In the last edition of the magazine we said we were looking forward to the visit of our friend Patrick

Kaberia, a Fairtrade farmer from Michimikuru in Kenya. Patrick arrived in Felixstowe on Friday 20 September and met local supporters at an evening reception. The next day he visited the Co-op in Hamilton Rd and met the manager, Rob Smy.

Rob then joined us, together with other business, church, Town Council and voluntary sector representatives for a breakfast meeting at the United Reformed Church. Patrick told the group how Fairtrade had helped his community over many years and had made it more resilient to the effects of climate change. Climate change, however, continued to be a major threat to tea production, causing unpredictability in the weather.



Patrick then went on to meet local children and their families at our Family Fun Day at Felixstowe library. The photo shows him talking to one of the pupils from Trimley St Mary primary school.

After Felixstowe Patrick visited Woodbridge, Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds, Beccles and Lowestoft. Footage of his trip to Suffolk will be incorporated into a video for schools, which is due to be launched in January.

Felixstowe Coastwatch Moves into Winter Season with Strong Local Support

As we move into the winter season, Felixstowe Coastwatch station will remain open seven days a week, during daylight hours, with its volunteer watchkeepers maintaining "eyes along the coast" for HM Coastguard. Incidents occur even at these quiet times of the year such as objects seen in the water or lone sailors in difficulty, plus there remains the importance of keeping an eye on hardy sea swimmers, kite surfers and paddleboarders.

The station enjoys great support from local people, for example glass artist, poet and author Dawn Jackson who lives in Martello Park and says of the Martello Tower on which the Coastwatch lookout sits: "I am thrilled to have this iconic landmark as my neighbour. Every one of the dedicated Coastwatch team are volunteers, giving up their time to keep our section of coastline safe. It's a local charity I am very proud to support."

She added: "Earlier this year I learned from one of the Coastwatch volunteers that 2024 would be the 30th anniversary of the organisation. As someone who has always loved to write poetry, this got me thinking, and shortly after that conversation, I had penned a poem for them and signed up to donate £10 a month to their cause, as my charity of the year."

Following a visit to the lookout by Dawn to learn about what Coastwatch does and the equipment used, her poem now takes pride of place on the station noticeboard:

Sat atop Martello P. You'll find them looking out to sea, With binoculars in hand, They diligently scour off-land. The volunteers of NCI, Logging boats as they pass by, Between the rivers and the port, When out of sight. on cameras caught. Container ships, sail boats and more, Far out to sea or by the shore, Paddle boards, canoes, small craft, A bunch of kids, with makeshift raft. Watching out for you and me, They give their time so selflessly, Every day of every year, Come rain or shine someone is here. Making sure that all is calm, Whilst ready to raise the alarm. For 30 years they've manned this post, Keeping safe, our Suffolk coast. So thank you Coastwatch volunteers, And here's to the next 30 years!

Felixstowe Offshore Radio



2024 has seen the 60th anniversary of Radio Caroline, and our 10th year of celebrating the links between the local area and the offshore stations.

It has been a busy year, starting with events to commemorate the launch of Caroline off the coast of Felixstowe in 1964. First, we had a gathering at the Caroline commemorative stone

on March 27th, to mark the arrival of the MV Caroline 60 years ago. Then at 12 noon on March 28th, the anniversary of the official opening was celebrated by the reopening of Felixstowe Museum for 2024, by a gathering of Caroline DJ's past and present, which featured on both the ITV National & Anglia News.

In addition, we have given a number of talks during the year, in Great Bentley (Essex), Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds & Sudbury, and Felixstowe (three times), plus one via zoom to Saxmundham!

Felixstowe Museum invited us to put on an additional display looking back 60 years to when Caroline was anchored off Felixstowe, and the Felixstowe Society arranged for us to use The Hut for a 'pop up' display during the Heritage Open Days weekend.






