A Message from the New Mayor of Felixstowe

It was an honour to be elected Mayor of Felixstowe for 2025 by my fellow Town Councillors at the Annual Council Meeting in May. Having served as Deputy Mayor to Cllr David Rowe last year, I know I have a tough act to follow. I'm grateful to be supported by Cllr Darren Aitchison, who will serve as Deputy Mayor.

I moved from London to Trimley St Mary in 1983, then to Trimley St Martin, and finally to Felixstowe in 1992. It has been a wonderful place to live and raise my four children. My husband and I enjoy walking our two dogs along the prom most days. Whether the sea is calm or wild, blue or grey, its beauty never fades. We often return through the seafront gardens, always appreciating the well-maintained variety of shrubs, plants and ponds.

The theme for my mayoral year is community. I aim to visit as many community groups as possible, to meet the amazing organisers and volunteers whose work strengthens our town.

It is an enormous pleasure to announce the Mayor's Charities for this year. I am really looking forward to working with Felixstowe Opportunity Group and St. Philip's Community Hub. Both these organisations are all about community. The Opportunity group has been supporting young families for more than 30 years. They have their own premises in the grounds of Felixstowe School and offer support to children with additional needs and their families. St Philip's

My first official engagement as Mayor was to attend the 4th Felixstowe Environment Awards on 22 May, organised by Litter-Free Felixstowe. It was an evening to celebrate the work of local schools, children and adults, whether it was litter picking, growing vegetables or school initiatives. It was inspiring to hear about all the environmental work happening in our town.

Two days later I was delighted to start off the 300th Park Run on Felixstowe Prom, with 410 participants. There were runners of all ages, and abilities, all enjoying the challenge and the satisfaction of getting to the finishing line.

Tuesday 27th May, Felixstowe saw the Beach of Dreams,

with flags being carried from Brackenbury Spit to Landguard point. In Landguard Fort we heard all about this initiative and listened to poetry and music.

On the 2nd of June, we began Summer by raising the Progress Pride Flag at Felixstowe Town Hall to mark the start of Pride Month. Raising the flag was a symbol of inclusion, unity, and respect—principles we hold dear in Felixstowe, and we stand in solidarity with our LGBTQ+ residents, friends and neighbours. Flying



the flag proudly above the Town Hall serves as a visible reminder that Felixstowe is a place where everyone is welcome, and where love and identity are respected and embraced.

This summer is packed with exciting events that

showcase the best of Felixstowe, which I look forward to being a part of. The Felixstowe Book Festival takes place from 25–29 June, offering an inspiring line-up of authors and events, (which you can read about on page 16). The much-loved Felixstowe Carnival



follows from 25–27 July, featuring a dazzling procession. For more information about the theme, see page 7. Love Felixstowe Festival will bring a weekend of live music and entertainment, shining the spotlight on local businesses, from 15–17 August (more information on page 12); and on 7 September, the seafront will transformed by Art on the Prom, with many talented local artists displaying their work. I was honoured to visit our Twin Town of Wesel in Germany with a Civic Delegation from 29 May-1
June. The twinning between Felixstowe and Wesel—
now more than 50 years old—represents a deep and lasting friendship built on shared values, cultural exchange, and mutual respect. These ties continue to enrich both communities. Our visit to Wesel was

both productive and welcoming. We toured the impressive new Rheinbad swimming pool and sauna complex, took part in a traditional festival, and visited a local gravel mine, now a lake supporting wildlife and biodiversity. I would like to thank Bürgermeisterin Ulrike Westkamp and her team for hosting us throughout the weekend.

I look forward to the year ahead and to celebrate everything that makes Felixstowe a vibrant, inclusive and community-focused town.

Felixstowe Opportunity Group: Nurturing Potential, Supporting Families



Established in 1990 by a dedicated group of parents in Trimley, Felixstowe Opportunity Group (FOG) has grown into a vital part of the local community, offering support to families with children who have additional needs. As a registered charity (No. 1004101), our mission is to promote the education, development, and wellbeing of babies and young children with special needs, while offering essential guidance and peer support to their families.

Operating from our fully accessible premises at Felixstowe School, we provide a welcoming, inclusive, and stimulating environment for children aged 0–5. Our facilities include a spacious playroom, soft play area, a purpose-built sensory

room, and a fully enclosed garden with outdoor play equipment. These spaces are carefully designed to support children with a wide range of needs- diagnosed, undiagnosed, or based on parental concerns - while encouraging learning, creativity, and enjoyment.

We run two play sessions each week during term time:

- Tuesdays, 12:00-2:00 pm
- Thursdays, 10:00 am-12:00 pm

Each session includes snacks, arts and crafts, singing, and outdoor play. We also provide a safe, calm space for carers to relax, connect with others, and access helpful resources and support.

Our commitment to family wellbeing extends far beyond these sessions. We collaborate with local organisations such as Mencap, which runs a Saturday group using our space, and we host two dedicated bereavement support groups for parents and carers:

- TULIPS a monthly art therapy group offering creative expression, peer support, and access to counselling.
- ROSES a hands-on gardening group focused on transforming our outdoor area into a therapeutic sanctuary for the whole community.

