contribute more than 2,000 hours of time to helping maintain the heritage, ecology and appeal of the Seafront Gardens.

Volunteers have also helped plant and look after hundreds of trees at Woods Meadow County Park - home to mixed native woodland a

The Woods Meadow Volunteer Group has been integral in establishing the park, having been the driving force in planting an 11-hectare woodland and several new hedgerows.

A converted container was located on site as a 'volunteer-hub' providing on-site storage and a meeting place for regular work parties. Nearby, the park's new orchard was planted by volunteers with help from Limes Primary Academy schoolchildren.

Following successful public events on local birdlife and moths, Park Ranger Matt will be leading a Bat Walk during August.

Keep Britain Tidy's Green Flag Award Scheme Manager, Paul Todd MBE said: "I would like to congratulate everyone involved at Felixstowe Seafront Gardens and Woods Meadow Country Park on achieving a Green

"It is important that our free to use spaces are maintained to the Green Flag Award standard, making them accessible for all members of the community while ensuring the environment is protected."

East Suffolk's network of volunteers is responsible for helping to keep the district beautiful, with regular litter-picks, planting, and an all-round effort to maintain the appearance of their local communities - and East Suffolk Council is encouraging more people to get involved and to really do their bit as part of East Suffolk's Amazing.

Help the Earth - There is no Planet B



Children from Colneis Junior School have sent a strong message to pupils and parents with a striking new mural urging them to protect the planet.

'Help the Earth - There is no Planet B' warns the 9m long wall of artwork, designed by pupils and brought to life by talented, local artist Simon Loxley.

The 'Eco Warriors' at the Felixstowe school, who champion environmental issues through the school's Eco Council, and some keen student artists, came up with the idea of portraying pollution, biodiversity loss and climate change on one side of the painting while the other side shows how the Earth will look if we protect the planet.



The painting, which sits prominently on the Colneis playground, features 13 Swifts in homage to the Felixstowe Swift Group.

Children from across the school contributed design ideas including images of a healthy planet, flowers, insects and eco-friendly

messages on hot air balloons for the side of the mural which promotes looking after the planet and environment and the school's passion for nature.

Images put forward for the 'warning' side of the artwork portray climate change; animals trapped in plastic waste and sewage spilling into the ocean.

Pupils, Jessica and Nala, wanted the poignant slogans 'Help the Earth' and 'There is no Planet B' painted onto the wall.

With help from Debbie Bartlett, founder of Litter-free Felixstowe, the school secured a council locality grant from former Mayor of Felixstowe Seamus Bennett. This money was used to have the wall rendered.

The school fundraising committee - Friends of Fairfield and Colneis contributed funds to cover the cost of materials.

Year 6 teacher Mrs Rebecca Wyard said: "The Eco Warriors and some keen artists came up with the idea of having our planet in the middle, split in half - showing on one side, what

the world would be like if we looked after it; and on the other, what it will be like if we don't look after the it."

"On the polluted side, they wanted to show creatures affected by litter; and on the protected side, they wanted beautiful flowers, butterflies and, of course, Swifts."

"Our wonderfully talented artist Simon Loxley used all the children's ideas to design the mural. He then took children's images and recreated them on the

Mark Girling, Headteacher of the Federation of Fairfield and Colneis, said: "I am incredibly proud of the children's efforts in creating such an inspiring piece of art to showcase our commitment towards the environment to our school community. Thank you to Becky Wyard for her enthusiasm and commitment in seeing this project through. We are forever grateful for the immense time, effort and talent that Simon Loxley has given us to bring this vision to reality."

Guests attending the grand unveiling of the wall included Deputy Mayor of Felixstowe Cllr Corrine Franklin; former Mayor Seamus Bennett; Debbie Bartlett from LitterFree Felixstowe; representatives from Felixstowe Swift Group; and parents of the children who designed the artwork.

During the unveiling, four children gave a passionate and inspirational speech about how it is everybody's responsibility to look after the planet. The children addressed the whole school, parents and guests and reaffirmed the crucial steps that need to be taken to 'achieve a world worth living in.'

Year 6 pupil Ava finished the presentation by saying, 'The time for talking about change is over; the time for action is now.'

Felixstowe Allotment Association





Bomber LM258, HA-O, and its Heroic Crew

n Sunday 25 August at midday, a special commemorative service was held to mark the 80th anniversary of the tragic loss of Lancaster Bomber LM258, HA-Q of 218 Squadron, and its seven heroic crew members.

On that fateful evening in 1944, Lancaster LM258 took off from RAF Methwold at 18:55 hours on acritical mission to strike a V-1 Flying Bomb site, in Vincly, France. The aircraft, carrying a crew of, seven, was struck by enemy flak near St Omer on, its return journey.

At 21:15 hours, East Suffolk Police received reports, of the Lancaster approaching Felixstowe at a, dangerously low altitude. The crew, realizing they, could not maintain height on two failed engines, attempted to reach RAF Woodbridge's Emergency Landing Ground (ELG) but were forced to turn back toward the coast. Witnesses recall seeing the bomber circling Felixstowe with its undercarriage lowered before it tragically plunged into the sea a quarter mile southeast of Felixstowe's New Pier. The wreckage was quickly consumed by flames and sank in 12 feet of water.