We have had a busy and productive first year for our project to grow publicly accessible food in the town. Here is a look back to last winter:

Since January 2024 we have:

a bank account (both harder than you'd think!) and successfully applied and obtained a couple of grants from the council to get us off the ground;

allotment plots now in need of a good tidy up. Furthermore, it's change over time as some tenants move on or just



surrender their plots for a variety of reasons. The clean-up process ahead of winter digging (yes I still dig) is also the realisation that the year of growing is nearly done save the winter greens that remain.

Mind you, after a great year for fruit production in particular, this summer has seen a vast increase in all things creepy. The cabbage white butterfly and its eggs have absolutely covered my sprouts, cabbages and the like. I've tried all manner of tricks to reduce their number but I have to admit I've failed. The plants have been eaten by the ever growing caterpillars and therefore I have dug them all up and composted what little was left!

That's the joy of have an allotment, being able to enjoy the gluts and then face the reverse when mother nature takes over and in the case of my brassica's wins. There's always next year and the local shops will bail me out when the wife is seeking winter vegetables or my allotment buddies will take pity on us.

The Town Council continue to see a turn around on the allotment sites across town, especially now as the tenancy agreements are renewed or otherwise. The allotment association seeks to work with our landlord to obtain full use and benefit from the sites and we offer our members access to a small shop and seeds at a reduced price from a prize winning local seed merchant.

One highlight for a member has been a fantastic row of celery, not often grown given its complexity. The picture shows the bespoke paper collar around each one to ensure a long white blanched stalk, guaranteed to bring comment from those lucky enough to chew on it perhaps helped by a liberal does of table salt. Green Impact Felixstowe is a group trying to encourage people to look after their local environment. We want to create and protect green spaces across the town and put nature at the centre of all we do and the decisions we make: planting not removing trees; taking an interest in wildlife from birds to insects and badgers to bats; encouraging clean air and clean waterways; keeping plastic from the seas. Ultimately, we aim to encourage the next generation, in particular, to love and value all that is special about our town.

Now in their fourth year, we questioned whether it is appropriate to encourage young children do the small things like looking after snails and bees when some adults in authority are having a massive negative impact on precious wildlife. However, a local businessman wisely convinced us that actually there has never been a better time to inspire the next generation.

A programme to identify 'green heroes' in schools has been launched. Schools have been provided with beautiful certificates and 'green hero' badges to award pupils who are taking positive action or encouraging others. We hope these awards will turn into nominations for the Felixstowe Environment Awards 2024. Nominations should be completed by 15 January with the winners announced in early spring. We will also recognise schools which are making a difference and individual teachers and youth leaders who are inspiring young people. new sound for Suffolk was needed, and with the words "we could do that", Suffolk Sound launched just a matter of weeks later in July

With new investors showing confidence in Suffolk Sound, plus a full supplement of advertisers, the future of the radio station was cemented. Nobody at Suffolk Sound gets paid, and directors take no dividends. The ethos of "Radio at The Heart of The Community" prevails.

Now with a complement of nearly 50 presenters, along with increased technical capacity, and a mobile outside broadcast trailer, Suffolk Sound is truly visible around Suffolk throughout the year. Felixstowe Museum – The Beehive Café

As our doors close for the 'official season', we are excited to announce that thanks to funding from Community Partnerships-East Suffolk Council (Ease the Squeeze initiatives), our doors will re-open for a new monthly Local History Café from November to April.

So many people have shared that 'things shut down over winter' and it can be a lonely and isolating time where you feel cut off from your community. Not everyone is able to access Facebook to keep on top of local activity and chit chat. On top of that, the cost of living challenges bring food and fuel poverty to people's homes forcing difficult choices.

The Beehive Café at Felixstowe Museum offers a warm, welcoming space where local residents can connect with their community and where they live, through local history. The café offers a complimentary cuppa or two, including a light communal lunch. Key to the café is our passion for storytelling, as we share the lives of people, places or collection items from Felixstowe's past.

Our first café launched on Tuesday 19 November with a sense of mystery – An Archaeological Felixstowe Find - yet to be displayed!