We're also proud to include Foggies Theatre Group in our family of initiatives. This inclusive performance group welcomes children of all abilities, promoting creativity, confidence, and teamwork through drama, music, and movement. Recently, Foggies celebrated a major achievement at a dance competition in Colchester, performing alongside mainstream groups and showcasing their incredible talent and spirit—a true reflection of the inclusive ethos we champion.

Looking ahead, we're filled with optimism and purpose. Our dedicated team of volunteers continues to train in key areas such as first aid, food hygiene, safeguarding, and British Sign



Language, ensuring we meet the evolving needs of the children and families we support.

We are deeply grateful for the ongoing support of local partners, including the Felixstowe Rotary Club, Felixstowe Lions, and Felixstowe Town council whose generosity has helped us enhance our facilities and expand the experiences we offer.

As we move forward, our goals remain simple but powerful: to reach more families, extend our impact, and continue providing a safe, nurturing space where every child has the opportunity to thrive.

St Philip's Community Hub



St Philip's Community Hub is located on Wadgate Road in Felixstowe and if you visit Tuesday and Thursday you will be greeted by an amazing team of volunteers eager to support the community.

On Tuesday November 22nd, 2016, we opened our Pop- Up shop for the first time and 8 years later we have expanded with what we offer, and our customer numbers have grown. At 10am we open our doors for customers to have a hot drink then at 11am we welcome them to pay £3 for their bag of groceries and do their shopping then enjoy coffee and cake.

For some people this is their outing of the week and the constancy of the Pop-Up Shop is vitally important. Every week we meet people whose lives are incredibly difficult through money worries, health problems, isolation and loneliness and difficulties with relationships.



And every week the Pop-Up Shop does just that – we pop up at St Philip's to welcome them to listen to provide food and essential items. Signpost them to our amazing Walton Parish Nurses Lorna and Lesley, to offer coffee and cake and an opportunity to chat.

Each week we welcome about 45 customers shopping for over 100 people.

We are very grateful to Lidl Walton Bakery and Greggs for all the unsold food we collect weekly.

Our churches at St Marys Walton and St Philip's and organisations who donate The Rotary Club, The Lions and St Martins Trimley.



Following Covid which impacted on so many we saw a greater need within the community to tackle loneliness and isolation, so it was agreed that we open the Hub another day and Thursday Drop In began in May 2021 10am-1.30pm to include:

- A comfortable and inviting place for people to meet over tea/coffee and refreshments
- A place to share a meal at no cost
- A place where they are not rushed and can play games/knit/chat/make a craft



- A place that is inclusive for everybody, regardless of age or background
- Internet access for those that need assistance with applications/ information
- Support with budgeting and all Finance matters in confidence-
- A presence from the Walton Parish Nursing Team Lorna and Lesley

Felixstowe Fairtrade Forum



In the last issue of the magazine we said we were working with potential partners to source a custom designed Fairtrade chocolate bar for Felixstowe. Since then we have been working closely with the Felixstowe Business Improvement District (BID) to draw up a design for the bar and place an order. This has now been achieved and the photo shows how the bar will look – featuring the BID's brand 'Love Felixstowe'. It will be sold at various outlets in the town centre and sea front and is expected to do well, following the success of a similar bar for Beccles, launched last year.



It is hoped that the bars will be delivered in time for the main tourist season, starting in July. When we have a firm date we will arrange a launch featuring children from local schools. For the past year they have been working to raise awareness of Fairtrade locally, including production of a video for distribution to schools in the area. This term they will learn about growing cocoa, how it is made into chocolate, and how buying Fairtrade chocolate ensures fair pay and decent working conditions for producers in developing countries. The video of the launch of Felixstowe's very own Fairtrade chocolate bar will provide a fitting conclusion to this project.

Citizen's Advice Felixstowe and District - Change in Benefits For Those With Disabilities or Long-term Health Conditions

Do you have a disability or a long-term health condition and receive State benefits? Do you know someone like this?

Millions of people are on benefits as they have a disability and / or a long-term health problem. The Department of Work and Pensions (DWP) is now writing to some claimants and saying that they must migrate to Universal Credit (UC) by a certain date. They will usually have a three month window to complete the migration. For instance, if you are on Employment Support Allowance (ESA) you will be moved onto UC in the next few months. This called "managed migration."

Citizens Advice is here to help you. There is a Help to Claim (HTC) team within Citizens Advice who are specially trained to help clients with their Managed Migration claims; the phone number for this team will be in the Managed Migration letter you will receive. The HTC team can ensure that you do not lose any transitional protection you may be entitled to so you do not lose money. It is very important that you use the HTC team rather than trying to deal with the claim on your own for this reason.

You might be receiving legacy benefits other than ESA and will therefore also receive the letter from the DWP. These benefits are: Housing Benefit, Job Seekers Allowance, Child Tax Credit (CTC), Working Tax Credit (WTC), and Income Support. For those getting CTC or WTC you will not have the three months' notice from the DWP because all tax credits are stopping on 5th April 2025. If you get the letter, you too will need to apply for UC.