An RAF Walrus amphibian from 277 ASR Squadron and two High-Speed Launches from Felixstowe Dock arrived at the scene within minutes. Despite their swift response, only three of the seven crew members were recovered from the sea, all of whom tragically lost their lives.

- Sgt Angus Craig (19 years old), the rear gunner, was still alive when found but sadly succumbed to his injuries three hours later in the RAF Sick Bay at Felixstowe.
- Sgt George Covell (20 years old), the miduppergunner, and F/O Charles Bryce Oxenham (20 yearsold), RNZAF, the Bomb Aimer, were both found deceased.

In the following days, the remaining bodies of the crew were discovered along the Suffolk coastline:

- Sgt William Augustus Dyer (20 years old), the navigator, was found in Harwich Harbour on September 1, 1944.
- Flt Lt Doug Haggis (25 years old), the pilot, was washed up on Fagbury Beach, Trimley St Martin, on the same day.

- Flt Sgt Ernest George Murray (26 years old), the wireless operator, was discovered near the Spa Pavilion at Felixstowe on September 2, 1944.
- F/O Glyn Davies Mathias (25 years old), the flight engineer, was the last to be found, washing ashore at Landguard Point, Felixstowe, on October 6, 1944.

F/O Mathias was buried in Felixstowe Cemetery while four others were interred at Cambridge City Cemetery and the other two taken back to their home towns in Ilford, Essex and Northumberland. Ahead of the main commemoration, on Friday 23 August, the Mayor of Felixstowe, Councillor David Rowe, will lay a wreath at the grave of F/O Glyn Davies Mathias in Felixstowe Cemetery.

In 2001, Felixstowe honoured the crew's sacrifice with the unveiling of a granite memorial at the Town Hall. The inscription at the bottom reads: "For that noble action we shall be forever indebted," a line taken from a letter of condolence sent by the Felixstowe Town Clerk to the crew's next of kin in September 1944.

Broadway House

When Felixstowe Town Council was formed in 1974, one of its first projects was refurbishing a wooden Victorian building on Orwell Road for a senior citizens' drop-in centre. Originally built as a reading room for local domestic staff.

Post-1974, the building's ground floor operated successfully as a Senior Citizens Centre, managed by F.O.P.W.A (Felixstowe Old Peoples'

Welfare Association), and hosted various local organisations' meetings in the evenings. Over time, maintaining the building became a significant challenge for the Town Council, leading to the realisation that it was nearing the end of its usability.

The Council decided that a Senior Citizens Centre should be maintained for Felixstowe, but recognised that demolishing and rebuilding the current structure was the only feasible solution. To ensure the new building's viability and minimize costs for community charge payers, potential partners were considered. These partners valued the building's history and were committed to ensuring the new structure retained the best features of the original and reflected Felixstowe's architectural style.

The old building was carefully demolished in December 2003, salvaging some roof slates and the Victorian finial for reuse in the new structure. The Senior Citizens temporarily relocated to a nearby church hall, with plans to move into the new premises before Christmas 2004.

Construction of the new building began in April 2004, it featured a spacious community hall on the ground floor with complete kitchen and toilet facilities. The first and second floors housed four social housing flats managed by Orwell Housing Association.

The finial from the old building was installed on the new Broadway House, and the Senior Citizens' Centre held its 2004 Christmas party in the new building. The first tenants moved into their flats in early 2005.

Thanks to innovative partnership arrangements, Felixstowe acquired a brand-new building funded from sources other than the community charge. The Town Council is immensely proud of this achievement, and the 'icing on the cake' was receiving the Felixstowe Society's award for Environmental Enhancement.



Residents in Felixstowe and the surrounding area are encouraged to give their view on the North Felixstowe Garden Neighbourhood via a public survey, which is open until 24 September.

The North Felixstowe Garden Neighbourhood aims to provide new housing, as identified in the

Local Plan, as well as a new school and a leisure centre. Protecting the natural environment and enhancing public spaces in and around Eastward Ho is also a key part of the plan.

East Suffolk Council is leading the master-planning process aiming to develop an outline planning application for the site for submission in Spring 2025. The project is still in the decision-making stages that considers all options before deciding on the final layout and content of the masterplan. In terms of North Felixstowe Garden Neighbourhood being realised, this is a 10-15 year project.

Team are integral to the operations of
Felixstowe Cemetery, facilitating burials and
internments, and ensuring that the Cemetery
Grounds are well maintained, and grave plots
and other memorial sites are well-cared for.
Felixstowe Cemetery is home to many mature
trees and shrubs, and numerous species of
wildlife, which the Grounds Team consider in
their upkeep of the Cemetery.

Felixstowe Town Council owns five allotments sites at Ferry Road, Cowpasture, Taunton Road, Railway Hill and the Cemetery Field at Langley Avenue. The Felixstowe Town Council Grounds Team care for these sites, conducting frequent maintenance and repairs, and assisting over 492 allotment tenants.