Our next Local History Café is Tuesday 10 December with a focus on the HMS Beehive – home to up to 40 small naval vessels and was Britain's coastal forces' most successful wartime base. HMS Beehive was commissioned in January 1940, tucked away in the Felixstowe dock basin between the port's Landguard & Trinity terminals, which it shared throughout the war with a flourmill! There is so much more to discover about HMS Beehive.

Other proposed talks helping you discover or perhaps revisit Felixstowe's past include Wallis Simpson, Felixstowe Ladies College/MCP Chapel & Felixstowe Museum itself.

The café runs from 10.30 to 2.30 to coincide with the local 77 bus or free parking within the Museum grounds. There is some discretionary funding allocated for reimbursement of public or community transport.

Felixstowe Road Runners take on Round Norfolk Relay



"So why do you do it, then?" asked the lady at the bus stop.

I was waiting to get back to Hunstanton after my 14-mile run along the beautiful North Norfolk coast – one of seventeen legs that make up a 198-mile route around the perimeter of Nelson's county.

I'm not sure I gave an answer that made sense to her – something along the lines of challenge, teamwork and mental wellbeing. I understand from an outsider's point of view that running can seem like a strange choice of hobby, and the Round Norfolk Relay is a particularly strange event: a dawn start in King's Lynn - morning legs through Hunstanton, Wells and Cromer - turning inland at Great Yarmouth as the evening draws in – night legs through Bungay and Diss – graveyard shifts through Thetford and Downham Market – before finishing back in King's Lynn the following morning. Each stage is a different length, some along coast paths and beaches, some along roads, but all with a common purpose: getting the baton round 198 miles, unscathed.

Seventeen runners and a support crew of cyclists, drivers and timekeepers from Felixstowe Road Runners made it all happen, finishing in a time of 26 hours 50 mins. We were just one of 60 teams in this year's event, which attracted running clubs from all over East Anglia. Felixstowe Road Runners have a long history with the event, entering a team every year since 2007.



The 'RNR', as it's affectionately known, is truly a unique event and always a privilege to be part of - there's nothing like the feeling of satisfaction on hearing the baton has been carried across the finish line, and knowing you've done your bit. Now there's a reason to do it, if ever there was one!

Felixstowe Travel Watch

"More buses for Old Felixstowe?"

With just two buses in the morning and the same in the afternoon, getting to and from Old Felixstowe or trying to get to the Grove Medical Centre is not easy. Suffolk County Council have asked for ideas about how best to use a £324,000 budget to improve bus services across the County. Bryan Frost Chair of our Public Transport committee has done the research and hard work and put together a bid for the County to use that money to bring in an Hourly day-time service on this no. 73 route. The bid is being enthusiastically supported by Felixstowe Town, Trimley and Kirton parish councils and will benefit all users along the route via Martlesham to Woodbridge. Let us hope it is successful.

In other good local travel news - Trimley station is being upgraded with a longer and newly surfaced platform, following on from the recent work on renovating the footbridge, fitting new lighting and fencing - but still no news about the fate of the derelict station buildings.

The Felixstowe Society

With over 400 members, a major aim of The Felixstowe Society is to promote high standards of planning and architecture in Felixstowe.

Consequently, The Felixstowe Society welcomed the recent Felixstowe Town Council statement concerning the North Felixstowe Garden Neighbourhood Development (NFGND) which established the Council's view on the proposals for the development of that area.

Over the last year, the members of The Felixstowe Society Committee have attended various forums, panels and workshops as part of the public consultation on NFGND organised by East Suffolk Council. The Committee agreed with much of the Town Council's statement but added these observations:

All proposals for the NFGND are yet to be submitted for outline planning consent. It will be at this time that Felixstowe Society Committee members will look at the proposal in close detail and comment accordingly.

• The Society will champion the need to ensure that all existing public open space is protected. This includes the The Grove, Abbey Grove and the adjacent playing fields.

• Furthermore, The Society will seek to influence the meaningful extension to the existing public open space to include further woodland, wetland and meadowland as compensation for the initial loss of wildlife habitat.