People making claims for UC are often directed to make them online, but a lot of people receiving benefits do not use computers. The Government says 44% of those trying to claim UC have to make multiple attempts before they succeed because the process is long and complex. And 20% of all claims are closed by the DWP because they do not have all the information that they need from the applicants.

At Citizens Advice East Suffolk (CAES) we can help you make the call to HTC if you feel you cannot manage this on your own. A change such as this may feel overwhelming for some people – so get in touch with your local CAES office.

Felixstowe Coastwatch Ready for Busy | Felixstowe Wesel Association Summer Season

Summertime brings the highest levels of activity in, on and near the waters of Felixstowe. Yachts, cabin cruisers, sea angling boats, paddleboarders, windsurfers, kite surfers, kayaks, jetskis, e-foilers, swimmers (and paddlers) are all in evidence, especially at weekends, bank holidays and during the school holidays. All this on top of the busy commercial traffic generated by the ports of Felixstowe, Harwich, Ipswich and Mistley - including cargo ships, pilot

boats, dredgers and offshore windfarm support vessels.

As usual, the experienced and qualified volunteer watchkeepers at Felixstowe Coastwatch will be acting as the eyes and ears for HM Coastguard, covering the coastline from Landguard Point in the south to Bawdsey and the Deben entrance in the north. The latter has its regularly shifting shingle banks either side of the narrow and shallow channel, and fast flowing currents. The navigation buoys have been re-positioned for the season following winter storms. As with previous years, entering or leaving the River Deben needs to be done with care and around high water to avoid vessels grounding.

In the summer, the lookout operates from 9am to 5pm, seven days a week, and in the school summer holiday there will be an evening watch giving additional opening hours as late as 8pm (depending on the weather and how busy the seafront is each day). New volunteer watchkeepers are welcome and


In October we are looking to take a group to Wesel for Hansefest.

Lapwing Success at Trimley Marshes



Suffolk Wildlife Trust is delighted to report that five pairs of breeding lapwing have been recorded at Trimley Marshes Nature Reserve, with 11 chicks hatched so far – a fantastic success for this near-threatened wading bird.

The Trust's team carries out extensive habitat creation and management work to provide the best possible conditions for wading birds and wetland wildlife, creating a thriving haven for nature on the Orwell Estuary.

Lapwing are one of Suffolk Wildlife Trust's 13 flagship species – species the Trust targets through dedicated conservation work to help protect and restore populations. The complex mosaic of marsh, reedbeds, pools, and scrapes at Trimley Marshes offers ideal nesting habitat, giving lapwing the space they need to raise their young successfully.

This month following a successful talk from Home Farm Nacton in the winter months we are to visit their fields. We will see first hand the production methods which grow a huge quantity of class 1 vegetable's sold to the larger national supermarkets let alone the Nacton home farm shop which I for one use during the year. Yes, I can't compete with some of their lovely produce.

The association shop has also seen a busy year so far with compost sales and the like only available to our members. We try to buy sensibly and don't seek to make profits as such with volunteers managing the shop most Saturday mornings until late winter arrives. Tea, coffee and cake mornings once a month have also started, always an opportunity to chat about all things allotment. Come along and join us!

Felixstowe's beaches have once again been recognised as among the best in the country, proudly earning the prestigious 2025 Blue Flag and Seaside Award for the sixth consecutive year. The awards, which highlight excellence in water quality, safety, environmental management and visitor facilities, have

been presented to Felixstowe South

and Pier, alongside Southwold Pier, both achieving the coveted dual recognition of Blue Flag and Seaside Awards.

Elsewhere on the Suffolk coast, Lowestoft South of Claremont Pier (bathing/resort) and Kessingland (non-bathing) beaches have once again received Seaside Awards, maintaining their consistent record of quality.

"It's fantastic news that Felixstowe has once again been honoured with both the Blue Flag and Seaside Award. For six years in a row, our beaches have met the highest standards for cleanliness, safety, and water quality—something the entire community can take pride in.

These accolades reflect the hard work of many and add to everything Felixstowe has to offer. From new seafront attractions and the beautifully restored Spa Gardens, to the Landguard Nature Reserve, historic Fort, and Felixstowe Museum—not to mention our many fantastic eateries."

The Blue Flag and Seaside Awards aim to improve the quality of England's coastline and spotlight the nation's top beach destinations.

The Blue Flag, managed in the UK by Keep Britain Tidy on behalf of the Foundation for Environmental Education, is internationally recognised as the gold standard for beaches and marinas. The award is only given to beaches that meet the highest level of bathing water quality as set by the EU Bathing Water Directive. To qualify, beaches must also satisfy strict environmental, educational, safety, and accessibility criteria.

Felixstowe Unites to Help Environment and Celebrate People Making a Difference

On 22 May 2025, the 4th Felixstowe Environment awards were presented in a prestigious ceremony held at Simpsons at the Fludyers Hotel. Organised, again, by local community group, Green Impact Felixstowe/ Litter-Free Felixstowe,



Felixstowe Town Council Hosts Events to Mark VE 80



Felixstowe Marks the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day

In 2025, Felixstowe commemorated the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day—a momentous occasion that brought peace

to Europe and marked the end of World War II. To honour this historic milestone, Felixstowe

Town Council led the community in a series of commemorative events, with a special focus on an evocative Torch Parade and Beacon Lighting held on the evening of Thursday, 8 May.



Evening Torch Parade and Beacon Lighting - A **Powerful Tribute**

The evening's centrepiece, organised by Felixstowe Town Council in conjunction with Felixstowe Remembers, was a symbolic Torch Parade that began at the Town Hall Gardens and proceeded to the War Memorial on Undercliff Road West.

The moving procession featured 112 flaming torches, each representing a life lost from

Felixstowe during World War II. As each individual's name was read aloud, their torch was extinguishedcreating a powerful, personal tribute to the fallen. Once

the final torch was dimmed, the

event concluded with the lighting of a commemorative beacon, symbolising hope and unity.

"As we commemorated the 80th Anniversary of VE Day, it was important that we remembered those who gave the ultimate

Felixstowe Book Festival

Organisers of Felixstowe Book Festival were thrilled to learn recently that the Crime & Thriller Book of the Year winner was indeed Abir Mukherjee who is coming to the festival next month on Saturday 28th from 1pm – 2pm. Well known for his

historical crime series "Wyndham and Banerjee" the award-winning author, Abir Mukherjee's latest novel is a standalone. "Hunted" is a fast-moving, contemporary thriller. It's a week before the presidential elections when a bomb goes off in an LA shopping mall. In London, armed police storm Heathrow Airport and arrest Sajid Khan. His daughter Aliyah entered the USA with the suicide bomber, and now she's missing, potentially plotting another attack. Abir will be on stage at the Felixstowe Book Festival, in conversation with fellow crime writer from Suffolk, the popular author Ruth Dugdall.

Founder of the festival, Meg Reid says, "We are thrilled for Abir, crime writing is such a competitive category to win Book of the Year. We are not surprised that tickets to see him are already selling extremely well. However, we still have plenty of amazing authors for visitors to enjoy including A Mind to Murder: Celebrating PD James with Mandy Morton and Nicola Upson."

The festival of books by the sea features a varied and wide mix of genres. This year Jenny Boyd (Sister-in-law to George Harrison and married to Mick Fleetwood)



will be at the Festival, talking about Icons of Rock in their own words. Ian Collins will be on stage with Nicola Upson as they discuss Blythe Spirit: The Remarkable Life of Ronald Blythe who was considered one of the greatest writers on the English Countryside, best known for Akenfield – a poetic account of Suffolk farmlife. Whilst Lucy Hughes-Hallett about her book The Scapegoat:The Brilliant Brief Life of the Duke of Buckingham.

As a complete alternative, BBC regular Ben Chu discusses Exile Economics: What Happens if Globalisation Fails. Two more authors to look out for are Monica Feria-Tinta who asks with her book A Barrister for the Earth, if a planet can have rights? Monica is a barrister who advocates for not just people but for nature too. She will be in conversation with Felixstowe's Rachel Sloane. Finally, as we are a coastal town with many sailors, Julia Jones with her new book Stars to Steer By will be celebrating the 20th Century woman sailors with an entertaining and inspiring talk.

Suffolk choirs welcome American friends for a week of music-making and two exciting concerts in Felixstowe and Ipswich



A cross-Atlantic musical friendship started during the earliest days of the Covid lockdowns will be rekindled this summer when female vocal groups Felixstowe Harmonies and Stellar Acappella welcome American ensembles, Song of Seattle and PrimeTime for a week of music-making, including two exciting live concerts.

Felixstowe Harmonies will join Song of Seattle and PrimeTime for Across the Borders, at Harvest House in Felixstowe on July 2, while Stellar Acappella will celebrate Fourth of July! with the American singers at Peter's Church in Ipswich on July 4.

It will be the first time the groups have sung together in live concerts since their musical collaboration began five years ago during the Covid pandemic.

In early 2020, as the harsh reality of the pandemic and lockdowns set in members of Felixstowe Harmonies began sharing their thoughts and feelings about isolation and how the world was changing around them. Their combined words became the lyrics to a song, Across the Borders, composed by the choir's musical director Chandra Grover, which they recorded on YouTube.

When the song reached the ears of Patti Burklund in the US, a singer with female acappella chorus Song of Seattle, and quartet PrimeTime, she was captivated by its soulful lyrics and haunting melody.

Patti contacted Chandra to find out if the song could be arranged in the barbershop style for PrimeTime.



Felixstowe Harmonies, PrimeTime, Ipswich-based Stellar Acappella, of which Chandra is a member, and US chorus Song of Seattle, to which all four members of PrimeTime belong then recorded Across the Borders, while in isolation, under a new group name, Kingdom of United Voices.