• The landscape character of the area will inevitably be adversely affected where housing is located, so promoting the minimum impact on views and vistas within the design of the scheme will be a high priority.

The new plaque will ensure that the disaster and loss of life continues to be commemorated for years to come.

Remembering the 1953 Floods

A total of 41 Felixstowe residents lost their lives in the 1953 Floods, which took place on 31 January, and are widely regarded as one of the worst flooding events in the East of England. The height of the storm surge is indicated by the blue line on the Flood Memorial, which is maintained by the Felixstowe Town Council Grounds Team.



Each year, a service is hosted to remember all those who tragically lost their lives in the 1953 Floods. At the service, students from local schools lay 41 candles to mark each life that was lost.

Funding boost for biodiversity in East Suffolk



Strength & Balance Classes Available Locally

A popular small grants scheme, aimed at grass roots projects in East Suffolk that help promote and enhance biodiversity, is being relaunched. The East Suffolk Greenprint Forum first launched its Nature First small grant scheme, thanks to funding from East Suffolk Council, in 2021. During the two years of the original scheme, the Greenprint Forum awarded grants totalling £19,727.19 to 26 projects across the district.

Examples of projects that received funding previously included:

• Pathways Care Farm created raised beds and ran a course to teach pupils, parents and staff at Beccles Primary Academy about growing and harvesting vegetables organically and sustainably.

• Saxmundham Green Team purchased tools to enable the ongoing conservation work in the town of Saxmundham.

• Waveney Bird Club constructed an eight-metre-tall swift tower to provide nesting opportunities for swifts at the Eels Foot in Theberton.

• Aldeburgh's Amazing Swifts installed double swift boxes, cameras, call system and air quality sensor to Thomas Miles High School in Framingham to enable students to learn more about swifts.

• Landguard Bird Observatory purchased new nets to aid the safe trapping of migratory birds to enable the ongoing robust contribution by the observatory to national data bases.

The aim of the scheme is to support the Council's environmental vision, stated in its strategic plan, Our Direction, delivering positive impacts for nature by funding projects that contribute to the enhancement of local biodiversity and/or its understanding and appreciation by the local community.

The scheme is open now for applications. Eligible projects could include work to restore existing habitats or create to new ones, provision of nesting/ roosting places for birds, pollinators and other animals, or activities to help local people of any age learn more about and enjoy their local biodiversity.

Fresh Opportunity for Funding to Support East Suffolk Residents this Winter

Voluntary organisations and community groups have another chance to apply for an East Suffolk Council and Suffolk County Council 'Cost of Living Community Grant' to support individuals and families in communities throughout the district this winter. The Cost of Living Community Grant fund has already supported 17 projects across East Suffolk in round one, ranging from a network of Warm Rooms in Beccles to the Woodbridge CommuniTEA Chinwag and the Emmaus Felixstowe Community Lunch.

Groups can apply for a grant of ± 500 to $\pm 1,500$ to run projects between January and March 2025, but are encouraged to get their applications in soon – the second and final round will close on December 16.

Applications from projects that received a grant in round one, or a Warm Welcome grant from East Suffolk Council this winter, will not be eligible for funding and cannot be considered.



Managed by East Suffolk Council and delivered by community and leisure partners, local residents have the opportunity to take part in free, 12-week strength and balance programmes. Classes aim to improve participants' balance, co-ordination, flexibility and confidence and are designed for individuals aged 65 or over who have recently had a fall or feel unsteady on their feet.

Classes take place weekly, lasting 60 minutes, and are led by a qualified instructor in a safe space. The exercises are designed to help people feel more confident on their feet, to get in and out of a chair and provide an opportunity to socialise with other members of the community with a shared goal to increase activity.

A number of classes are currently delivered in Felixstowe, with programmes also delivered across Woodbridge, Leiston and Saxmundham and plans to expand further in 2025.

'I am on my 8th session of my strength and balance programme at Leiston and I have met some lovely people here. It has given me the confidence to go and meet more new people now. I was very nervous about going out of my house especially in the winter and as I live on my own, I didn't get to meet new people very often.