Twenty-two Song of Seattle members are travelling from the US to Felixstowe where they will enjoy everything Suffolk's friendliest seaside town has to offer, in between singing workshops with Felixstowe Harmonies, two public concerts, and some musical surprises.

Felixstowe Harmonies musical director Chandra Grover said: 'Despite being thousands of miles apart, this musical collaboration stands as a testament to the unifying power of music.

'I am incredibly proud of the singers of Felixstowe Harmonies who shared their thoughts and emotions in our very first Zoom in lockdown. Across the Borders is now bringing friends face to face to share the beauty that lies in the song.'

Dorian Singers



Our final meeting as the Dorian Singers took place at Trimley St Martin Primary School in early in the year. It was sad but also uplifting as we sang, for the last time, a selection of some of our favourite pieces accompanied by our wonderful piano accompanist Marina Korneva and conducted by Brian Latchem, our 'temporary' musical director who has lead us so admirably over the last three years. Presentations were made to them as well as to Jean Shaw, our long-serving chairman.

Founded in 1981 by schoolteacher Russell Hawes and composer Jack Hawes (no relation), The Dorian Singers (www.thedoriansingers.org.uk) began life as an evening class at Felixstowe College but quickly turned into a 'proper' choir, named after one of the ancient Greek modes. Among the singers at their debut concert on 31st July that year was Jean Shaw, who later became Musical Director and ultimately Chairman – a post she has held until February this year!



Over the years the choir has forged links with a number of fine local musicians, including the late Frank Davies (a former Director of Music at the Royal Hospital School, Holbrook), soprano Julie Roberts and tenor Paul Bloomfield among many others. Choir members have come and gone, of course, but a few of the original intake still remain, and several other 'regulars' have left or moved away only to return to the fold at a later date. Even Musical Directors have returned!

A notable feature of the Dorians throughout their history has been the sheer diversity of their concert programmes. Over the years, the choir has performed Handel's 'Messiah', Joseph Horowitz's 'Captain Noah and his Floating Zoo', a medley of Abba hits and a semi-staged version of Gilbert & Sullivan's 'Trial by Jury'. Other highlights have included the BBC Radio Suffolk carol concert at the Britten Studio at Snape Maltings, and their first-ever joint concert with the municipal choir from Felixstowe's twin town of Wesel.

We should like to thank our Friends who have supported the Dorians over the decades and to John Barratt at The Card Centre for advertising our concerts and handling ticket sales. Finally thanks to you all for your generosity and support over 43 years of music making.

Pier Projects



As we step into Summer, we are excited to share two new additions to the online archive created as part of Views from Convalescent Hill which explored the heritage of rest, wellbeing and care in Felixstowe. These contributions shed new light on the knowledge that was uncovered and events that took place during the two year collaboration. These final reflections also bring the project to a close. The first contribution is by Janet Fink, a Felixstowe resident who has been instrumental in sharing her passion for social history. As a Creative Collaborator, Janet undertook research at Felixstowe Museum and Suffolk Archives to build a historical picture of Felixstowe as a place for health and convalescence, mapping the buildings and locations in the town. Having been shared through the exhibition, the scale of this heritage can now be viewed on the digital archive. Alongside this online map, Janet has also written a new article, Felixstowe and its Convalescent Spaces, which delves more deeply into the very first home to open in the town and the last to close: the Suffolk Convalescent Home and Sea Bathing Infirmary and the Bartlet Convalescent Home.

The second contribution is by artist Dana Olărescu who was commissioned and created the performative installation All Ears: A Community Listening Station . Dana traces her personal interest in the culture of sea bathing and blue therapy, shares the process of working with the esteemed Creative Collaborators and offers some reflections.

Felixstowe Relief Charity Felixstowe widens network of support

Over recent months, Felixstowe Relief Charity has assisted a large number of residents who are facing financial challenges. From food vouchers to furniture and clothes to cookers, the amount of items requested is steadily growing as word is spread about the important work of this local charity. With a robust but easy application process, families and individuals are encouraged to get in contact if they need essential equipment. There are an increasing number of requests for white goods (fridge/freezers, washing machines and cooking appliances). The only necessary criteria is that applicants must have lived in Felixstowe (including Kirton, Walton, the Trimleys and Falkenham) for a minimum 3 years.

The trustees are committed to relieving poverty and are now working with other organisations to ensure a more holistic approach. Trusted Charity Partners such as Compass, Level 2 and Pitstop are helping to provide guidance and much needed ongoing support. This joined-up approach has been very successful in assisting people to make a fresh start. The charity has also helped those with long term health conditions by providing specialist beds for conditions such as fibromyalgia as well as mobility equipment and stairlifts.

With a weekly presence at Job Club at the Salvation Army on Wednesdays (1000-1200) and Emmaus Wellbeing Club, Felixstowe Relief Charity has also been available to offer help with training costs and educational needs as residents try to get back into employment. Courses provided include dental nursing through to construction cards (CSCS) and it has proved a particularly effective way to provide practical help. By moving it to a larger, more accessible space within our building, we can better utilize equipment and ensure the area is safer and more functional for all users.

The new space will feature updated sensory resources such as bubble tubes, fibre optics, sensory toys, and music to create a soothing and engaging environment. Our volunteers and families have already expressed excitement about the improvements, with early feedback highlighting the positive impact the project is expected to have.

The refurbishment has been guided by input from volunteers, sensory specialists, and families, ensuring that the final design responds directly to the unique needs of the children while remaining inclusive.

This relocation and refurbishment reflect our ongoing commitment to creating a supportive, high-quality, and inclusive space where every child can thrive. 



Seasonal Updates from the Felixstowe Town Council Grounds Team: Cemetery Gate & 40 Years of Felixstowe in Flower



A new gate has been installed at Felixstowe Cemetery as part of preparations for the forthcoming cemetery extension. This development supports the ongoing effort to maintain

and enhance the site with care and long-term planning. The gate is open during cemetery hours: from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. between 1 October and 30 April, and from 8:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. between 1 May and 30 September. It remains locked overnight.



40th Anniversary of Felixstowe in Flower

This summer marks a significant milestone—the 40th anniversary of Felixstowe in Flower, a cherished community tradition that continues to brighten the town year after year. In celebration, planting is already underway. The town's signature three-tier planters and tubs have been filled with vibrant geraniums, supported by compost produced locally at the cemetery. To improve water efficiency, Broadleaf P4 has been added to enhance moisture retention.

From the end of June, watering will be further supported by grey water supplied by Felixstowe Golf Club, reinforcing Felixstowe Town Council's commitment to sustainability. Hanging baskets have been installed in preparation for the launch event on 7 June, ensuring the town is in full bloom for the height of summer. Felixstowe in Flower continues to flourish—40 years on—as a lasting symbol of community pride and environmental care. Planning and Environment Committee

Planning Applications

During 2024/25 the Planning and Environment Committee considered a total of 184 local planning applications. Committee noted that on 86.3% of occasions (113 of 131 reported decisions) East Suffolk have concurred with the Town Council's recommendations.

Of those cases where there was contrasting view, a referral panel at East Suffolk Council reviewed the Town Council recommendations before deciding whether to refer the application to the District Council's Planning Committee for determination. Of the 184 applications considered, four plans were refused by both East Suffolk and Felixstowe Town Council; two which had been recommended for approval by Felixstowe Town Council were refused by East Suffolk; and, 16 were approved which Felixstowe Town Council recommended to be refused. eight applications were withdrawn and 45 are still awaiting a decision from East Suffolk at this time.

Neighbourhood Plan Feasibility Working Group

In February, the Committee established a Working Group to explore whether Felixstowe would benefit from developing a Neighbourhood Plan. Meetings have been held with expert input from planning consultants, East Suffolk Council, Kesgrave Town Council and Lowestoft Town Council—offering contrasting but equally valuable perspectives.

The Working Group will report its findings back to the Planning & Environment Committee following its evaluation of the benefits of a Plan and what the key drivers might be for undertaking the work.

Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL)

Council received CIL payments from East Suffolk Council totalling £158,651.02 in 2024/25. These funds are held in separate Earmarked Reserves and are ringfenced to support appropriate projects within a five-year timescale allowed by legislation. Consultation has taken place to identify suitable projects and a Parish Infrastructure Investment Plan (PIIP) has been drawn up to prioritise these in advance of delivery.

This year £100,000 has been granted towards refurbishment of Walton Recreation Ground and Seaton Road Park play equipment, and £7,650 out of an allocated £15,000 towards the refurbishment of the Allenby Park Gates from previous CIL money received during the period 2020-2023.

£30,000 has also been ring-fenced towards the Level Two Music Digital Arts Centre which has recently received planning permission.

Climate Emergency

Council requires Councillors and staff to consider climate, air pollution and nature plans in all their decision-making processes. Since Council declared a Climate Emergency

in July 2019, the Climate Emergency Working Group meets regularly to review processes, services, products and actions and aims to raise awareness locally through the Town Council Magazine and social media. A wider 'Climate Action Group' with key stakeholders, including the Port of Felixstowe, BID, Chamber of Commerce, Felixstowe Community Nature Reserve and Litter Free Felixstowe among others have met to discuss Climate Action in the town. The latest meeting included local developers, where environmental benefits for new build developments were highlighted. A wider group meeting is currently being planned for September 2025.

Calculating our Carbon Footprint

Council had Energy Performance Certificates and Display Energy Certificates carried out in 2020 and have used these as a baseline for improvement, alongside regularly calculating its carbon footprint.

In 2019, the Council's carbon consumption stood at 43.37 tonnes of CO2, decreasing to 23.5 tonnes in 2020, and further down to 17.89 tonnes in 2023 this decrease was attributed to the adoption of electric vans and tools. Source: www.carbonfootprint.com/businesscarboncalculator.html.

Plans For the Future

In 2024/25, Felixstowe Town Council successfully secured a grant from East Suffolk Council's UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) Rural Business and Community Hub Fund. This funding will support a major environmental upgrade to Walton Community Hall, aimed at significantly reducing its carbon footprint. Planned works include the installation of a new air conditioning/air source heat pump system for the main hall, solar panels with battery storage, and replacement of the last remaining single-glazed windows with double glazing. These improvements will create a warmer, more energy-efficient space—helping to lower running costs and enhance usability for community groups year-round.

A new Cemetery Extension Project Group has also been established to explore options for future burial provision. Proposals under consideration include green burials and the implementation of a borehole to support water conservation. For the planned new buildings, sustainable features such as green roofs and grey water systems are being investigated to align with the Council's environmental commitments. The Council remains committed to supporting environmental initiatives in partnership with local organisations.

The Climate Emergency Working Group will continue leading the Council's environmental response, working with the Felixstowe Youth Forum to involve local students in climate action. It is also partnering with Felixstowe BID and the wider Climate Action Group to help reduce the town's carbon footprint.

- Electric van used as a 'first resort' vehicle wherever practicable (except for towing).
- Replaced the majority of garden tools with battery rechargeable power tools.
- Council now creates all its own compost and is helping the Felixstowe Allotment Association become a 'Champion' for composting.
- Supported the 'Love Green Felixstowe' festival and 'Edible Felixstowe' to encourage community planting around the town.
- Single use Plastic Policy adhered to for all events.
- Cycle to Work Scheme expanded, with several employees now cycling to work.
- Car-sharing and holding more meetings online.
- 'No Idling' campaign via the Youth Forum promoted in schools.

- Re-wilding along Langley Avenue.
- Encouraging Wildlife at the Cemetery.
- Reducing use of herbicides and pesticides.
- Created a Green Management Plan improving the natural environment including creating new pathways in Town Council owned parks.
- Provided community allotments for the Grove Surgery and Level Two Youth Project to encourage participation in local food growing.
- Nursery created to help establish saplings and maintain plants
- Further separation and recycling of waste.
- Replacing all lights at end of their life with LED.
- Insulated to 270mm in uninsulated areas.
- Used 100% renewable energy suppliers this will be continued when the contract ends.
- Grey water used for watering Felixstowe in Flower baskets with thanks to Felixstowe Ferry Golf Club!
- Over 70 trees planted as part of the Queen's Jubilee, and over 300+ as part of the Woodland Trust scheme.
- Refurbishment of Town Hall windows using highly efficient innovative glass with a very low thermal transmittance of 0.7 w/m2.k.
- Created a community orchard (micro woodland) at Cowpasture meadow.

Finance and Governance Committee

Audit and Accounts

The 2024/25 Audit will be undertaken by PKF Littlejohn LLP in June 2025, and the audited accounts for 2024/25 will be available from September 2025. Finance and Governance Committee receives six-monthly Internal Audit reports. In 2024/25, the Internal Auditor found Council's procedures to be all in order and made some helpful recommendations

Business Plan

The Business Plan for 2024-2028 was approved by Council on 15 May 2024 and is available to view online at felixstowe.gov.uk/Business-Plan-2024-28

Budget and Precept

At the close of the 2024/25 financial year, Felixstowe Town Council recorded an income outturn of 102.0% against budget estimates, with expenditure at 96.9% of the approved budget. This was achieved despite increased costs in certain areas, including PPE, skip and digger hire, and rising utility expenses such as Town Hall electricity and water supply at the allotments.

After several years of maintaining a 0% increase in its portion of the council tax, followed by a 5.54% increase in 2024/25, the Council agreed that a further 3.2% increase would be required for the 2025/26 financial year. This means that the annual Band D equivalent charge will rise from £74.80 to £77.19—representing just under 3.7% of the overall council tax bill.

The remaining 96.3% is shared between Suffolk County Council, East Suffolk Council, and Suffolk Constabulary.

Budget Estimates

Council's Finance & Governance Committee closely monitored and reviewed the financial position regularly. Due to careful budgeting in recent years, the Council's reserves are able to offer some protection against unforeseen variables.


General Power of Competence

The "General Power of Competence" was included in the Localism Act 2011 (Part 1, Chapter 1, ss 1-8). This power was brought into force by SI 965 The Parish Councils (General Power of Competence) (Prescribed Conditions) Order 2012 in April 2012. The power enables eligible councils to have "the power to do anything that individuals generally may do" as long as they are not prevented from doing so by other laws. The Town Council continues to meet the criteria for eligibility and adopted the use of the General Power of Competence at its Annual Council Meeting on 15th May 2019, renewing this again on 17 May 2023.

Assets and Services Committee

Town Hall

Extensive refurbishment works were carried out during the year to address longstanding damp issues affecting several areas. The programme included



Council also approved the replacement of the lift motor after a fault was identified during routine servicing to ensure continued safe operation.

Accessibility has also been enhanced with the installation of a new, more durable ramp at the rear disabled entrance - an upgrade that has been well-received by users and community groups.

Routine maintenance ensures that the Town Hall continues to be well-used as a civic and community space, with a steady number of public and private bookings throughout the year, including weddings, civic functions, and numerous local events and meetings.

Broadway House

Broadway House continues to serve the local community through its lease to the Felixstowe Old People's Welfare Association (FOPWA), which was successfully renewed for a further five years. New signage has been installed in the foyer to highlight Broadway House's connection to Felixstowe Town Council and to identify the building as a Council-owned asset.

Walton Community Hall

Walton Community Hall remains a vibrant and well-used facility, welcoming new groups for our growing list of regular hirers. A key achievement this year was the successful approval of a grant application for environmental improvements at Walton Community Hall. Funding secured via the East Suffolk Rural Business and Community Hub Fund will enable plans to proceed for heating upgrades and wider energy efficiency measures. These works include replacing the ageing air conditioning unit and improving insulation, forming part of a holistic approach to reducing the building's carbon footprint.

Allotments

Allotment management has remained proactive, with regular inspections resulting in the prompt issuing of cultivation orders where necessary. Over the winter, two large vacated areas at the Railway Hill and Ferry Road sites presented opportunities for improvement and reconfiguration.

Cemetery

In response to requests from visitors, additional taps were added to the newer



areas of Felixstowe Cemetery to allow for water to be accessed when maintaining loved one's graves. After concerns were raised regarding motorbikes and scooters using the Cemetery road, a cut through barrier was installed by the grounds team at the pedestrian entrance to discourage the use of the road by motorbikes and scooters.

Allenby Park Gates

Following recommendations from the A&S Committee, the feasibility of refurbishing the gates at Allenby Park was explored and, in March, Kingdom Forge was selected to carry out restoration work on the gates. This has involved removing the gates and adjoining railings so they can be shot blasted and then new metal welded in before finally painting and reinstalling them at the park. The restoration is expected to be complete by June 2025.

Gosford Way/OFCA Path

In response to a concern raised by a member of the public and as part of our ongoing commitment to enhancing public spaces, a new path was installed at the entrance of the Gosford Way Play Area, besides the OFCA car park, allowing unbroken pedestrian access from Margery Girling Residential home to the Old Felixstowe Community Hall and to access the play area without having to walk through the car park.

Compost

In 2024, the Grounds Team began to investigate whether a high-quality compost could be made in-house for use within the planters used for Felixstowe in Flower. Compost was made at the cemetery where horse manure, collected from a local stable, has been mixed with fallen leaves and grass clippings collected from the Cemetery.

The first batch has been a success and is being used in the planters as well as some being donated to the Level Two Allotment. The Grounds Team aim to produce all compost needed in-house going forward. This has reduced costs as we avoid the need to buy in compost and further reduce the Town Council's environmental impact.

Landguard Restoration

The Town Council's Grounds Team carried out restoration at Landguard Nature reserve in December 2024 to refurbish and replace the access steps on the rifle butts.

New Apprentice Post

In October 2024 the Town Council recruited a new Apprentice to the Grounds Team.




Occasional Grants

Remembrance and VE80



Felixstowe Town Council, in partnership with the Felixstowe Branch of the Royal British Legion, supported several commemorative events in 2024/25.

Residents, veterans, and civic dignitaries gathered at the War Memorial at the annual Remembrance Sunday service and parade in November 2024 to honour the sacrifices of the Armed Forces. Wreaths were laid on behalf of the community, and a two-minute silence observed in tribute to the fallen.

On 8 May 2025, to mark the 80th anniversary of VE Day, the Council raised the VE80 flag, held a wreath-laying service with the Royal British Legion and hosted a moving Torch Parade and Beacon Lighting, delivered in conjunction with Felixstowe Remembers.

The Torch Parade featured 112 Torch Bearers, each representing a life lost to Felixstowe in the Second World War. As they processed past the War Memorial, each bearer extinguished their torch in a powerful act of remembrance.

Flood Memorial



The anniversary of the North Sea Floods was marked on 31 January 2025 with a commemorative service at the Felixstowe Flood Memorial.

The event paid tribute to the 41 lives lost in the 1953 tragedy and was attended by members of the community who came together in remembrance

Blue Flag

The Town Council was delighted that Felixstowe South and Pier were, once again, recognised as two of the country's best beaches, being awarded a Blue Flag and Seaside award by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. In order to receive the Blue Flag award beaches must comply with several criteria covering environmental education and information, water quality, environmental management, safety, and services.

Felixstowe consistently meets the criteria for 'excellent' international bathing water quality standards and, until January 2022, was the only beach in Suffolk to meet this exacting standard.



Flag Flying

Throughout the year, a variety of flags have been flown on the flagpole outside the Town Hall to mark national days, community events, and significant commemorations.

Highlights included the second raising of the Progress Pride Flag during Pride Month in June, the Suffolk Day Flag on 21 June, the Armed Forces Flag for Armed Forces Week and VE80 to commemorate the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe Day. In addition, both the Union Jack and the Blue Flag have been flown during the year in recognition of national pride and Felixstowe's award-winning seafront.
